

Background


- Dominant strain is H3N2
 - > Associated with more hospitalizations and deaths in young children and seniors
- > Flu season is early this year
 - Unknown if season has peaked yet
 - Other strains may not have peaked yet
- Vaccine efficacy unknown, but likely 10-30% effective against H3N2
 - > Still strongly recommended
 - Can prevent severe illness
 - Not too late in the season





Long Beach Flu Surveillance

- 78% increase in flu cases reported compared to this time last year
- younger than age 65
- 3 influenza-associated deaths in those younger than age 65





Long Beach Flu Response

› Healthcare Facility Surveillance

- > Long Beach Emergency Departments heavily impacted
- > Shortage of vents and N95 masks in late December/early January at one facility
- Initial reports of generic Tamiflu shortage, but branded product is widely available

Disease Surveillance and Outbreak Response

- Work closely with neighboring jurisdictions and State to track flu activity regionally
- Investigate outbreaks in hospitals and skilled nursing facilities
- The Health Department held an Influenza Update for Skilled Nursing Facilities to review influenza prevention and outbreak protocols





Long Beach Flu Activities

> Immunization Program

- Nearly 3,500 vaccines administered this season to residents and City staff
- Health Department has held or participated in 25 different free flu vaccination clinics this season
- In addition to Health Department activities, Occupational Health also vaccinated 481 employees





Long Beach Flu Activities

- > Annual Flu Vaccination Clinic
 - > An annual free event for several years
 - > October, 2017
 - Included (first ever) drive-through component
 - > Administered 600+ vaccinations in 5 hours

- Held a second drive-through vaccination clinic in January
 - Due to increased demand because of severity of flu season
 - Vaccinated over 150 residents and City staff






Recommendations

› Get vaccinated (not too late!)


Take flu antiviral drugs if your doctor prescribes them

 Limit contact with others if sick to avoid infecting others (and keep children home from school if sick)

Wash hands often with soap and water, and avoid touching your eyes, nose, or mouth
