Seaside Park Artificial Turf Sports Field Opens

The first artificial turf soccer field in the City of Long Beach opened on November 18 at Seaside Park.

Approximately .4 acres of an existing unsafe dirt sports field was converted to synthetic turf, composed of a natural, renewable blend of cork and sand infill that is resilient with good heat dissipating properties. The field does not require hydration except for cleaning, and has a life expectancy between eight and 13 years.

The field will help to meet the constant demand for playing locations and improved playing conditions. This conversion will reduce water use to help meet the state water reduction mandate, provide a more durable, consistent and safe playing surface; increase playable hours by eliminating field closure for sod replacement or rain events; and reduce field maintenance costs because there would be no need to reseed, re-sod or aerate.

The total project cost was approximately \$1.7 million. The project was made possible using First Council District FY 14 one-time infrastructure funds, Community Development Block Grant funds, and a \$600,000 grant awarded



by the California Youth Soccer and Recreation Development Grant Program, offered by the State of California Department of Parks and Recreation, Office of Grants and Local Services.

Teams from the Deportivo Miguel Hidalgo and Cesar Chavez Youth Soccer Leagues played an exhibition game following the ribbon cutting and ceremonial soccer ball kick.

Artificial turf fields will also open in the near future at Drake/Chavez and Admiral Kidd Parks.



Parks, Recreation & Marine 2017 - A Great Year In Review

2017 was a year of achievement for Long Beach Parks, Recreation and Marine in creating and improving open space, completing projects that protect our environment, and for innovation and creativity in providing recreation programs that keep residents healthy, safe and connected.

Awards



LBPRM's Be S.A.F.E. (Summer Activities in a Friendly Environment) programs activated 11 parks during later weekday hours from June 19 to August 25. The Be SAFE program was awarded the 2017

"Award of Excellence" winner in the category of Neighborhood Building by the California Park & Recreation Society.

The Junior Beach Runners received the 2017 Helen Putnam Award for Excellence from the League of California Cities for "innovative programming that encourages healthy lifestyles."



Health & Safety

The PRM Administrative building was damaged in a rainstorm in January. More than 50 staff were relocated during the three-month renovation. Park, Facility, Beach and Maintenance Divisions handled damage at community centers, removed downed trees, built up sand berms to protect homes and pumped out flooded facilities and trails.

The non-profit organization "Women in Action Reaching Out" is providing meals for seniors that meet USDA standards at Chavez and Silverado Parks, Monday through Friday. Due to funding cuts at the Federal level, the previous provider stopped service at the two parks.



The Downtown Fitness Loop, the eighth in the City, opened on June 3. The 4.8-mile walking/running path is bordered by Alamitos Avenue, East Shoreline Drive, Aquarium Road, West Shoreline Drive and Ocean

Blvd. The loop has five active stations such as pull-up/dip bars, and six passive stations such as balance stretch, and squats stations.



Parks and Open Space

On January 28, ground was broken for the 3.3-acre Molina Park at 4951 Oregon Avenue. The park will have a turf soccer field, play-

ground, restroom, walking path, parking and landscaping.

The Marina Vista Sports Court opened on March 18. The 1,200 square-foot court includes a ten-foot basketball pole with a backboard and hoop, and a foursquare overlay on the court surface.





Robert Gumbiner Park opened on April 23. The 36,590 squarefoot park includes a small performance area, playgrounds, a skate plaza, shade structures, a picnic

area and public art pieces. The park has sustainability design features such as recycled pavement, bioswales, and large canopied trees.

The Willow Springs Park Wetlands Restoration project opened on October 21. The 12-acre site features a walking loop, native plants and trees, a constructed spring that mimics the original artesian spring



that provided water to early Long Beach, a water retention basin that cleans and diverts water to be reused on site, and an outdoor classroom.



The new .43 acre Dog Park at Bixby Park opened on November 4. This new park is the 11th off-leash dog recreation area to open in the City of Long Beach.

Sustainability



New restoration improvements at Colorado Lagoon were revealed to the public on May 20, that included new sub-tidal and eelgrass habitats, a decomposed granite

walking trail, pedestrian bridge improvements, a reclaimed water irrigation system, native plants and a vegetated bio-swale to remove pollution from surface runoff water.

Also on May 20, the new El Dorado Nature Center entryway and plaza was dedicated. Visitors are greeted by a new monument sign and gateway with separate tour group entrances, a new 80-seat



amphitheater, a new ADA-compliant pedestrian bridge that connects to the Nature Center building and trails, and improved drainage and lighting.



Construction is underway for the Red Car Greenway at Fourth Street and Park Avenue. The 3.66-acre project will consist of a ten-foot wide concrete walking trail and drought-tolerant native

landscaping on the former Pacific Electric Right-of-Way between Park Avenue and Ximeno Avenue.

The new walking path at Ed "Pops" Davenport Park opened to the public on September 30. The 2,200-d e c o m p o s e d granite path will eventually connect to the existing



walking path at the park to form a .66-mile loop. The new park space will include lighted soccer fields, meandering walkways, and additional parking.



Efficiency

The "Partnerships to Enhance Parks, Programs and Services" (PEPPS) program is engaging individuals, businesses and organizations in sponsorships, donation opportunities and volunteer projects to improve facilities, programs and services. PEPPS will help to bridge the gap between resources and the need for improved parks, and more

programs and services.

The Los Angeles Dodgers Foundation (LADF) seeks to increase youth participation in baseball and softball. LADF granted \$2,975 along with in kind contributions to LBPRM to assist in providing T-ball programs to approxi-



mately 500 local youth this summer.



The Movies in the Park program is supported by a multi-year sponsorship for \$38,000 a year from Signal Hill Petroleum. In 2017 the Port of

Long Beach began sponsoring movies nights at Be SAFE program sites.

Long Beach Animal Care Services accepted the donation of a new mobile van to showcase adoptable animals. The van is fitted with kennels that can be opened to view animals, a retractable shade awning, air



conditioning, and a meet-and-greet room for cats.

Animal Care Services held a successful "Kitty Hall" cat adoption event at City Hall on August 11, that led to 20 cats and kittens finding homes.

ACS saw a reduction of 35% in the number of cats and dogs euthanized at the shelter resulting in all time high live release rates of 94% for dogs and 72% for cats compared to 85% and 62% respectively in 2016.

Programs

LBPRM wound down the 8th year of the "100 Days of Summer" in Long Beach with a free concert by Trinity on August 25 at Marine Sta-

dium. Families enjoyed a free Kids' Zone, food trucks and dancing to the sounds of Journey, Foreigner and Styx.

Marking its 108th year, the Long Beach Municipal Band expanded to a six-week concert season, and added Veterans Park on it's list of performance locations.





This past summer Long Beach Unified School District once again provided free swim for youth at City-operated pools, including Belmont Plaza, King, and Silverado Park Pools, as well as Millikan, Jor-

dan, and Cabrillo High School Pools.



Homeland Cultural Center showcased their diverse performing ensembles at its annual Dance Fest in July. The free event featured West African drum and dance, Aztec

dance, Cambodian dance and martial arts, Micronesian music and dance, pop-locking, hip-hop, and Hmong traditional arts performances.

The Los Angeles Kings hockey team conducted a free

street hockey clinic for Winter Fun Days participants, and supported the All City Beach Day event, bringing close to 2,400 youth to the beach for a day of adventures in the sand.

The beautiful .4-acre Overlook Park (also known as Naples Plaza) has a great view of the Naples Bay with the Vista Del Golfo walkway along side it.

This bay front park is an elongated 15 foot wide strip of land running from the west end of Corso di Napoli to the east end of Corso di Oro. The park provides street frontage to the properties on either side of Naples Plaza. In January 1965, the City Council approved a contract for construction of the park. Planting was completed in April of the same year. The park includes benches, turf and palm trees.

Trees in the Bay Light Up the Holiday Season

Every year in Long Beach, the holiday season comes to life with the installation of lighted tree structures that float on local waterways. Since 1949, when a local resident first built and cast a tree structure onto Alamitos Bay, the decorative trees have lit up the nights throughout the holidays.

The LBPRM Marine Maintenance Division manages the program including repairing the wooden structures, stringing and testing lights, and anchoring the trees in place.

This year a total of 60 trees will be displayed at locations including Alamitos Bay, Belmont Veterans Memorial Pier, Rainbow Lagoon, Rainbow Harbor, Spinnaker Bay, and Colorado Lagoon. The lakes at El Dorado Park West and Heartwell Park will also have trees.

While the Colorado Lagoon will still look festive, it will have two fewer trees than in previous years due to a new eel grass habitat in the north section of the Lagoon. The trees were also converted to a helical or spiral anchor that is twisted into the ground instead of the concrete bases that could scrape the lagoon bottom and damage habitat.

Staff is proud to bring these colorful trees to life to celebrate the holiday season.


