Subject: Public comment on Agenda item #32; submission in support of extension of Temporary Parklet permit at Belmont Brewing Company

Dear City Council,

I am writing in support of extending the temporary parklet permit for Belmont Brewing Company. Photos of the parklett are attached.. The parklet area does not take up parking spaces, or involve public safety or traffic hazard issues as this portion of 39th Place is not open to through traffic. In fact, Public Works has received approved plans to place bollards across 39th Place on the landward edge of the building to prevent any vehicle access as a part of an improvement plan for the Plaza area (which includes badly needed lighting). The City Council has already closed that portion of 39th Place adjacent to Belmont Brewing Company's patio but north of the Chapter 138 line. Resolution No. C-2591 and C-25792, attached.

Belmont Brewing Company has been a part of the City's attempt to revitalize this area and increase public use of the area.for 32 years. Legitimate business activity is critical to that revitalization. The area needs more commercial activity, not less. The parklet provides this. As Councilman and former Commander of the Long Beach Police Department noted in his 1995 letter (attached) supporting expansion of BBC's patio:

"Expansion of this and other visitor serving commercial uses that bring the public to the Belmont pier area at dusk and after dark is of vital interest to help insure public safety.

At one point, crime, including murder, became so rampant that the City was forced to close the pier to the public at dusk"

Unfortunately, since Councilman Drummond wrote that letter 17 years ago there is even less legitimate activity in the area: the Belmont Pool is gone, La Palapa restaurant is gone, and Aqualink service to Belmont Pier is gone. The area suffers from perhaps even more crime, homeless encampments (tents on the beach now and an encampment under the Pier) and mentally ill people harassing our customers.

Maintaining this parklet also provides a greatly demanded dog friendly outside dining area for the public (per Long Beach Health Department rules, our existing patio can only accommodate service animals) as a part of the operation.

Extending the temporary permit for BBC's Parklet will enable Belmont Brewing Company to work with Public Works, the Planning Commission and the City Council to reach acceptable conditions for a more permanent parklet term.

B. The City Council shall take any action for closure pursuant to those rules and regulations by resolution, which resolution shall, among other things, describe the area proposed for closure and shall make the findings and determinations set forth above. It shall also, if the closure is proposed to be temporary, set forth the period proposed for closure.

20 .Sec. 2. This resolution shall take effect immediately 21 upon its adoption by the City Council, and the City Clerk shall 22 certify the vote adopting this resolution.

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

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LONG BEACH CLOSING TO VEHICULAR TRAFFIC A PORTION OF 39TH PLACE NORTH OF THE SO-CALLED CHAPTER 138 LINE

WHEREAS, the City of Long Beach is in the process of facilitating expansion of a private recreational area in the form of outdoor patio facilities for a restaurant partially located on land leased from the City in the vicinity of 39th Place; and

WHEREAS, in order to facilitate that expansion and addition to the area presently leased to the facility, it is necessary to clarify closure of a small portion of 39th Place; and

WHEREAS, the area proposed for closure is that part of 39th Place as more specifically shown on that certain plat attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and described in Exhibit "B"; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has adopted amended rules and regulations for such closure and now wishes to proceed with the closure proceedings;

NOW THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of Long
 Beach resolves as follows:

Section 1. Based on the staff report and records before it at the time of adoption of this resolution, the City Council hereby finds and determines that, as to that portion of 39th Place as shown and described in Exhibits "A" and "B": A. The area proposed for closure is not used or needed

B. The area proposed for closure abuts City property
and does not provide and is not used for vehicular or other
access to any privately owned parcels; and

C. It is anticipated that the area proposed for
closure will ultimately be incorporated into a plan for private
recreational use.

8 Sec. 2. That the certain portion of 39th Place as more 9 specifically shown and described in Exhibits "A" and "B" is 10 hereby closed to vehicular traffic for the purpose of making it 11 available for recreational use.

Sec. 3. The City Manager may cause or allow barriers or other appropriate devices, signs, or obstructions to be erected or installed which will effectuate closing the described portion of highways to vehicular traffic and for recreational use.

Sec. 4. This resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption by the City Council, and the City Clerk shall certify the vote adopting this resolution.





Dear Commissioners:

I am the City Councilman representing the Belmont Pier area where the Belmont Brewery restaurant is located. I am also Vice Mayor of the City of Long Beach.

I hope the Commission grants a permit for the Belmont Brewery restaurant to add some 600+ square feet to its existing outdoor patio area. There are many reasons why doing so for this colorful, well-run, and inexpensive restaurant at an important visitor serving location, is in the best interests of the public. I am sure most of them will be explained to you during the hearing.

One reason, however, is not so obvious, and is very important to me as the former Commander of the Long Beach Police Department and the present Councilman for the area. Expansion of this and other visitor serving commercial uses that bring the public to the Belmont pier area at dusk and after dark is of vital interest to help insure public safety. We need to insure the public safety of all the public using the area at night.

The Belmont Pier area long suffered a very serious crime problem. At one point, crime, including murder, became so rampant that the City was forced to close the pier to the public at dusk. Closing a public pier is a terrible thing to have to do to such a significant public asset.

The pier and plaza area is contained, but quite large, and is somewhat difficult to police by partol cars. The area was dark and underutilized, a perfect site for gang and other criminal activity. It didn't help that the major commercial establishment bringing people into the area at night was a disreputable bikers bar located where the Belmont Brewery now sits.

Belmont Pier is in the center of our beach and has historically been the activity center for beach access. The parking lot has been metered and the revenue from these meters has provided security officers for that location. In the coming year we intend to restore the pier and add an improved restaurant in order to invite more people to the area.

Today, life after dark is returning to the Belmont Pier area thanks in good measure to the Belmont Brewery restaurant. This popular restaurant brings people to it by car, bike, and

on foot. The patrons combine dining with strolling on the pier, plaza, and bike path. This trend needs to be encouraged to grow-not nipped in the bud by government.

Our long term solution is to treat the area as a small "community" and provide a continuous police presence at night by foot or bicycle patrol. Long Beach has been very successful with this approach to bring back and protect the public in its downtown "Pine Square" are. But to provide adequate demographics and intensity of night use to justify such a public safety program in today's tough economic times, there needs to be a higher concentration of night time visitor serving uses in the area.

I urge the Commission to join with me to help attain the vision of the Citizen's Committee who produced the Long Beach L.C.P. for the area. We want to make the area a great, safe, dusk and evening visitor serving destination. The patio expansion, now before you while minor, is a step in the right direction. Denying this permit would send an unfortunate signal that the Commission will not even approve a small expansion to existing patio dining in the area.

We at the City are working hard to turn this area around so that it may become a major visitor serving asset of our City. Please help, not discourage, our effort.
