LBPRM Celebrates "Parks Make Life Better" Month



Parks, Recreation and Marine kicked off "Parks Make Life Better Month" and celebrated at the July 11 City Council meeting with presentations and congratulations from the Mayor and Councilmembers. July is the month when the most residents participate in park programs.

PRM Director Marie Knight introduced young park patron Erick who led the crowd on a video tour of our programs and services in the community. Huge kudos to Angelo Barrera and staff for the great work on the video and to all staff who attended to support the presentation.

Among the many comments by City Council were "park staff are like family," "I appreciate all the work for the Be SAFE program," "parks staff has a connection to all residents," "parks staff are mentors, chaperones, big brothers and big sisters to our kids;" "kudos to the maintenance



staff for all they do," "parks are not just for kids but for everyone," "you should see the life inside our park buildings," "thank you for your dedicated years of service," "thanks to staff who work hard with few resources," and "thanks for coordinating the free lunch program and the foster the 4th program for pets."

Mayor Garcia presented Marie Knight and Erick with a Mayoral Proclamation in recognition of the month and PRM's ability to "make life better" for all residents.

Housing and Community Development Grant to Fund Park Improvements

In February, Parks, Recreation and Marine applied for a State of California Housing and Community Development grant for improvements at Drake Park, Peace Park, and M.L. King Jr. Park. LBPRM was successful in obtaining \$900,000 to be spread among these parks in central and west Long Beach. Of 95 municipalities that applied, LBPRM received the eighth largest distribution.

Dance performances included hip-hop, pop locking and break dancing from the groups Homeland Pop Shop, Homeland B-Boys and Culture Shock LA. Aztec dance performed by Xipe Totec Long Beach, Micronesian Dance interpreted by the Kutturan Chamoru Foundation of Long Beach, the rhythmic drumming and expressive dancing of the West African Drum and Dance Ensemble, and dances native to the Hmong culture performed by the Hmong Association of Long Beach thrilled the audience.

Exciting musical performances included Orlando Greenhill and Sound Army, DJ Ervin Arana, and the Hmong Association of Long Beach playing traditional qeejs, which are flute-type instruments.

The Ancient Khmer Martial Arts group demonstrated the art of bokator that combines physical discipline




and spiritualism, and spoken word artists Felicia Cade and the Aim4theHeart group shared original poetry.

The grand finale showcased singing and celebrated the annual showcase with the full cast on stage.

Los Angeles Dodgers Support LBPRM Youth Sports



LBPRM youth sports leagues got a Big Blue boost this summer from the Los Angeles Dodgers Foundation (LADF). LADF's "Reviving Baseball in Inner Cities Program" seeks to increase the participation of underserved youth in baseball and softball, encourage academic achievement, prepare youth to play in college and minor leagues, and teach the value of teamwork.

LADF granted \$2,975 to help with field maintenance and umpire fees to offer T-ball to approximately 500 youth. LADF also contributed uniforms, equipment, banners, coach training, youth clinics, and giveaways.

A six-week series of group lessons was led by



LBPRM Fall Class Regigeration Going On Now



Register now for new fall recreation classes offered by Long Beach Parks. Recreation and Marine (LBPRM). More than 400 classes in art, music, nature, fitness, special interest subjects; adult sports leagues and aquatics programs will be offered starting in September. programs These opportuniprovide ties for exercise and

recreation, social interaction and learning, and growth and relaxation for ages pre-school to adults 50+.

Preschoolers can learn to create healthy snacks in Lil Sprouts Cooking Class. They can learn to express themselves with sign language and Spanish language immersion classes. Other fall offerings include music, dance, gymnastics, soccer, tee ball and preschool reading and math.

Youth classes include cooking, baking funk dance, hip hop dance, musical theater, reading and math development, and music. Young athletes can hone their skills in basketball, ice skating, gymnastics, ice hockey, martial arts, volleyball, skateboarding and soccer.

Teens can prepare to get their driver's license, write a winning college essay, jam on the guitar and stay active in a variety of sports classes.

There are several great new art classes for **adults** being offered this fall. In *Portraiture and Figure Drawing*, you can learn to draw the human figure from draped models. Lessons will include figurative proportions, foreshortening, hands and feet, negative space, and gesture drawing. The *Sketching and Journaling* class will develop sketching and watercolor techniques to apply to art journals such as collage, plein-air, transfer, and postcard sized drawing and painting. For watercolorists seekingto branch out, *Watercolor Magic* will teach marbling, salt wash, transfer printing and wax resist will make your watercolors truly stand out. You may also want to "Transform Your Photo into a Beautiful Painting." The instructor will demonstrate how a painting is developed in oil, primarily, but also in watercolor or pastel.

Looking for a fun new fitness routine? The new Adult Hip Hop class is fast paced and teaches street style dance and funky hip hop routines.

Adults 50+ have many options through LBPRM to stay fit including dance, Yoga and Zumba®

New this fall is the Lower Back and Hip Workshop where you can learn simple and safe stretches (asanas) to relieve stress and muscle fatigue due to poor posture and injury flare-ups, You can also learn to be healthier by focusing your attention on breathing and body positioning.

To mark the 100th anniversary Rotary International in 2005, the Long Beach Rotarians raised over \$160,000 to build the 1.2-acre Ro-Centennial tary Park at Pacific Highway Coast Junipero and Street. The park

serves a densely populated neighborhood and features a solar system theme with planets and a stainless-steel sundial sculpture. Other features include a fenced tot play yard and three play structures, one of which was funded through a Rotary International matching grant in partnership with the Rotary Club of Celaya, Mexico.

The Long Beach Rotarians hold monthly work parties to help clean and maintain the park and also work in partnership with Parks, Recreation and Marine's, Maintenance Operations staff to complete projects.

Animal Care Services Update

Movie Night at the Shelter

Long Beach Animal Care Services hosted their second annual Movie in the Park event on July 29. Dozens of families not only enjoyed the free screening of "The Secret Life of Pets," but were able to become familiar with the Animal Shelter and meet great adoptable dogs and cats.













Foster the Fourth

The dedicated Animal Care Services (ACS) team was able to weather the 4th of July "storm," thanks to a coordinated effort with Live Love Animal rescue and residents that stepped up to help "Foster on the Fourth." These residents provided temporary housing for shelter dogs to free up kennel space for the influx of lost pets who run from their homes frightened by fireworks. A total of 19 dogs were placed in temporary foster homes around the holiday weekend. ACS staff is gratified to learn that many of these dogs may become permanently adopted and not have to return to the shelter.

On July 3 and 4, ACS staff answered phones until midnight to relieve pressure on the Emergency Dispatchers. The Clerks and Animal Control Officers in the field worked together to help reunite lost pets in the field rather than bringing them back to the shelter. Only one dog had to be brought back to the shelter on July 4, and since then, ACS has helped reunite over dozens of animals with their owners.

Leeway Kids Join Beach to Bay Regatta



On June 20 Leeway Sailing Center campers participated in the 30th Annual Jessica Uniack Memorial Beach to Bay Race. They joined over 150 junior sailors from throughout Southern California in a five nautical mile race in dinghy classes from Shoreline Beach to Alamitos Bay, with the finish line at the Long Beach Yacht Club.

Know Your Long Beach Parks: Scherer Park



Scherer Park is one of the oldest parks in Long Beach and is located at 4600 Long Beach Blvd. Developer Lloyd Whaley and the Home Investment Company, which built homes in Long Beach in the 1940s and '50s, donated the original 11.14 acres of the park in 1944.

The park was named on October 14, 1948, for Herman J. Scherer, who was Superintendent of Parks from June 16, 1940 to his death on August 2, 1948. The now 25.23-acre park includes a lake with a waterfall, a community center, tennis, basketball and volleyball courts, a playground and picnic areas.











Scherer Park Development Timeline

1944: 11.14 acres of land was donated to the City of Long Beach by Home Investment Company

1948: Park named for former Park Superintendent Herman J. Scherer.

1956: A park development plan was approved.

1959: Scherer Park opened on November 10, 1959.

1975: The City leased the 2.2-acre section of the park that was cut off from the park by Del Amo Boulevard to the YMCA, who constructed a recreation center and swim ming pool on the site.

1986: Grants for \$400,000 from the State Parks Bond issue of 1984, and \$200,000 from the Federal Land and Water Conservation Fund funded the replacement of the irrigation system, security lighting and picnic tables, and new playground equipment and land scaping.

1988: A 1.23-acre area of the park, that served as a right-ofway for Del Amo Boulevard, was leased to the Boys and Girls Club to construct a recreational facility. 1997: The Los Angeles County Safe Neighborhood Parks Bond Act of 1992 funded new playground equipment and picnic tables, and lake improvements.

2001: 2.6 acres of parkland was converted for the North Police Station that opened in 2004.

2002: American with Disabilities Act improvements from the transition plan was completed with Community Development Block Grant funding.

2006: The parkland used for the North Police Station was restored in the area with the opening of Davenport Park at 2910 E. 55th Way on August 6, 2006.

2006: A master planning effort for the park began in September to explore the possible future development of a new community center, exercise trails, and lake restoration.

2009: The Uptown Dog Park opened in November 2009 on the Long Beach Blvd. side of Scherer Park in an area near picnic tables and a parking lot. There are separate areas for small and large dogs to play off leash.


