Mayor Rex Richardson, Councilmember Roberto Uranga, and the Departments of Parks, Recreation and Marine and

Public Works hosted a groundbreaking ceremony for the new Admiral Kidd Park Playground on March 31.

The original, nautical-themed playground opened in 2011 as part of a park-expansion project and was severely damaged by fire on July 18, 2021.

In October 2021, the non-profit Partners of Parks organization began a campaign to raise \$1 million to fund the rebuild of the structure. POP raised more than \$450,000 including support from the Earl B. and Loraine H. Miller Foundation, Marathon Petroleum Foundation, Amazon, the New L Family Fund and Junior League of Long Beach. On March 8, 2022, the Long Beach City Council approved the use of approximately \$550,000 in surplus budget funds from the Fiscal Year 2021 Measure A to fulfill the remainder of the estimated \$1 million project after all Partners of Parks funding requests have been completed.

The rebuilt playground will feature a nautical-themed children's play area, a new zip-line feature, new pathways to provide access to a playground ramp, friendship swings and harness swings, and additional safety elements and site enhancements such as shade structures and lighting.

Our Department's Parks, Recreation, Marine and Animal Care Services team has responded collaboratively with citywide efforts to address homelessness in Long Beach since the emergency proclamation was established by City Council in January. Marine Bureau Maintenance team members stepped up to assist in the establishment of a Safe Parking area at Queensway Bay. Park maintenance team members have assisted in encampment cleanup efforts that help make our parks cleaner and more welcoming. Our Department has team members actively supporting many essential planning and support duties for these important citywide initiatives.

At the end of March, we celebrated the long-awaited groundbreaking for the new playground at Admiral Kidd Park. Many thanks to Partners of Parks for its fundraising campaign that attracted enough financial support to purchase all the new play equipment. This new signature playground should be completed by autumn, just in time to see the construction of a new playground at Silverado Park begin. New signature playgrounds will also soon be sprouting from the landscape at Ramona, Houghton, and El Dorado Park West parks.

Mother Nature has saturated our parks and beaches with record rainfall lately. Necessary closure of nature trails, dog parks, sports fields, and beaches have certainly limited the community's access and enjoyment of passive and active recreational amenities. Weather events have resulted in impacts and immense amounts of debris upon our beaches, and the ongoing need to shore up the protective beach sand berms have literally created the need to rebuild major portions of our beachfront on a daily basis by our Marine beach maintenance team. LONG BEACH ANIMAL CARE SERVICES ADOPTION EVENTS IN APRIL

In effort to increase adoptions for long-term-stay animals,

Long Beach Animal Care Services (LBACS) hosted a series of free adoption events on weekends throughout April for community members of all ages to attend. The series kicked off on April 1 with an Easter Egg Hunt Adoption Event at the Long Beach Shelter. Guests enjoyed music, photos and springtime family-friendly activities like egg hunts, creating pet grams, egg decorating and bunny hoppy hour. The kickoff event will also include free adoption promotions. A total of 10 dogs were adopted at the event.

The One Health Day Adoption Event was held on April 7 at the Parks, Recreation and Marine Administration Offices. Attendees were able to adopt a pet with no adoption fee and learn about One Health, a Long Beach Health Department program being spotlighted in observance of National Public Health Week.

On April 8, the Silverado Park Adoption Fair was held in collaboration with the Office of Seventh District Councilmember Roberto Uranga All adoption fees were waived and information and resources about spay/neuter vouchers, pet licensing and pet laws was available.

Events are also scheduled at the Proper LBC store on April 15 and at Pet Supplies Plus on April 22 with zero adoption fees.

SUMMER AQUATIC CAMPS

Two aquatic day camps for youth will be offered this summer. The Belmont Junior Beach Camp, for ages 5 to 7, features games, crafts, beach play, songs, excursions, kayaking, canoeing and American Red Cross swimming lessons. Campers at Bayshore Beach Camp, for ages 8 to 12, will enjoy the same activities as the Belmont Junior Beach Camp in addition to marine biology lessons. PARKS, RECREATION & MARINE STRATEGIC PLAN GUIDING THE FUTURE

The Parks, Recreation and Marine (PRM) Strategic Plan will guide PRM's operational, staffing and budget decisions through 2032 and help to adapt park services as community needs evolve. In the first quarter of 2023, many notable achievements have been made in meeting plan goals.

SAFE, ACCESSIBLE PUBLIC SPACES

21 beachfront public restroom doors were replaced and painted.

Storm related damage was repaired in Shoreline Marina on Dock A.

A Park Ambassador Program is adding staff to to keep parks safe and usable by removing dumped items, litter, waste and encampments; and addressing park restroom health and safety.

125.5 tons of debris was removed from 293 encampment areas.

472 trees have been removed to improve safety in parks.

A total of 90, 213 square feet of community center floors, were stripped and waxed to provide a safe, healthy, and welcoming environment.

K9 Dog Park was renovated including installing a new composite wood path, repairing the drinking fountain and repainting the stucco planter improving park safety space.

HEALTH EQUITY

Marine Maintenance staff joined partners in painting 18 shipping containers to create a perimeter for the Safe Parking location for vehicle bound persons experiencing homelessness at Queensway Bay.

PARTNERSHIPS

Grounds Maintenance staff collaborated with Conservation Corp and Department of Developmental Services to plant 756 trees to help re-establish urban forest lost to drought and insect infestations.

Partnered with Long Beach Arts Council to complete murals in District 7 as part of the 7 for 7 art murals initiative.

PRM in partnership with the Los Angeles Galaxy Foundation, U.S. Soccer Foundation and Herbalife Nutrition, refurbished soccer mini pitches at DeForest Park in February.

SUSTAINABLE PARK ECOSYSTEM

Beach Maintenance staff have safeguarded life and property by maintaining the Peninsula Berm against an unprecedented volume of storm systems, high tides and wave action.

Since January 1 Beach Maintenance crews collected, dried and disposed of nearly 1,400 tons of debris created from a flush of the Los Angeles River into the Pacific Ocean coastal environment. A new pump and PVC piping was installed at Rainbow Lagoon that circulates water.

Maintenance staff with the Marine Bureau Landscape Contractor elevated the condition of turf grass and other planted areas at Harry Bridges Memorial Park to improve conditions for special events.

Grounds Maintenance staff has been working with local beekeepers to remove hives throughout the city and ensure that bees are protected while keeping public areas safe.

The irrigation system at Pan American Park was upgraded with new valves to conserve water.

Planting projects at Daisy Lane and Drake Chavez Parks improved green space and sustainability.

COMMUNITY TRANSPARENCY

M.L. King Jr. and Scherer Park Vision Plans will help gauge community priorities for future park improvements. Community surveys were conducted for 14th St. and Bixby Parks to prioritize needs.

FINANCIALLY SECURE AND RESILIENCY OPERATIONS

The occupancy rate for marina slips was 94 percent.

Louisiana Charlie's food service opened in the beach concession at Mother's Beach.

Used FY22 State surplus funds to begin the first phase of improvements for El Dorado Ballfields.

Received FY23 State surplus funds totaling \$15.4 million for improvements at El Dorado, Stearns Champions, and Houghton Parks.

A \$2M federal earmark received for the 51st St. Greenbelt in the FY23 federal budget advocated by Representative Nannette Barragan.

In March, the Long Beach City Council approved a \$6 million grant from the California Department of Boating and Waterways for revitalization of Davies Launch Ramp.
