#### **Introduction and Background:**

Since 2010, Centro C.H.A has supported the strategic direction of the Long Beach Violence Prevention Coalition to convene systems and community leaders around a "collective impact framework" focused on reducing violence, supporting positive youth development, and develop a set of shared principles and best practices across sectors and organizations.

One key best practice to emerge from the Long Beach Violence Prevention Coalition has been a focus on aligning a wide range of systems leaders and community partners around a strategic summer violence reduction strategy. Leadership, workforce and economic development and summer employment for youth and families in Central Long Beach has been the key focus of the Long Beach Violence Prevention Coalition with the goal of improving environmental conditions and health outcomes for vulnerable youth in Long Beach.

Our collaborative has demonstrated success in areas of reducing overall crime and violence in Neighborhoods where Be SAFE is offered by nearly half. The Long Beach VPC has also been instrumental in increasing summer employment opportunities for youth generating nearly 200 jobs over the recent summers (2010-2013).

Summer Safety Strategy like Be SAFE, Summer Night Lights, and Parks After Dark has become a national model, implemented first ever in the City of Los Angles under the direction of former Mayor Antonio Villaragosa known as Summer Night Lights through the Mayor's Gang Reduction Youth Development Initiative.

Long Beach Be SAFE Initiative (formally known has LB Summer Night Lights) offers communities in Long Beach solutions to prevent violence that includes a comprehensive approach to address broader environmental, and systems-level issues to produce a more effective strategy that builds on the shared strengths of organizations, and service providers concerned with preventing violence, and preventing chronic disease. Be SAFE hones in on the summer months when young people are particularly vulnerable, and builds on the public health approach to preventing violence. Instead of simply 'treating' violence after the fact, one arrest at a time, this approach focuses on what causes violence: it engages youth to create new opportunities for leadership and economic opportunity, and dismantles barriers to peaceful streets and connected neighbors. This initiative gives youth across the city of Long Beach-specifically youth between the ages of 16 and 24 - concrete tools that will offer opportunities instead of arrests. Youth in participating Be SAFE programs will be able to participate in job readiness, arts, music, community service and physical activity programs.

### **Building Stronger Communities**




46% of overall youth participants took part in 1 or more hours of physical activity

Our approach is key to building stronger and healthier communities through various parks and recreation services, summer youth employment for disadvantage youth, Adult Street Intervention workers trained in promoting peace and resolving community conflicts, healthy snack program, and various social and health education programs and services.






Men Achieving Goals in Their Communities (MAGIC) Art Program was offered at three park sites in Long Beach during the Summer including Admiral Kidd Park, Drake Park, and Martin Luther King Park. The Magic Program targets young men ages 15 and 25 who had been close to the streets, influenced by gangs and or involved in the criminal justice system to offer restorative practices and leadership development through the Arts. Harnessing the talents of young boys and men of color through a gender focused and popular education framework has been proven to foster wellness and personal transformation among young men of color, and reduce incidents of gang and youth on youth violence in neighborhoods most affected by poverty

2013 Be Safe Target Areas

In 2013 Be Safe expanded to 5 Park Sites including Admiral Kidd Park (Police Beat 2), Drake Park (Police Beat 6) Houghton Park (Police Beats 22 & 23), Scherer Park (Police Beat 19) and Martin Luther King Park (Police Beat 5). LBPD Crime Stat Data was lifted from multiple police reporting districts within each police beat. Data used from each reporting district was determined by proximity from park site and lack of green space within a geographic area.





# 2010-2013 Be SAFE Crime Stats Success by the Numbers

- Overall 20% reduction in aggravated assaults between 2010-2013\*
- In 2012 Be SAFE reported ZERO homicides during the summer months at all Be SAFE sites combined compared to a total of 10 homicides reported city-wide during July and August of 2012
- 50% reduction in reported homicides citywide in 2013 compared to summer 2012\*
- 64% reduction in overall Part 1 violent crimes compared to 2012 summer\* (Not including Houghton Park & Scherer Park)
- In 2013 Be SAFE sites combined made up less than 10% of the City's total reported violent crimes against persons.\* (Not including Houghton & Scherer Park)

\*Crime stats reported are from LBPD Crime Stats during summer period between July and August 2011-2013

Three summers combined (2011-2013), Be SAFE served over **90,400** healthy meals and Snacks.

### **Expanding Our Efforts to North Long Beach**

In 2013 the Long Beach Violence Prevention Coalition approached The California Endowment to request funding support to continue building upon the success of the Long Beach Summer Night Lights (SNL) Initiative. But the challenge of funding to support SNL fully posed a threat to keep the initiative alive. In May of 2013 City Council approved allocation of 10% of one-time oil surplus funds to support summer park recreation programming for youth. This marked a new partnership between the LB VPC and Long Beach Department of Parks, Recreation, Marine to join forces and keep SNL running strong under the new name Be SAFE. This collaboration proved to be successful as Be SAFE expanded from 3 parks sites in Central Long Beach to 5 including Houghton Park and Scherer Park under the leadership of Long Beach Community Action Partnership, Men Making a Change. Overall the program reduced the number of incidents of violent related crimes, and brought much needed resources to two park neighborhoods that lacked services for youth development.
