Recommended Changes to the 2012 State Legislative Agenda

Each year, City staff reviews the State Legislative Agenda and recommends changes to the State Legislation Committee and the City Council to ensure that the agenda is up-to-date and addresses the legislative concerns of the City. The 2011 agenda was sent to all departments for their input. Attached for your review are staff's proposed changes. Below is a summary of those proposed changes, which helps explain why each deletion and addition is recommended.

BUSINESS GROWTH & WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

Item A: Workforce Development

The Department of Human Resources recommends several changes for the Workforce Development section of the 2012 Proposed State Legislative Agenda. These changes align with the adopted priorities of the Pacific Gateway Workforce Investment Board, of which Long Beach is a member.

It is recommended that Item 3 be deleted and revised into two separate items to reference specifically a regional industry approach to workforce development and educational partnerships. These new items are addressed in Item 6 and Item 7.

Item 5 is amended to include language specific to attracting, retaining or expanding jobs in the region, while promoting job growth among the Workforce Investment Board's adopted *Demand Sectors* – especially those that support the *Self Sufficiency Standard* and/or serve as a step on an established career pathway. This item retains existing language that supports well-paid green collar jobs.

Item 6 is amended to highlight the importance of regional approaches to workforce solutions, including planning, project delivery, operational efficiencies, and industry convening/research for the purposes of improving employability of workers in the region. This item retains existing language that supports educational successes and graduation rates.

Item 7 is added to highlight the importance of educational partnerships in workforce development, especially those that enhance the delivery of career pathways and technical education strategies for youth and low-skilled workers.

Item 8 is added to oppose state legislation that would limit the flexibility of federal Workforce Investment Act dollars.

Item 9 is added to support state incentives that increase the marketability of unemployed or under-employed workers.

Item 10 is added to support local small business development in Long Beach.

Item 11 is added to highlight specific populations in Long Beach who demonstrate a particular need for workforce development interventions. These populations include: emancipating foster youth, probationary youth, dropouts, military veterans and their spouses, re-entry populations, disabled individuals, older workers and transitioning dislocated workers.

COMMUNITY SAFETY

Item B: Public Safety & Crime Prevention

Item 1 was amended per the Fire Department to include language specific to maintaining local control of municipal public safety services; this includes emergency medical services.

Item 16 has been proposed to be moved from "Community Safety: Item B – Public Safety & Crime Prevention" to "Community Safety: Item C – Animal Care".

The Fire Department proposes the addition of Item 17 for the purposes of supporting legislation to authorize funding for regional interoperable public safety communications.

Item 18 from the 2011 Adopted State Legislative Agenda was deleted as recent rulings on existing guidance has enabled the Long Beach Health Department to redact social security numbers on informational death certificates in the interest of protecting social security information without the need for state legislation.

The Police Department proposes the addition of Item 18 for the 2012 Legislative Agenda to sponsor or support state legislation for the purposes of regulating second hand precious metal transfers and/or transactions.

Item C: Animal Care

Staff proposes to add Item C: Animal Care to the State Legislative Agenda under Community Safety to recognize legislative advocacy on behalf of the City's Animal Care Center.

Item 1 is existing language transferred from Item B: Public Safety & Crime Prevention. This item supports legislation that facilitates emergency planning and management efforts for animal rescue and sheltering in the event of a disaster.

Item 2 enables the City to support legislation that would require all dogs and cats to be microchipped prior to their release from any animal care center, or similar facility. This addition is consistent with the City Council's support for SB 702 (Lieu) on June 7, 2011. The Long Beach Animal Care Center currently operates under this practice per the City's local ordinance.

Item 3 enables the City to support legislation that allows non-profit organizations dedicated to animal care to establish a specialized license plate with the California

Department of Motor Vehicles for the benefit of animal spay and neuter programs, as supported by the City Council on July 7, 2011.

ENVIRONMENTAL

Item A: Climate Change

Item 3 is amended to include reference to cap-and-trade, landmark State regulations designed to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by creating a market for carbon credits.

Item C: Water Quality

Item 1 is amended to include lakes in the City's priorities for clean-up and capital improvements of impaired water bodies within the City.

Item 7 is added to support legislation that facilitates and/or provides funding for the implementation of low impact development best practices to capture stormwater at is sources. This action is consistent with the City's Sustainable Action Plan, which was adopted in 2010; as well as the City's Low Impact Development Ordinance, which applies to all new business developments.

Item N: Single Use Carryout Packaging/Bags

The title for Item N is amended to reflect single use carryout packaging.

Item 2 is amended to specifically include language to support legislation that bans the use of Styrofoam. This action is consistent with the City Council's vote to support SB 568 on June 7, 2011. If enacted, this legislation would prohibit food vendors from utilizing Styrofoam packaging materials for takeout or take-home consumables.

TRANSPORTATION

Item E: Alternative Transportation & Mobility

Item 5 is added to allow the City to support legislative efforts, participate in California Department of Transportation hearings, and/or provide public comments in support of naming the proposed bicycle and pedestrian path on the new Gerald Desmond Bridge after Mark Bixby. This action is consistent with the City Council's vote on April 19, 2011.

Item F: Transportation Funding

Item 7 is added to support legislation and initiatives that promote an equitable distribution of regional transportation dollars to cities. Legislation was proposed late in the 2011 legislative session to allow a metropolitan planning organization, subject to majority voter approval, to impose, for up to 30 years, a gas tax for transportation projects and programs that have been identified in the region's transportation plan as having a potential to reduce transportation congestion.

CHILDREN/YOUTH & EDUCATION

Item E: Children/Youth Education & Workforce Readiness

Item 8 is added to reflect the City Council decision to support AB 130 and AB 131 (Cedillo) in the 2011 State Legislative Session on June 7, 2011. This language allows the City to support legislation that would enable qualifying students to access financial aid for the purposes of education. AB 130 and AB 131 were enacted in 2011 and enables AB 540 students to access non-state and state financial aid, respectively, for the purposes of a higher education.

HOUSING

Item A: Housing

Item 1 is amended to remove language pertaining to Proposition 46. The City's Department of Development Services notes this funding source has been depleted.

Items 6 through 9 were added in response to City Council action on August 16, 2011. The Long Beach City Council unanimously voted to approve changes to the housing portion of the City's 2011 Legislative Agenda. These provisions were adopted to protect the City against State legislation to eliminate Redevelopment agencies and implement various housing reforms that could have detrimental effects on redevelopment and housing in Long Beach.

Item 10 is proposed for addition as general protection for local housing funds, and how the City currently uses these funds to provide affordable housing.

Item 11 is added to allow the City to support legislation that would modify redevelopment rents to bring them in line with California Housing and Community Development (HCD) and tax credit program rents. This will result in less complexity and confusion regarding the issue, and provide additional funds for housing. Item 6 is proposed by the Development Services Department.

REDEVELOPMENT

Item A: Redevelopment

Staff proposes to add a new section specifically for Redevelopment to the City's 2012 State Legislative Agenda. The purpose for this addition is to establish clear legislative positions regarding Redevelopment, an area of need the City Council has repeatedly taken action to protect against adverse State raids.

Item 1 is a transfer of existing language from the section on Additional Issues of State Legislative Importance, City Revenues.

Item 2 is a transfer of existing language from the section on Additional Issues of State Legislative Importance, City Revenues.

Item 3 through 4 have been added in response to City Council action on August 16, 2011. The Long Beach City Council unanimously voted to approve changes to the City's 2011 Legislative Agenda. These provisions were adopted to protect the City and Long Beach Redevelopment Agency against State legislation that may eliminate Redevelopment agencies statewide.

ADDITIONAL ISSUES OF STATE LEGISALTIVE IMPORTANCE

Item A: City Revenues

Items 6 and 7 pertain to Redevelopment. Staff proposes to move these items to the new Redevelopment section in the 2012 State Legislative Agenda.

Item Q: Form 700 Filing

Staff recommends technical amendments to the language in this item to be consistent with City Council action on September 6, 2011 regarding support for legislation to provide cities with ongoing authority to accept electronic filing of Statement of Economic Interest forms.

Item S: Alcoholic Beverage Control (ABC) License

Item S is added to allow the City to support or sponsor legislation to reclassify person-toperson ABC license transfers as a new ABC license, subject to regulation by the local jurisdiction. This item will provide the City with additional flexibility to manage ABC licensees in Long Beach.

NEXT STEPS

A State Legislation Committee meeting has been called for November 15, 2011 to review and discuss the recommended changes. City Council discussion and approval of the Committee's recommendations is expected to take place after the Committee takes action.
