However, discussion of the commission has thus far failed to sufficiently describe the ethics-focused community partners within the City of Long Beach. For instance, one important community partner that is missing from the document is the Center for Applied Ethics, which is housed in the Department of Philosophy < <a href="https://cla.csulb.edu/departments/philosophy/">https://cla.csulb.edu/departments/philosophy/</a> > at Cal State Long Beach. The Center for Applied Ethics (aka 'AEF') is a wonderful and vibrant local resource that has hitherto gone unnoticed in these discussions. This is an easy connection to make, and free; and drawing together community partners like the AEF should be a part of the mission of the Ethics Commission, however small.
