

Overview: IRC Application and Selection Process

The Selection Process

- Designed to produce a Commission that is independent and that reasonably reflects the diversity of the City
- Outreach: from August 2019 to June 2020
- Application Submissions: 400
- Ethics Commission created a sub-pool of 20-30 qualified applicants and randomly select the first 9 Commissioners
- First 9 Commissioners selected the remaining 4 members and 2 alternates
- Seated on November 20, 2020, and began holding training meetings on January 6, 2021

Connected population that shares common social and economic interests that should be included within a single district for its effective and fair representation











Phases of Engagement

Educate

May

- Introduction of Commissioners
- Identify local community partners
- Basics of Redistricting

Motivate

Jun – Sept

- Basics of Redistricting
- Encourage Public Testimony
- •Training community on Map Submission
- Public Mapping Tool Workshops

Activate

Oct - Dec

- Encourage public to submit draft maps
- Encourage public attendance to map Hearings
- •Inform the public about the new map

Methods of Engagement








Overview: Community of Interest Testimony

May - November 2021



772 Community of Interest (COI) Form submissions



16 total hours of public comment heard

Over 1,000 pages of amails submitted from

emails submitted from the community




90 COI mapping tool submissions

New Map Adopted - 11/18/21

The new Council District Map became effective on December 18, 2021





Application and Recruitment

- Be clear at the beginning about the time commitment and limitations on political participation during term of appointment
- Assessment of analytical skills of applicants




Training

 Future Commissions should receive training assistance from the 2021 Commissioners and City staff with direct experience with Independent Redistricting Commissions



Staffing

- Commission involvement in the budget and spending
- Commission should select the demographer
- Work directly with independent legal counsel
- Develop rules around Commissioner outreach activities



Public Input

- Hold meetings at schools and community centers
- If mapping begins after district-specific meetings, then another round of district outreach should occur
- To avoid skewing towards a political outcome, incumbents, their staff, consultants, candidates, or City lobbyists should be discouraged from participating
- Provide the Commission with a list of registered lobbyists




Chair/Vice Chair Selection

- Before selection, Commissions should create opportunities to get to know each other and assess leadership skills
- Consider the use of interim Chair and Vice Chair prior to selecting permanent chairs



Creation of Redistricting Plans

- Start with public-drawn and consultant-drawn maps to avoid starting with a blank map
- Transition to public live-line drawing to increase transparency and allow the public and Commissioners to understand the intent behind every line change



Conclusion

- The new map has been delivered to the LA County Registrar.
- The map will be used for the 2022 upcoming election.
