Long Beach Parks, Recreation & Marine Celebrates "Parks Make Life Better Month"





LBPRM Fall Class Registration Going On Now



This fall, Long Beach Parks, Recreation & Marine (LBPRM) has new classes for youth and teens to inspire creativity, strengthen academic skills and provide active fun. Among the many adult offerings available is the new Open Water SCUBA Diver Certification course.

New Classes for Youth LBPRM offers options for creative fun, such as

Homeschool Art at Averyboo Arts for children ages 7-12 to gain knowledge in history, math, geography and science through art. Children ages 8-12 can write, direct, film and star in a horror movie in Incrediflix's Scary Movie Live Action Flix and learn about stop motion animation in Scary Movie Stop Motion class and young bakers ages 9-13 will find Creative Decorating for pastries at El Dorado Park West is fun and delicious.

New dance classes at the Long Beach Dance Centre include **Ballet & Tap Combo**, covering introductory ballet and tap techniques for children ages 5-8 and **Beginning Jazz** for children ages 6-9 to learn fundamental jazz steps and movement combinations. **Musical Theatre Stars!** at Recreation Park, teaches children ages 5-12 musical theatre dance styles and connects the emotions of songs to choreography. The **Teen's Dance Workshop** at the Long Beach Dance Academy for children ages 12-16 includes barre and center technique and **Mexican Folk Dance** — at Veterans Park for teens ages 13⁺ will teach footwork for dances from Mexico and Spain. Students ages 8-17 can learn to play the **Guitar** at Whaley Park on Wednesday nights in September, October and November.

LBPRM enrichment classes support learning. Children ages 7-12 can learn grammar and editing, as well as practice narrative, persuasive, compare/contrast and expository writing in **Experiential Writing** at the Cypress Community Center. Students ages 7-12 can create narrative essays with quirky characters, twisty plots, descriptive dialogue and unique settings in **Narrative Writing** also at the Cypress Community Center. **Spanish Adventurous Saturday** for adventures ages 4-11 immerses youngsters in the Spanish language and culture with crafts, music, stories and games. **Spanish Movement and Art K-3** for children ages 5-1 teaches the language with increasing levels of listening, speaking, reading and writing. Both classes will be offered at Bixby Park.

LBPRM encourages children and teens to stay active. This fall students ages 6-17 can learn discipline and self-defense, Muay Thai Kick Boxing, Brazilian Jiu Jitsu and wrestling in **Mixed Martial Arts-White Belt. Mixed Martial Arts-Upper Belt** will offer advanced training. Both classes will be held at El Dorado Park West. Students ages 5-15 will learn Itosu-Ryu in **Traditional Karate**, with self-discipline and respect. Classes will be held at at El Dorado Park West and Recreation Park. Kids ages 5-13 can advance their **Skateboarding** skills in classes offered at Heartwell Park.

Long Beach Parks, Recreation and Marine Promotes "Liveability"

The cover of the Long Beach Parks, Recreation and Marine (LBPRM) fall "Recreation Connection" features images of "Liveability" which includes "Swimability," "Bikeability," and "Walkability," to help promote a healthy active lifestyle.



Swimability

With three City pools and the use of three LBUSD high school pools in the summer, LBPRM offers swimming instruction for ages nine months to adult, giving all residents the ability to be "swimable." A new 500-yard open water buoy line opened in Alamitos Bay in June that features marked buoys every 100 yards, starting near Second Street and ending east of the Bay Shore Swimming Pier. New water quality signage and swim ladders on public docks will increase safety and help swimmers get in and out of the water at Alamitos Bay Landing, Naples Island, Mother's Beach, Davies Launch Ramp, and the Bay Shore Swimming Pier.



Walkability

Long Beach is listed in the top ten list of the Most Walkable Cities in the United States according to Redfin Real Estate Company's Walk Score®, ranking of the most walkable

U.S. cities with populations of more than 300,000. Many City parks have walking trails including:

USDA Summer Food Service Program

Long Beach Parks, Recreation and Marine helps to fill the nutrition gap during the summer for children who qualify for free and reduced-price meals during the regular school year with the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Summer Food Service program. Free meals, that meet Federal nutrition guidelines, are provided to all children 18 years old and under at 32 sites including 26 parks, one library, two Signal Hill parks and three non-profit organizations from June 20 through August 24. Meals are also provided, as needed, for youth attending field trips. Staff expects to serve approximately 110,000 meals this summer.

Know Your Long Beach Parks: Bayshore Park

Bayshore Park at 5415 E. Ocean Blvd. is a hub for aquatics and sports, as well as a great open space area for all ages to enjoy. The 1.24-acre park adjoins Alamitos Bay between 54th Place and the Leeway Sailing Center. It opened in 1934, and includes basketball, handball, and paddle tennis courts, playground equipment, a restroom and concessions.

Beach concessions are available for food, and rentals for kayaks and stand-up paddleboards. The Bayshore Co-op Preschool is located at the site, and operates from a building that was moved to the site in 1946 from the Long Beach Harbor.

In 1994, the paddle tennis court was converted to a roller hockey court. During the summer, the Long Beach Junior Roller Derby trains girls and boys to compete in amateur roller derby competitions. Adult Roller Hockey leagues play on Saturdays and Sundays, and free pick-up roller hockey games take place on Sundays at 10 a.m.

Recently, Marine Maintenance staff added pickleball lines to the paddle tennis courts to accommodate a growing number of people who want to play this fast-paced sport that combines elements of tennis, badminton and ping-pong.

The magazine noted that the very affordable 54-par course is great for youth who are just learning the game or honing their skills. The facility has a number of junior classes and camps, and has an accessible driving range, practice putting green and chipping area.



Three New Members Selected for the Long Beach Golf Hall of Fame

The Long Beach Golf Hall of Fame, created in 1996 to recognize individuals who "left their mark on Golf in Long Beach," welcomed three new members on July 31 at an Induction Ceremony following Long Beach Open golf tournament at El Dorado Park Golf Course (GC). The 2016 inductees are Brianna Do, Joe Grohman and Gary Wishon.



Brianna Do – was born in Long Beach and attended Wilson High School, where she won the Moore League Individual title, led the Bruins to League Championships each year she played, and finished

2nd individually in the State CIF. She was twice named an AJGA All American and was selected as a member of the 2007 Junior Solheim Cup team before accepting a golf scholarship to UCLA. At UCLA, she was twice selected to the All Pac 12 conference team and was part of UCLA's 2011 National Championship team. Also in 2011, she won the US Women's Amateur Public Links Championship at the Old MacDonald course at Bandon Dunes. In her first year as a professional on the Symmetra Tour she made four of 11 cuts. In her second year, she had seven top-10 finishes and ended the year 3rd with privileges on the LPGA Tour in 2016. During the Portland LPGA event she qualified to play in the 2016 RICOH Women's British Open.



Joe Grohman –has been the head golf professional and general manager at Navy Golf Course in Cypress since 1998, and was a professional at Heartwell Park Golf Course from 1995 to 1998. Joe conducts clinics and functions that introduce the golf to youth, veterans, Wounded Warriors and people with special needs, often in conjunction with the Long Beach VA Hospital. Joe has

served on the Board of Directors for the Southern California Section of the PGA of America as well as the Section's Metro Chapter. He has won the USGA's 2001 Course and Junior Program "Best in the Nation" award and the 2010 Armed Forces Recreation Special Citation Award - US Navy, the military's highest honor for civilian recreation employees. He received the Southern California PGA's President's Award in 2012 and was the Section Golf Professional of the Year in 2013.



Long Beach native **Gary Wishon** played golf for Wilson High School and Long Beach City College where he was named to the All Metro Conference team in 1969 and 1970. As a professional he apprenticed under Long Beach Golf Hall of Famers

Monty Blodgett at El Dorado Park GC and Pinky Stevenson at Virginia Country Club (CC), gaining his PGA membership in 1978. Wishon served as Head Professional at Virginia CC until 1991. He became the Head Professional at Chalk Mountain GC and received a degree in Landscape Architecture from Cal Poly San Luis Obispo in 1999. With fellow Long Beach Golf Hall of Famer Rudy Duran, he created the River Oaks GC (six-hole player development course) in Paso Robles in 2004. Gary returned to Long Beach in 2011 as the Head Golf Professional at Recreation Park 18 GC, and consulted on the renovation of the "Big Rec," bunkering, and gave input on tree plantings and architectural concepts at all Long Beach courses. Gary was the runner up in the 1989 So Cal PGA Section Championship, and in the Section's stroke and match play Four Ball Championships. Gary has served on several SCPGA Committees and the Section Board of Directors. He is considered an excellent golf instruc-

With the addition of these three individuals, the Long Beach Golf Hall of Fame now has 81 members.
