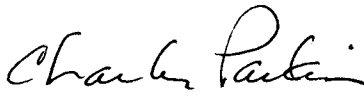

Subject: Revised Estimated Cost for Ballot Rotation

On February 1, 2011, the City Council voted unanimously to refer the topic of municipal elections ballot rotation to the Elections Oversight Committee (EOC).

On September 27, 2011, the EOC deliberated on the topic of ballot rotation. During EOC deliberations, I estimated costs for ballot rotation to range from \$2,300 to \$9,500; and that the cost of rotation depended on the actual number of contested races and candidates in each contest. As stated below, this estimate was not complete because it only covered the cost of printing official ballots and did not include the cost of sample ballot printing. At conclusion of staff's presentation, the EOC forwarded discussion and approval of ballot rotation to the full City Council.

On December 6, 2011, the City Council directed the City Attorney to draft an ordinance to provide for ballot rotation for City office contests.

In February 2012, the City Clerk Department reviewed its previous estimate and determined that it did not include an additional \$41,000 in estimated costs for preparing and printing sample ballots in circumstances similar to the April 2010 election cycle. As a result of this review, a revised cost estimate for ballot rotation is \$50,500.

Although a "combined" sample ballot (wherein each voter receives a sample ballot with only the first order rotation) could mitigate the foregoing estimated cost, discussions with local county election officials revealed that such an approach may increase the risk of voter confusion. Nevertheless, a combined sample ballot is still allowed pursuant to Elections Code Section 13300.5, and if implemented would require budgeted resources for voter education.

On the basis of the revised estimate and new information, it is recommended that ballot rotation in City office elections, and how the rotations appear in the sample ballot, meet the requirement of Elections Code Section 13300 [b], i.e., that the sample ballot be identical to the official ballot that each voter will cast at their precinct voting location or by mail.

So that Council can continue to discuss ballot rotation for application in any City contest that goes to a June 2012 run-off election, the proposed ordinance is drafted to only launch a pilot program that becomes void after June 5, 2012. If adopted, the pilot program is estimated to cost \$12,000 for a maximum of three June 2012 run-off contests that may occur in Council Districts 2, 4 or 8. In the event of fewer run-off contests, estimated costs may be less. If the proposed ordinance were enacted, staff will provide, at a later date, a report relative to actual ballot rotation impacts and costs.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE
CITY OF LONG BEACH AMENDING THE LONG BEACH
MUNICIPAL CODE BY AMENDING SECTION 1.21.060 OF
CHAPTER 1.21 RELATING TO A PILOT BALLOT
ROTATION SYSTEM FOR THE JUNE 2012 ELECTION
ONLY

The City Council of the City of Long Beach ordains as follows:

Section 1. Section 1.21.060 of the Long Beach Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

1.21.060 Order of candidates' names on ballot.

A. Notwithstanding the provisions of the California Elections Code, ballots for the election of candidates for city offices shall be printed and distributed in accordance with this section.

B. In the case of elections for city-wide offices, the names of the candidates shall be placed on the ballot by the City Clerk in accordance with the randomized alphabet drawing pursuant to California Elections Code Section 13113 for the First Councilmanic District. Thereafter, for each succeeding councilmanic district, the name appearing first in the last preceding district shall be placed last, the order of the names remaining unchanged.

C. In the case of elections for councilmanic offices, the names of the candidates shall be placed on the ballot by the City Clerk in "clusters" as defined below. In the cluster designated "Cluster No. 1," the names of the candidates shall be placed on the ballot by the City Clerk in

1 accordance with the randomized alphabet drawing pursuant to California
2 Elections Code Section 13113. Thereafter, for each succeeding cluster,
3 the name appearing first in the last preceding cluster shall be placed last,
4 the order of the names remaining unchanged. In the event that the
5 number of candidates exceeds the number of clusters, this process will
6 repeat with "Cluster No. 1" and so forth.

7 D. For purposes of this section, a "cluster" shall consist of one
8 or more precincts which need not be contiguous. The clusters of precincts
9 shall be numbered in consecutive order for purposes of ballot rotation of
10 candidates' names, and the City Clerk shall list the clusters by number and
11 identify which precincts are in each cluster. No cluster shall vary more
12 than 10 percent in the number of registered voters from other clusters in
13 the same councilmanic district. The number of clusters in each
14 councilmanic district shall equal the number of candidates nominated
15 pursuant to California Elections Code Section 10220 for that councilmanic
16 election, provided however, that the number of clusters shall not exceed
17 five (5) in each councilmanic district.

18 E. Within seven (7) days of the date of a primary nominating
19 election, the City Clerk shall request that the secretary of state conduct a
20 randomized alphabet drawing pursuant to California Elections Code
21 section 13113. The results of such drawing shall determine the order on
22 the ballot of the candidates' names for the general election, in accordance
23 with this section.

25 Section 2. This amendment to Section 1.21.060 of the Long Beach
26 Municipal Code is hereby approved as a pilot program to assist the City of Long Beach to
27 determine the effectiveness of a ballot rotation system and shall only be in effect for the
28 June 2012 election. Following the June 2012 election, this pilot program shall terminate

1 and this amendment shall be null and void for all future elections unless authorized by
2 further action of the Long Beach City Council.
