#### PRM Hosts 2016 "Beach Streets Downtown"



On March 19, Parks, Recreation and Marine helped to make the City's Beach Streets Downtown event a success. Residents walked, biked, skated, dined, shopped and socialized along streets temporarily closed to traffic including the four-mile Broadway corridor from Pine Avenue to Euclid Avenue, and sections of Pine Avenue, Linden Avenue, Cherry Avenue and Fourth Street. The goal of repurposing streets for cyclists and pedestrians was to showcase how streets can be used to promote environmental, social, economic, and public health goals.

An all-day fair at Bixby Park was at the heart of the action. Staff coordinated healthy, active-living activities, booths, giveaways and information about PRM programs, as well as services from the Department of Health and Human Services, Fire, Police, and Library. Giant moon bounces and the newly opened Camp Bixby playground and Bixby Fitness Loop were very popular.

The Homeland Cultural Center conducted a break dancing workshop on Fourth Street's Retro Row with a DJ and enthusiastic participants.

Along the route the public enjoyed block parties, concerts, yoga classes, a community festival, kid's zones, food tastings, a canine agility course, bike tuning stations, a photo booth, the Aquarium on Wheels and more.

#### New MacArthur Park Playground & Renovated Homeland Center Celebrated



The public joined Councilmember Dee Andrews and the Departments of Parks, Recreation and Marine and Public Works at a Grand Opening Celebration for the MacArthur Park Playground and renovated Homeland Cultural Center located at 1321 Anaheim Street, on March 26.



The playground includes bright new play structures for both two-to-five-year-old and five-to-twelve-year-old youth, including swings, a climber, and slides that provide opportunities to slide, swing, climb, and twirl. The

playground's modern, multicolored theme symbolizes the vibrant multicultural neighborhood surrounding the park.

The renovation to the Homeland Cultural Center includes restroom upgrades and renovations to the former library room, kitchen, music area and social hall which received new ceilings, floors, equipment, lighting, and paint. The work has created a more functional and contemporary space for the facility's users to call home. In his remarks at the opening, Councilmember Andrews said, "The award-winning Homeland Cultural Center is a place where people of all backgrounds experience art and share ethnic traditions."

The playground and facility improvements were made possible by a \$553,050 Housing Related Parks Grant from the California Department of Housing and Community Development as well as \$13,300 in one-time funds from Councilmember Dee Andrews.

A groundbreaking ceremony was held for the Locust Avenue Tot Lot at 2331 Locust Avenue on March 19. The public joined Mayor Robert Garcia, Councilmember Dee Andrews and staff from the Departments of Parks, Recreation and Marine and Public Works for the event.

The Locust Tot Lot will feature the installation of a play area and seating area on the 4,050 square foot property at 2331 Locust Avenue. The play area will include a colorful play structure for two-to-five year old youth, with climbing and exploratory features and a slide. The playground will also feature a set of swings, safety surfacing, and a series of interactive play panels. The seating area will include two benches and two picnic tables connected by an ADA accessible walkway, as well as a bike rack, trees and mulch.

"I am excited to see the development of more recreational open space in the central area of Long Beach," said Mayor Garcia. "The residents in the neighborhood will have a new much-needed place to play with their children and enjoy the outdoors with their neighbors."

The installation of the Tot Lot is expected to begin in late spring of 2016 and be completed in the fall. The play-ground design was unveiled at this event and guests saw a preview of where the equipment will be placed.



The seventh Fitness Zone in the City of Long Beach opened to the public on April 2 at Cesar Chavez Park. An official ribbon cutting for the Chavez Park Fitness Zone and Loop was held at the park with Councilwoman Lena Gonzales, members of the community including the Willmore City Heritage Association, and staff from the Departments of Parks, Recreation and Marine, and Public Works.

The Fitness Zone is approximately 960 square feet and located near the Tot Lot, north of Fifth Street. It features six pieces of self-use exercise equipment, including three pieces that are ADA accessible; all are designed so users can engage in healthy physical activity free of charge. The Fitness Loop includes a circuit utilizing the equipment and a walking route through the park.

Funding for the improvements included \$55,000 from one-time infrastructure funds from the Office of Councilwoman Gonzalez, and \$7,020 from a Greenfields Playground Equipment Grant.

Residents can also exercise on free outdoor exercise equipment at Admiral Kidd, Coolidge, Orizaba, 14th Street, Bixby and Houghton Parks.

# Foot Golf "Kicks Off" at Little Rec



Recreation Park 9-Hole Golf Course (Little Rec.) at 5000 E. Seventh Street has expanded its programming to include FootGolf, a hybrid of golf and soccer that has increased in popularity in the U.S. in recent years. Like golf, the FootGolf player furthest from the 21-inch wide cup is the first to kick the ball. Players try to get the ball in the cup with as few kicks as possible.

The public came out on March 12 to try it at the opening day of a six-month trial period. City Councilmember Suzie Price, Parks, Recreation and Marine, and American Golf staff welcomed eager players to experience the fun of this exciting new sport.

FootGolf tee times are interspersed with those playing traditional golf. One group of golfers will tee off and then the next group could be FootGolfers. FootGolfers will tee off in the same area as golfers, but kick soccer balls to a different green at least 30 to 40 yards from the golf green.

The FootGolf rates are the same as traditional golf at the course. For Long Beach residents, nine-hole rates are:

Adult M-F \$12

Adult Weekend \$14 J<u>unior M-F</u> \$6 Junior Weekend \$9 If FootGolf proves to be successful through the trial run, the sport will have a permanent home at Recreation Park 9-hole Golf Course. FootGolf has been successfully implemented in other Southern California golf courses including in Lake Forest, Tecolote Canyon, Oxnard, and San Diego. There are about 240 FootGolf courses nationwide according to the American FootGolf League, the game's U.S. governing body.

# **Community Recreation Services Update**





PRM staff built a display house to collect the items, and wound up donating \$150 in cash and gift cards and over 100 items from the house's wish list.



## **Marine Bureau Update**

#### Jordan High School "Panthers At Sea" Learning Life and Sailing Skills



The Panthers at Sea program was begun in 1998 by science teacher David Braunstein with 45 students from Jordan High School. He wanted to share his passion for sailing with his students, and the program has since expanded to nearly 100 students.

Along with a representative from the Long Beach Unified School District, small groups of students are assigned to a private sailing yacht after safety training and requirements are met. Volunteer skippers share their home waters with the students along with their experience and sailing wisdom. Students learn about teamwork and goal setting, as well as sailing skills.

Co-chair of the Panthers at Sea, James Townes, said that being in the water broadens the student's understanding of the sea and gets them interested in science, technologies, engineering and math. Townes intends to expand the Panther at Sea program to the Students at Sea, encompassing all interested Long Beach Unified High School students who wish to participate.

This year's program will culminate with a day-long sailing

excursion out of Long Beach Harbor on May 7 for youth, led by expert crews. The public can support the Panther's "adopt-a-student" program with a donation of \$20 to cover the cost of lunch and a T-shirt for one student on the day of the event.
