Maintenance Operations Stares Down "LB Surge"



Parks, Recreation and Marine Beach and Marine Maintenance staff worked diligently during the last week of August and from September 6-9 to ensure the safety of homeowners in the low laying Peninsula area of the city, and to maintain safe conditions on the beachfront.

Hurricane Marie from Central America had generated storm surges that put the Peninsula area at risk for flooding. While the large wave action attracted surfers and hundreds of on-lookers, residents were asked to keep their distance from the dangerous waters and the heavy



equipment that was reinforcing sand berms. City Lifeguards reported that water rescues were up almost 400 percent during the surge period compared to a typical August day.

The PRM staff coordinated efforts with Public

Works, Long Beach Fire and volunteers from the Community Emergency Response Teams (CERT) and the Long Beach Search and Rescue Explorer Program, who distributed information fliers to households and assisted with crowd control and the closure of the Peninsula to non-residents.

As the LB Surge surged, staff worked around the clock to fortify sand berms, install plywood along the Penin-

sula, and assist with the distribution of sand for sandbags. Elvira Hallinan Appointed Manager of Marine Operations



George Chapjian, Director of Long Beach Parks, Recreation and Marine has appointed Elvira Hallinan as Manager of Marine Operations for the City of Long Beach, effective August 23, 2014.

Ms. Hallinan was selected after the completion of a nationwide ex-

ecutive search. She has extensive experience working with marina operations including Marine Maintenance, Marine Safety/Lifeguards and Marine Patrol, as well as retail tenants, live-a-boards and the citizen Marine Advisory Commission. Ms. Hallinan has been instrumental in the \$109 million rebuild of the Alamitos Bay Marina, which opened in the 1950s with 1,900 boat slips. The Long Beach Marine Operations Bureau manages the nation's largest municipal marina system with three marinas, 3,600 boat slips and five launch ramps.

Ms. Hallinan has served as Acting Manager of Marine Operations since September 2013. Ms. Hallinan began her career with the City of Long Beach as a Management Assistant in 1989 and worked as an Administrative Analyst for the Department of Parks, Recreation and Marine, and later in the City Budget Office. In 1998 she was appointed Administrative Officer for the Department of Library Services. She left City service for a few years to raise a family, and returned in 2007 to the Department of Parks, Recreation and Marine as an Administrative Analyst in their Contract Management Division. She was promoted to Special Projects Officer in the Marine Bureau in June 2010 before taking over as Acting Manager of Marine Operations.

Ms. Hallinan holds a bachelor's degree in Sociology and a Masters of Public Administration from the University of Texas at El Paso.

Why is Water Running in a Park?

Long Beach Parks, Recreation and Marine (PRM) is taking the lead in water conservation in the City by working to limit water waste and boost water conservation.

PRM strives to water within the times perscribed by the Long Beach Water Department, on Mondays, Thursdays



and Saturdays before 9 a.m. and after 4 p.m. If you see watering in parks outside of these times, irrigation system maintenance and repair may be underway. The yellow repair signs on site will let you know the status.

Report Park Water Waste on Go Long Beach App



While Parks, Recreation and Marine staff strives to minimize water waste, the public's assistance is still needed to report instances of water running down sidewalks or water line breaks. A convenient

way to communicate park water waste is with the Go Long Beach App and the issue choice, "running water in a park."

The GO Long Beach App allows Long Beach residents, businesses, and visitors the opportunity to access City Hall, 24-hours a day, seven days a week, from anywhere. It is possible to quickly submit service requests for "running water in a park," as well as other issues such as potholes and graffiti. iPhone and Android device users can use the App to select an issue, take a picture, and submit. The App knows the exact location and sends the issue to city staff. Persons can also track the status of requests through their mobile device.

Go Long Beach is available on iTunes and Google Play as a free download. Go Long Beach can be accessed on the City website, http://user.govoutreach.com/longbeach.

Know Your Long Beach Park: Valparaiso Plaza

The .48-acre Valparaiso Plaza sits on a portion of what was formerly Bixby Park. When the beach parking lot was constructed in 1968, Junipero Avenue was extended down the bluff to access the parking lot, separating this half-acre lot from the rest of Bixby Park.

Beachgoers on their way to Junipero Beach pass a canon perched on the bluff that points out over the ocean. The canon guarded the City of Valparaiso for over 100 years and their citizens donated the canon to Long Beach in 1976 as a symbol of the strength of the sister city relationship between the two cities. In the same year, the Long Beach City Council renamed this area of Bixby Park Valparaiso Plaza.
