A grand opening celebration for the new Whaley Park playground was held on November 28. This was the fourth playground completed of six Measure A funded playground upgrades. Eager youth explored the new playground with an adventure course, guided passport and exciting super hero characters. The Long Beach Symphony Instrument Petting Zoo gave children the opportunity to create sounds with various instruments.

"This playground is an example of the repairs and upgrades to Long Beach parks and improvements in public safety that have been made possible by Long Beach residents and their support of Measure A," said Mayor Robert Garcia.



The PRM Marine Maintenance Division manages the program including repairing the wooden structures, stringing and testing lights, and anchoring the trees in place. This year a total of 70 trees will be displayed at Rainbow Lagoon, Colorado Lagoon, Alamitos Bay Marina Lower and Upper Bays, The Peninsula, Spinnaker Bay, Belmont Veterans Memorial Pier, Rainbow Harbor, the Second Street median, Scherer Park, Heartwell Park and El Dorado Park West.

PRM Hits Bulls Eye with Archery Foundation Grant



Parks, Recreation and Marine (PRM) has received an Explore Archery grant from USA Archery. This grant will supply resources for programming and materials to enhance PRM's archery program. As grant recipients, PRM will send two employees to attend an Archery Instructor Academy to be certified as USA Archery Level 2 Instructors. Additionally, PRM will receive Explore Archery program materials,

range posters and the equipment necessary to implement a beginner to intermediate archery program.

According to USA Archery, archery is a sport of focus and discipline that provides a foundation for goal-orientation. Learning and applying archery skills translate to STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Mathematics) concepts used in the classroom and help athletes become better students.

To provide broad community access to the program, PRM will offer a one-day "Try Archery or Explore Archery" camp on four different afternoons in two different parks. Two will take place at Silverado Park, where an indoor archery range can be used, and two will take place at the El Do-rado Regional Park Outdoor Archery Range. The goal is to introduce archery to youth participants and gauge interest for future programs. During the summer, PRM envisions an ongoing archery program at two locations once-a-week for 6 to 10 weeks, mirroring the Department's existing youth sports summer camps.

Agents of Discovery App Engages Teens in Park Exploration





November Employee of the Month: Bob Livingstone



With a mixture of gladness and sadness, attendees at the November 15 Parks and Recreation Commission congratulated Bob Livingstone on his selection as the November "Employee of the Month," not only because he definitely deserved the honor, but because it would also be his last meeting before retiring from City service. Bob worked for Parks, Recreation and Marine since 2009. His official title was

Superintendent of Golf Operations and Contracts, but he was also affectionately referred to as the "Chief of Stuff" for his resourcefulness and "Honey Badger" for his tenaciousness in achieving goals. During Bob's tenure, the five Long Beach golf courses became known nationally for their quality. He was successful in increasing the number of rounds played and in growing the game with innovative programs. Bob's civic involvement included serving on the Parks and Recreation, and City Golf Commissions and running for Long Beach Mayor in 2002. He says every job he has ever had has been related to golf in some way including serving as men's golf coach at CSULB. He was elected to the Long Beach Golf Hall of Fame in 2001. Bob has also served on the boards of Partners of Parks, the El Dorado Men's Golf Club, Southern California Golf Association, St. Mary Medical Foundation, 49er Athletic Association and the CSU Long Beach Alumni Association.

In retirement, Bob plans to stay active in supporting golf, is considering adopting a rescue dog, and as he says, "Give time and resources to worthwhile causes that make the community better."
