Greenbelt Heights Improvement Project Grand Opening



A Grand Opening celebration was held on September 10 for the first phase of the greenbelt improvement project along the Pacific Electric Right of Way (PE ROW) between

7th and 8th Streets near Roswell Avenue.

Residents enjoyed musical entertainment and refreshments while viewing the project which includes native and drought tolerant trees and shrubs, benches and natural seating areas, and a 10-foot-wide decomposed granite pathway, that enhances Long Beach's "walkability" and "bikeability" by adding routes for walkers and cyclists.

Greenbelt Heights is the first completed project of the Pacific Electric Right of Way South Master Plan, for the development of the former Pacific Electric Red Car rail line into an area with recreational amenities. The project construction cost of \$254,000 was funded by the City Gas Tax.

The project is divided into five phases: Fourth and Park, Park to Ximeno, Ximeno to Termino, Termino to Mira Mar, and Mira Mar to Loma. The next project to be started is the Park to Ximeno section.

California Coastal Cleanup Day A Big Success



September 17 marked another successful Coastal Cleanup Day in Long Beach. El Dorado Nature Center partnered with the California Coastal Commission to coordinate cleanups at Alamitos Bay Marina, Sea Scout Base, the Peninsula,

Belmont Pier, Bluff Park, and Cherry Beach. Joining in the effort as site captains were the Aquarium of the Pacific, the Seal Beach Yacht Club, the Long Beach Marine Institute, Clean LB, and the Long Beach Water Department.

In just three hours, over 1,400 volunteers removed 4,500 pounds of debris from our coastline. Three large groups joined in the cleanup efforts at our main Belmont Pier site. ARLA, Tokio Marine Management, and You Think rallied volunteers from all over Southern California.

Community organizations joined El Dorado Nature Center to educate the public about issues related to marine debris, wildlife, and the health of our coastline. 

Colorado Lagoon Improvements Continue



Additional improvements are underway at Colorado Lagoon to create additional ecological resources for aquatic life as well as birds.

In September 2016, crews began to dredge and move sediment from the central basin to the north arm of the lagoon, near Monrovia Avenue, where the water will become shallower. This will facilitate the hydrological conditions for eelgrass, salt marsh, sage scrub and freshwater plants to grow, which will greatly enhance the ecological value of the Lagoon. The creation of new intertidal and shallow subtidal habitat and eelgrass beds will provide foraging for local birds at one of Southern California's last remaining coastal lagoons.

The playgrounds and picnic areas at the Colorado Lagoon will remain open, but water access will be closed during construction, which is expected to last until early 2017.


Other improvements will include:

- Replacing the asphalt road with a vegetated bioswale and pedestrian trail
- Extending the floating pier and footbridge to span the expanded subtidal areas
- Adding 16 new piles to support the structure
- Repainting the pier replacing the stairs with ADA-compliant ramps
- -Installing pedestrian amenities such as log seating, benches, bike racks and interpretative signage

Previous restoration activities have vastly improved the water quality. Low flow diversion systems and trash capture devices continue to prevent new contaminants and debris from entering the Colorado Lagoon, and contamination has been removed from the Lagoon bottom.

The transformation of the Colorado Lagoon has been possible thanks to the support of local residents, and the partnership and collaboration with the Friends of Colorado Lagoon, and State and Federal agencies.

Know Your Long Beach Park: Orange Mini Park



Orange Mini Park at the corner of Orange Avenue and San Antonio Drive is a testament to the power of community involvement. On September 28, 2002, over 120 vol-

unteers from Toyota Motor Sales worked with Parks, Recreation and Marine staff to transform a vacant .31-acre former gas station lot into a new park, as a project of National Public Lands Day (NPLD). NPLD is an annual volunteer program brings volunteers together to enhance and protect public lands.

The Long Beach City College Horticulture Department assisted with the site design and the Long Beach Department of Public Works assisted with site preparation. The office of the 8th City Council District supported that project with funds to purchase materials.

The project involved adding soil amendments for planted areas and decomposed granite for walkways. A total of 380 feet of fencing and four park benches were installed.

Friends of Long Beach Animals Donates Medical Suite to Long Beach Animal Care Services



Long Beach Animal Care Services (LBACS) has enhanced conditions for medical staff to provide lifesaving treatments to the thousands of animals admitted to the Long Beach shelter every year.

A generous donation from Friends of Long Beach Animals (FOLBA), a nonprofit organization dedicated to responsible pet ownership, education and humane treatment of animals, a new 800 square foot medical suite will provide a much larger space for the LBACS medical team to perform their life saving and life enhancing work. FOLBA's donation purchased and installed the suite which includes a dedicated surgery room, spay / neuter equipment, examination tables and equipment, and recovery cages.

"I am very grateful for the generous donation of the medical suite by the Friends of Long Beach Animals," said Long Beach Parks, Recreation and Marine Director Marie Knight. "This will help more animals be in a better position to be adopted."

In the near future, LBACS will be looking for a partner organization or sponsor to use the medical suite to provide free or low cost spay/neuter surgeries to the public.

Animals Care Explorers Build Leadership Skills

In a unique partnership with the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, Los Angeles (spcaLA), the Long Beach Animal Care Services Bureau (ACS), young people are building character, leadership skills and awareness of careers related to animal care and control.

ACS's Animal Care Explorers Program is a partnership with Learning for Life, an affiliate of the Boy Scouts to provide career training for qualified youth ages 14-19 who wish to serve the public and make the region safer for people and animals. Participants learn about careers related to public safety and the humane treatment of animals. They are exposed to issues concerning animal handling, veterinary care, herd health care, rabies control, law enforcement, wildlife management, and special investigations. The program is a yearlong commitment starting each January and consists of monthly meetings/trainings, educational field trips and volunteer service.

Maintenance Operations Update

Parks, Recreation and Marine Facility Maintenance staff recently completed the resurfacing of the sports courts at Marina Vista Park. In an effort to bring a greater impact and brighten up the two courts, the color was changed from green and red to a bright blue and green.

Crews performed a high pressure wash to remove debris, chips and spalls from the concrete surface and used a special patch compound to make repairs prior to replacing with the sports court surface and adding new nets.
