Residential use of natural gas in California is down and is not expected to rise for at least the next decade, so there is no reason to subject the people of this community to this risky project.

The people of Long Beach deserve clean, safe renewable energy sources, not expanded use of polluting foreign fossil fuels threatening our quality of life. Through the use of simple conservation and expanded, readily available renewable resources we can more than make up the energy this LNG terminal could create.

I urge you to stand up for future generations and protect Long Beach residents from the many threats posed by this dangerous and unnecessary LNG facility.
