Proposed Changes for the 2011 Federal Legislative Agenda

#### **OVERVIEW OF COMMITTEE ACTION**

The Federal Legislative Committee met on January 18, 2011 to discuss and update the City's Federal Legislative Agenda. The Committee proposed two changes to the Agenda, as well as voted to support all of staff's recommended changes. All proposed changes for the 2011 Federal Legislative Agenda will be presented to the City Council for consideration on February 1, 2011.

#### PROPOSED CHANGES

Staff's proposed changes for the 2011 Federal Legislative Agenda are attached. The Committee's proposed changes are detailed below:

- Proposed change: Amend staff's recommended language to include the underlined text, "Support legislation that provides a sufficient process for businesses and school districts to implement ADA requirements, while protecting the rights of the disabled community".
- Proposed change: Amend existing language to include the underlined text, "Pursue federal funding for soundwalls and maintenance along goods movement corridors".

It is recommended that the City Council approve and adopt all recommendations provided by the Federal Legislative Committee for the 2011 Federal Legislative Agenda.
