# Background

- In the Fiscal Year 2023 (FY 23) Adopted Budget, the City Council allocated \$50,000 in one-time funding to conduct a City Council Prioritization Process to better inform future City of Long Beach (City) programming.
- The City Manager's Office engaged consultant Baker-Tilly to facilitate a Mayor and City Council priority-setting workshop which was held and open to the public on March 30, 2023.

- Activity 1 – Gathered background information and conducted interviews
- Activity 2 – Designed and facilitated the Mayor and City Council workshop
- Activity 3 – Facilitate Executive Team Session

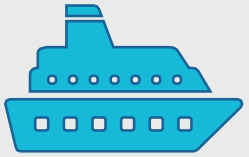
# Top Priorities of the Mayor and City Council

- Significant concerns expressed
- Include mental health and substance abuse treatment services
- Increase affordable housing
- Build more housing of all types
- Apply inclusionary housing incentives
- Identify funding sources for affordable housing production

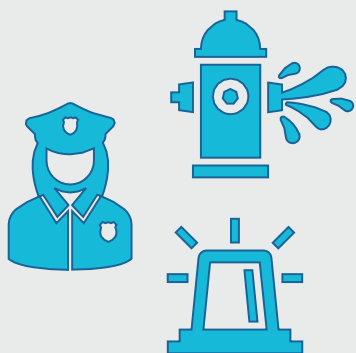
# Top Priorities of the Mayor and City Council



## Economic Development

- Expand local business opportunity, business attraction and retention
- Plan for Queen Mary
- Increase cruise ships at port
- Plan for waterfront development
- Revitalize commercial centers
- Business friendly; streamline permitting
- More large-scale events
- Promote growth of business clusters
- Development opportunity for Elephant Lot
- Make Long Beach a destination city

# Top Priorities of the Mayor and City Council



## Public Safety

- Concerns about rising crime

# Foundational Priorities



## Staffing

- Concerns about recruitment and retention
- Staff capacity



## Fiscal Sustainability

- Need new revenue streams
- Loss of tidelands money and reduced fossil fuels revenues
- Managing potential deficits and impacts on services
- Expectations from residents for higher level of services

# Mayor and City Council Norms



## Mayor and City Council Norms

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1. Assume good intent
2. Work together as a body, modeling teamwork, respect and civility
3. Respect the roles the Mayor, City Council, City Manager, and City Attorney in our form of government
4. Share information and avoid surprises
5. Stay focused on City Council priorities
6. Maintain a citywide perspective, while being focused on our districts
7. Disagree agreeably and professionally
8. Keep confidential things confidential
9. Utilize long-range plans to provide big picture context that is realistic and achievable
10. Communicate concerns about staff to the City Manager, while treating staff respectfully
