Groundbreaking Held For New Houghton Park Community Center

A groundbreaking ceremony was held for the new Houghton Park Community Center on March 3.

The project includes the construction of a new 6,500 square foot community center, with associated existing building renovations, utilities, and hardscape and land-

scape site improvements. It will connect to the existing community center via a breezeway and will surround historic sections of the 1930's portion of the building. The new building will be constructed to the east of the existing community center, and will feature two large multipurpose rooms that can be divided into two rooms with a retractable wall. The multipurpose rooms will contain equipment, material storage and amenities to support a variety of programs and activities. The project will also result in a more accessible, reconfigured parking lot.

The building is designed to earn a Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Silver Rating and will use drought tolerant landscaping around the building and courtyard to cut down on water usage.

“The Houghton Park Community Center will set a new standard for design and complement our new Michelle Obama Library and Fire Station 12,” said Mayor Robert Garcia. “I am proud to mention that this project is made possible in part by Measure A, which voters passed in 2016 to fund public infrastructure and public safety services.”

The new Admiral Kidd Park artificial turf sports field officially opened to the public on March 3.

“This is the third new artificial turf field that has opened in Long Beach in the past three months,” said Mayor Robert Garcia. “This new field will provide more access to year-round recreational amenities while contributing to water conservation and reduced maintenance costs.”

The project converted 1.93 acres of an existing grass sports field to artificial turf with organic cork/sand infill. Site improvements include landscaped areas and site furnishings, such as picnic tables and garbage containers, and upgraded drainage and fencing. The benefits of the conversion include water conservation, a more durable and consistent playing surface; increased hours of play by eliminating field closures for sod replacement or rain events, and reduced field maintenance costs.



“This new field will help ease the constant demand for soccer fields in our community,” said Councilmember Roberto Uranga. “The qualities of this new artificial turf field will provide for more hours of play and improved, safer playing conditions.”

The construction of the new artificial turf field, managed by the Department of Public Works, was finished on time and on budget. The total project cost was approximately \$1.9 million, and was made possible by FY 14 and FY 15 one-time funds that were budgeted in the Capital Projects Fund in the Public Works Department.

Artificial turf soccer fields also recently opened at the Drake Chavez Greenbelt in January and at Seaside Park in November, 2017.

Stephen P. Scott Named Interim Director for Parks, Recreation and Marine



Long Beach City Manager, Patrick H. West, named Stephen P. Scott as the interim director of Parks, Recreation and Marine (PRM) effective February 24, 2018. The City will conduct a national recruitment for the next Department Director.

“Stephen is already integral to the Parks team, and has made a positive impact on the many community-focused projects and programs the department has initiated in recent years,” said City Manager Patrick H. West. “Stephen’s working knowledge of the department and leadership skills will be a great asset to the City as we search for a new director.”

Mr. Scott is currently the Deputy Director for PRM, and has previously served the City as the Interim Director. He previously was the Customer Services Manager in the Department of Technology and Innovation; Assistant to the City Manager; and Administrative Analyst in the City’s Budget Office. Mr. Scott holds a Master’s Degree in Public Management from the University of Wisconsin, Madison’s LaFollette School of Public Affairs, and a Bachelor’s Degree in Political Science from the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor. He is a Long Beach resident. Mr. Scott will not be a candidate for the director of PRM position.

Marie Knight, previous director of PRM, accepted a position with the City of Huntington Beach as the Director of Community Services. Her last day with the City of Long Beach was in February.

Animal Care Services Open House Informs Public About Programs and Progress



Residents had an opportunity to learn about Long Beach Animal Care (ACS) programs and services, and their impressive animal welfare statistics for the past year at the annual ACS Open House on February 17. Highlights of 2017 included:


Los Angeles Clippers Street Team Youth Basketball Skills Competition

The project includes a play structure and swings suitable for ages 2-12 years old and rubberized safety surfacing.

Know Your Long Beach Parks: Plaza Zafaria



Plaza Zafaria Park at Redondo Avenue and Pacific Coast Highway was built on land leftover from the realignment of Redondo Avenue. The passive park consists of lawn and trees.

The neighborhood where the .81-acre park is located was named Zafaria after the Pacific

Electric Railway depot built at Anaheim Street and Obispo Avenue, in 1904. It is a Spanish word meaning small village or ranch house site. The East Long Beach Improvement Association suggested the name, which was adopted by City Council resolution on February 17, 1953.



The area adjacent to the depot was settled as early as 1899. The Zafaria community centered on Anaheim Street, between Temple and Loma Avenues, extends north of Pacific Coast Highway and south to 11th Street. The Pacific Electric linked Zafaria with Long Beach, along its Redondo and East Broadway lines, in 1907. The lines ceased operations in 1961.


