Be S.A.F.E. Program - Award of Excellence Winner



Parks, Recreation and Marine's Be S.A.F.E. program (Summer Activities in a Friendly Environment) was named an "Award of Excellence" winner in the category of Neighborhood Building in the annual California Park & Recreation Society's (CPRS) Awards program. The awards recognize outstanding achievements by agencies in community improvements and programming, facility design and park planning, marketing, and leadership.



Parks, Recreation & Marine Director Marie Knight and LBPRM's Maintenance Operations Manager Hurley Owens accepted the award at the CPRS state conference in Sacramento on March 3. "This is a wonderful acknowledgment by LBPRM's peers about the work we are doing to keep our kids and community safe, Knight said.

Long Beach Mayor Robert Garcia, said, "The Be S.A.F.E. program is a criti-

cal component of the City's Safe Long Beach Initiative and healthy active lifestyle goals. By keeping selected parks activated in the evening hours, families have positive and safe activities to enjoy together and social connections in the neighborhood grow stronger."

Be S.A.F.E. helps to reduce crime in neighborhoods by of-



fering evening supervision hours at designated parks during the summer, and employing neighborhood youth. Be SAFE offers arts and crafts, outdoor games, sports, science activities, dance programs, classes in fitness, cooking, gardening and flower arranging, and computer labs that appeal to youth and families.

In 2016, the program ran from June 20 though August 26 at Admiral Kidd, Drake, Houghton, M. L. King Jr., Seaside, Scherer, and Silverado Parks and served over 50,000 youth and adults. Thanks to enhanced support in FY 2017, Bixby, Pan American, Orizaba, and Ramona Parks will be

MAINTENANCE OPERATIONS AND MARINE BUREAU UPDATE

LBPRM Staff Handle Major Storm Challenges



Long Beach Parks, Recreation & Marine (LBPRM) staff had "can do" attitudes on February 17, when another major storm moved through the City with high winds and 2.77 inches of rain that caused

dozens of trees to fall in parks, and even more limbs and branches to fly loose.

These conditions led to public safety concerns and the closure of all City parks including El Dorado Regional Park and El Dorado Nature Center for the duration of the day. **Community Recreation Services** staff kept indoor after-school programs open until every child was picked up by their parent or guardian. Due to the weather, classes at Leeway Sailing Center were cancelled.

The LBPRM team did everything they could to prepare for the storm including maintaining sand berms, installing debris booms to prevent trash from entering the marina areas, maintaining storm run-off culverts on the beaches, and deploying additional staff. **Facility Maintenance** staff dealt with leaks at multiple sites, **Grounds Maintenance** got out their chainsaws to clear roads and paths of fallen trees, while **Marine and Beach Maintenance** tackled the job of fortifying stretches of beach and flooded areas



around parking lots and paths, and coordinating an effort with Long Beach Fire Marine Safety to float off a 110' barge that came loose and landed on the beach.

The Belmont Veterans Memorial Pier was closed when two 40' docks broke away. After a structural engineering analysis was completed, the pier reopened on March 7.



The **Marine Bureau** was vigilant in advising boat owners to secure their vessels in marinas, and **Animal Care Services** reminded residents to keep their pets safely inside or sheltered during the storm.

Street. The park is a community hub for events and activities such as Movies in the Park, National Night Out events and the U.S.D.A. Summer Food Service program.

The park was named Grace Park by the Long Beach City Council to recognize the use of

In the second week of January, El Dorado Park Tennis Center hosted the nine-day USTA Long Beach Pro Circuit Futures Tennis Tournament. Numerous fans and spectators came out to support the up and coming Association of Tennis Professionals (ATP) players from around the world, who are the future of the ATP Men's tennis tour.

EDT hosted two new National Junior Tennis tournaments awarded by the USTA Junior Competition Committee to Cathy Jacobson-Guzy and First Serve Tennis, Inc. for 2017. The Boys & Girls 16 USTA National Level 2 tournament ran from February 10-13. The boys #1 seed was ranked 13th nationally and the girls #1 seed was ranked 41st. These high-level junior players are striving for college scholarships or will turn to professional tennis in a few years. First Serve looks forward to hosting again in 2018.

On February 19, First Serve Tennis organized the Long Beach Tennis Patrons Boy's JV Tennis Clinic & Round Robin at EDT. This annual event was open to local high school potential JV tennis players. The afternoon started with a 90-minute tennis clinic where EDT's USPTA certified tennis pro's worked on fine-tuning the player's basic skills. A two-hour round robin tournament followed that gave the participants some competitive match play experience prior to the start of their regular season.

Despite rescheduling due to rain, the adult USTA League played their matches. The competition is always exciting, the atmosphere is social and with the players competing as teams, they have fun cheering on their fellow teammates during the matches

The BJK Tennis Center hosted Wilson Demo Day on February 25. This was a fun, family friendly evening on the courts where players young and old enjoyed games and great prizes. This social tennis event allowed players and their families to try new 2017 Wilson racquets and shoes.

In February, EDTC and BJK were two of six tournament sites for the 60th Annual Long Beach Junior Tournament (Level 3) designated tournament. This historic and prestigious tournament includes over 600 boys and girls from ages 10 to 18 from Southern California cities.

BJK Tennis pro Richard Nguyen fielded two teams in the USTA Junior Team Tennis Fall/Winter season. In the 10 & under Intermediate Division, Team True GRIT placed first in the LA/South Bay/Long Beach region with an undefeated 6-0 record, and qualified for the Southern California Sectionals. Team Tough GRIT, a 14 & under Novice team, also competed in the LA/South Bay/Long Beach region. This Spring/Summer, Richard will add Team Pure GRIT to the 10 & under Advanced division.
