#### **Class Instructor Spotlight: Moria Hahn - Art**



Moria Hahn teaches Illustrative Watercolor at El Dorado Park West. Her father served in WWII in China, and collected cloisonné and sculptures, and photographed rural people and lifestyles near his Army post. A favorite uncle sent care packages of

Japanese art, toys and apparel while stationed in Osaka. These influences sparked her interest in Asian art. Staff recently interviewed Moria about her passion for art.

#### Q: How did you get into Art?

**A:** I've drawn, and have been exposed to great art, since early childhood. I'm descended from artists on both sides of the family, so my folks didn't discourage me from pursuing art as a career.

Q: How were you inspired to become an Art Instructor?

A: I have taught art and exhibited my work throughout Southern California for 25 years. It's in several museum collections, including the Long Beach Museum of Art. It gives me great pleasure to see my students' work in magazines, exhibitions, conventions, and on social media, and to realize I may have contributed, in some small way, to their success.

Q: How do you feel your work impacts the community?

A: I've taught art and exhibited art in Long Beach and Southern California for 25 years. I had a large solo exhibition at the Cultural Alliance of Long Beach Gallery, downtown on Pine Avenue, which included a display showing how Japanese woodblock prints are made. I have participated in educational activities about Japanese art and culture for the first annual Long Beach Cherry Blossom Festival. My art is in the permanent collection of the Long Beach Museum of Art. One piece was displayed in the "Museum Menagerie" exhibition in 2013. I gave a talk for the Long Beach Museum docents last year, and taught a weekend watercolor workshop there. The successes of my students are evidence of impacting and improving the community.

# Q: What do you like most about working with the Long Beach community?

**A:** Long Beach has wonderful social diversity. It also offers a variety of interesting destinations for field trips, including the Aquarium of the Pacific, Rancho Los Alamitos, museums, beaches, the harbor and parks.

**Q: Tell our readers why they should attend your class. A:** My class offers original, effective techniques to make creative work stand out, in illustration or fine art. Students have told me that though they've studied for years, they'd never been shown some of the methods I teach. Beginners

and experienced artists are equally at home in my classes.

# **Know Your Long Beach Parks: Baker Street Park**



Baker Street Park at 625 Baker Street at Golden Avenue opened on May 4 2013 and provides 1.35 acres of open space and recre-

ational amenities for Long Beach's Wrigley neighborhood.

The park's amenities include picnic areas, a universally accessible playground and a walking path. A colorful monument highlights the history of the parkland's former owners, the Encinas family, one of California's early pioneering families and that used the land to operate a large ranch and farm.

The park project was funded with \$500,000 from the Los Angeles County Park District, \$100,000 from Long Beach Container Terminal Inc. and park impact fees. Partners of Parks accepted the \$100,000 donation from the Long Beach Container Terminal Inc., to add a small universally accessible playground, and further Partners of Park's goal for all youth to have full access at Long Beach parks.





The land you are standing on was once part of a large ranch and farm, pictured above, that belonged to one of California's early processing families, the Encins: In the rariy 1900s the land was purchased from the Bidly family who were owners of the vast Rancho Los Alamitos and Rancho Los Carritos. The original ranch boundaries extended north from the lanation to just south of San Antonio Dove and from the Bue Line track on the east to Golden Avenue on the west.

Several generations of Encines' level and worked on this land. The family operated a dairy and a rising academy, grew large quantities of alfulfa, and farmed bests along with other important crops. The Encinas' personal history and memories are deeply intertwined in what was once their family's home, and the family's stories stand as a reminder of what times were like before Long Beach was transformed into a major urban city.



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# **Touch a Truck Event Showcases PRM Vehicles**

Third District Councilwoman Suzie Price and Justin Rudd of the non-profit Community Action Team, produced the second "Touch a Truck" event on May 1. More than 10,000 people had fun getting up close to all types of big trucks and rolling equipment. ## Living With Urban Coyotes



Recent coyote activity around Long Beach and surrounding areas gives reason for reminding residents of important safeguards to protect pet lives and property against these wild animals. It is important to learn techniques to

compassionately co-exist with coyotes and protect yourself and your pets.

· Never feed coyotes or any other wildlife.

• Keep pets and pet food inside. If feeding outside, feed pets during the day (no more than one hour) and remove the food bowl when the pet finishes eating.

• Stay close to your pet when taking them outdoors and always keeping them on a leash, especially from dusk through the early morning hours.

• Use "hazing" techniques to shoo away coyotes, such as standing tall, yelling and waving arms while approaching the coyote; using a whistle, air horn, bell or other device; banging pots or pans together; stomping your feet; using a water hose, pepper spray, or throwing tennis balls or rocks at the coyote.
