Increase appropriations in the Capital Projects Fund Group in the Public Works Department by \$38,114, offset by funds received from the Bluff Park Neighborhood Association. (District 2)

Please remove this item from the Consent Calendar for discussion. As I could not find the plans for this project in the staff report, I have several questions. What kind of bulbs are being used? Will it be possible to use historical bulbs and not LED bulbs? Can the lighting be directed downward?

Historical lights may look pretty, but usually shine light up into the sky instead of on the ground where it is needed.

Any urban lighting needs to follow these basic rules:

- 1. Light only where you need to
- 2. Turn lights off when not in use (eg, use motion detectors)
- 3. Use only as much light as you need
- 4. Direct light only where needed (downward with shields)
- 5. Use the lowest possible correlated color temperature (CCT). Nothing in the blue spectrum.
