Belmont Temporary Pool Receives American Public Works Association Award

The American Public Works Association Southern California Chapter named the Belmont Temporary Pool "Project of the



Year." The 50-meter pool was recognized in the Creative and Innovative Category for demonstrating resourcefulness and the use of imagination.

The Belmont Plaza Pool was found structurally unsafe and permanently closed to the public in February 2013. Plans are underway to replace the permanent structure with a state-of-the-art aquatics facility.

The temporary pool was designed with materials that can be reused or sold. Other pool components were designed for reuse, including mechanical equipment, light fixtures, bike racks, and a portable restroom and shower trailer.

The temporary pool is equipped with a moveable bulkhead, and is programmed for a variety of swim events. The pool was designed and installed in only 10 months, and opened on December 19, 2013.

The Imagine Houghton website, is now available to provide information about the replacement of the Houghton Park Community Center. The original Community Center was built in 1930, updated in 1959, and expanded in 1987. While it has served residents well, it is time for a new Houghton Park Community Center. Visit

PARK FACILITY NEWS Year in Review

During 2014, Long Beach Parks, Recreation and Marine (LBPRM) accomplished many projects that improved the quality of life for Long Beach residents.

New Parks and Recreation Facilities

In February, Coolidge Park received a refurbished basketball court and a new playground funded by the Los Angeles Clippers FIT Program, and The California Endowment. A Fitness Zone was funded through Long Beach Health & Human Services.



LBPRM improved physical fitness options for residents by opening "fitness zones" at Coolidge Park in February and at 14th Street Park in March with outdoor exercise equipment.

The 1.5-acre El Dorado Dog Park opened on February 8 and the .25-acre Coolidge Dog Park opened on March 22 and to make a total of eight dog recreation areas in the City.

The revitalized Chittick Field sports complex opened on April 23 with a football field, all-weather track, three soccer fields, restrooms, bleachers, sports lighting, landscaping and parking.

A Tot Lot was added at Loma Vista Park in June, to enhance the .14-acre site.

In August, the California Department of Housing and Community Development Housing-Related Parks grant program announced that LBPRM will receive \$553,000 from to replace the playground, install fitness equipment and rehabilitate the grounds and facilities at MacArthur Park.





The Orizaba Park Community Center opened on August 2 to provide space for recreation programs and a digital training academy. The energy efficient building was designed to achieve a LEED Gold certification. The building was funded with \$2.2 million in Proposition 84 funds.

On October 26 the public was invited to a "closing ceremony" at the Belmont Plaza Pool before demolition began in November.

In November the Bixby Park Bluff renovation was completed with new staircases and ADA accessible path to the beach.

Plans are underway to replace the 80-year old Houghton Park Community Center. A community meeting was held in November to discuss proposed designs and amenities.



In December, the renovation of Miracle on 4th Street Park was completed and included new walkways, landscaping, playground surfacing and tetherball court.

Awards and Recognitions

El Dorado Park was recognized as one of the "Top 30 great inspiring inner-city parks in the Country,' by socialworkdegreeguide.com, an on-line resource for career options in the field of Social Work.

The American Public Works Association named the Belmont Temporary Pool "Project of the Year" in the Creative and Innovative Category for demonstrating resourcefulness and imagination.

Recreational Opportunities for All Residents

El Dorado Nature Center promoted stewardship of our natural resources with beach cleanups on Earth Day in April and for California Coastal Cleanup Day in September. At both events, hundreds of volunteers removed trash from beaches and waterways.

For the fifth year in a row, LBPRM and the Long Beach Convention and Visitor's Bureau facilitated the "100 Days of Summer," campaign to encourage residents to "stay and play" in Long Beach between Memorial Day and Labor Day.

More than 1,800 people came to Whaley Park on June 20 to sing-a-long to the movie "Frozen," part of the 9th annual "Movies in the Park" program sponsored by Signal Hill Petroleum in partnership with Partners of Parks.



LBPRM offered 10 weeks of summer day camps with sports, arts, and aquatics programming at nine locations. The free Summer Fun Days recreation program was offered at 26 parks. Seven parks were open for extended hours during the week for recreation activities and Library programs as part of the "Summer Activities in a Friendly Environment," Be S.A.F.E. program.

LBPRM served approximately 110,000 free meals from June 23 - August 22 at 22 parks, two Signal Hill parks and six non-profit organizations as part of the U.S.D.A. Summer Food Service program.

More than 2,000 youth from 32 Day Camp and Summer Fun Day sites enjoyed a day at the beach on August 8 with sports, dance contests, sand sculptures, and water play.

On October 11, 150 Junior Beach Runner (JBR) program youth from eight Long Beach Unified School District WRAP

programs ran in the Aquarium of the Pacific Kids One Mile Fun Run. The JBR program increases knowledge about healthy foods and physical activity.

Technological Advances

In April LBPRM initiated the "Rec Connect," online class registration and facility reservations system. The system provides easy access for credit card payments and viewing account activity.

LBPRM added a new category on the GO Long Beach Mobile App, "Running water in a park," to enable citizens to report the water waste issues to staff.



Partnerships

In July, Animal Care Services transported 150 shelter dogs to the Washington state for adoption. Transport fees were donated by the Wings of Rescue, Bark Avenue Foundation and Shelter Me non-profit organizations.

Maintenance Operations

In September LBPRM Beach and Marine Maintenance staff worked around the clock to fortify sand berms, and install plywood along the Peninsula to ensure the safety of homeowners during storm surges from Hurricane Marie.

Several capital improvement and maintenance projects were completed in 2014. Irrigation systems were assessed citywide. A total of 14 park and street medians were improved with drought tolerant landscaping, new trees and irrigation system improvements. More than 44,000 square feet of park walkways were replaced or repaired. Baseball field renovations were completed at two sites, sports court resurfacing at ten parks, restroom upgrades at 10 locations, and roofing replacements were done at five parks.

Parks, Recreation and Marine hosted several community holiday events in December. Houghton Park's fifth annual "Breakfast with Santa" on December 20 delighted hundreds of residents who enjoyed a delicious breakfast, a sing-along, face painting, balloon animals, family pictures and holiday performances.



Every year the Houghton Park seniors look forward to the park's Holiday Craft Bonanza. This is a opportunity to create seasonal wreaths, garlands, table centerpieces and holiday cards. The seniors had fun socializing and all went home with projects to decorate their

homes for the holidays.

More than 300 people attended Silverado Park's pancake breakfast on December 13. Everyone had fun participating in crafts, carni-games, super bouncers and meeting Santa Claus took pictures with kids sitting on an sleigh.

El Dorado Nature Center Entryway Improvement Project

Final concept designs for a new entryway into El Dorado Nature Center were presented at the Nature Center on December 10 by AHBE Landscape Architects, the Department of Public Works and the Department of Parks, Recreation and Marine. The design was based on feedback received from the community at stake-



holder meetings and from an on-line survey.

When the project is completed, visitors will see new entrances leading to the museum building and to a new children's exploration area. There will be another entrance just for school tours to lead to the amphitheater area. The improvements will also include a renovated amphitheater with seating for 150, a new pedestrian bridge, a new perimeter fence and added fence along Willow Street, and improvements to the museum.

Funding for the project comes from a grant from the Rivers and Mountains Conservancy and one-time infrastructure funds allocated in the 2014 budget. The work is scheduled to begin late June with completion by end of December 2015.

MAINTENANCE OPERATIONS

PRM Maintenance Staff Prepared for Pacific Storm

On December 12, PRM Maintenance staff were busy ensuring the safety of Long Beach parks, beaches and facilities as a powerful Pacific storm brought heavy rainfall and strong wind gusts.

Beach Maintenance crews prepared by fortifying sand berms on the beach, and maintaining storm run-off culverts.

Marine Maintenance staff installed debris booms to prevent trash from entering the marina areas, and installed plugs in the Naples sea wall to prevent flooding,

Throughout the City, grounds maintenance staff was busy clearing fallen trees, branches, debris and signs.

Facility Maintenance patched leaky roofs and filled holes in





parking lots and walkways.

With Chittick Field being an active storm water management facility, staff removed soccer posts and other equipment in anticipation of the bowl being filled with water. Even though the pumps can clear the basin in about an hour, the site remained closed for 7-10 days to allow the dirt road and turf areas to dry.

The El Dorado Nature Center closed their trails for the day due to muddy conditions.

It takes a team effort to be sure the residents of Long Beach have safe visits to our public recreational spaces in rain or shine.
