(Denver, CO) – In a unanimous move, the Colorado Veterinary Medical Association (CVMA) Board of Directors has approved a position statement supporting the socially conscious animal community movement and opposing the no-kill movement in animal welfare.

The statement comes after a no-kill organization running an animal shelter in Pueblo relinquished its license amid a state investigation into shelter conditions and high number of animal deaths.

"As veterinarians, we have a responsibility to prevent and relieve animal suffering," said CVMA President Will French, DVM. "The idea of the no-kill movement is misleading, and often increases animal suffering with unintended consequences. A Socially Conscious Animal Community is a more positive approach to animal welfare that treats animals respectfully and alleviates their suffering. As a board, a socially conscious approach is more in line with our mission of enhancing animal and human health and welfare in the state."

The Colorado Veterinary Medical Association (CVMA) strongly supports the socially conscious animal sheltering movement and opposes the no-kill movement in animal welfare.

The socially conscious animal community movement strives to create the best outcomes for all animals by treating them respectfully and alleviating suffering. Fundamental goals of Socially Conscious Animal Communities are achieved through shelter and community commitments to:

- Ensure every unwanted or homeless pet has a safe place to go for shelter and care
- Place every healthy and safe animal
- Assess the medical and behavioral needs of homeless animals and ensure these needs are thoughtfully addressed
- Align shelter policy with the needs of the community
- Alleviate suffering and make appropriate euthanasia decisions
- Consider the health and wellness of animals for each community when transferring animals
- Enhance the human-animal bond through thoughtful placements and post-adoption support
- Foster a culture of transparency, ethical decision-making, mutual respect, continual learning, and collaboration

Protecting animal health and welfare, preventing and relieving animal suffering, and promoting public health are causes every veterinarian supports. Policies and legislation that remove professional judgement and knowledge in animal welfare and public health are counter to those causes; we cannot and will not support them.

In Colorado, we have worked hard to build a thriving collaboration among animal shelters, animal welfare professionals, and veterinary professionals. Our established Colorado animal shelters have a reputation for doing amazing things in the name of animal welfare:

- Collaborating with the veterinary medical profession to achieve high standards of care.
- Collaborating between shelters to maximize resource use.
- Reaching out to community partners to minimize the number of animals relinquished by people in need.
- Reaching out to other regions to share expertise and provide new forever homes.
- Finding placements for all adoptable animals.

The no-kill movement increases animal suffering and threatens public health with unintended consequences:

- Animals in need are turned away from shelters because shelters are not able to meet required live release rates if they are admitted.
- Animals languish in cages until they die to avoid euthanasia.

- Dangerous dogs are placed in the community or remain indefinitely in shelters because of release requirements
- Shelters can no longer accept lost or homeless animals from the community because cages are full of behaviorally or medically-challenged animals who cannot be placed in homes.
- Animal welfare is at risk because shelters are beyond capacity-of-care.

CVMA believes a socially conscious sheltering approach provides greater benefits for animals and for the community; as such, we strongly support socially conscious sheltering and oppose the no-kill movement.

My name is Aubrie Kavanuagh. I write to you from Huntsville, Alabama, where I lead an animal welfare advocacy group called No Kill Huntsville. I grew up in San Diego and consider California my childhood state. An uncle of mine lived in Long Beach many years ago before he passed away.

I understand council will be taking up the issue of the Long Beach Animal Shelter tomorrow night. I also understand that there are advocates pushing for Long Beach to become a no kill community as well as people from PETA who are advocating against no kill philosophies. For the sake of context, no kill means that healthy and treatable animals are not destroyed. It means that animals who are suffering are euthanized (since that is an act of mercy). It also means that dogs who are genuinely a public safety risk (as opposed to scared, anxious or fearful) are destroyed for legal reasons.

To cut to the chase, PETA cannot possibly take the moral high ground at all about animals. The organization seeks the extinction of domesticated dogs and cats and while the general public may think that PETA advocates for animals, it truly does not. The vast majority of animals which are housed in the PETA facicity are killed. Please do not listen do the "chicken little" proclamations by this group that the sky is falling and that no kill means institutionalized hoarding or lack of adequate care. Those claims are just not true. When we were advocating for change in Huntsville, PETA tried to get in the way here. None of the PETA followers trying to sidetrack our advocacy live in Huntsville and I feel confident most of them have never even been to Alabama.

In 2012 when No Kill Huntsville formed, the live release rate at our tax-funded shelter (which serves approximately 350,000 people) was 34%, meaning that 2 of every 3 animals in the shelter was destroyed. The live release rate has been above 90% since 2015. This didn't happen because the public suddenly became more responsible. It happened because the city changed the way the shelter functions using tax dollars to make better use of public funds and to keep animals alive - while not compromising public safety. If Huntsville, Alabama, can embrace proven programs which work across the county to keep animals alive, so can Long Beach. It's just that simple. We don't have any resources here that you don't have there. The No Kill Equation we used can be used anywhere. If you are not familiar with it, I cannot encourage you strongly enough to learn about how the programs work to both reduce shelter intake and increase shelter output.

A time will come when all tax funded animal shelters are no kill shelters because that is what the public wants and will demand. I encourage you to get ahead of this issue and make it clear that yours is a progressive city which can have the courage to change.

Thank you for your time. If you are interested in learning more about the Huntsville story, I feel confident that our shelter director, city administrator and members of council would be happy to engage with you on the topic.

Dear City Council:

Sadly, I cannot attend in person because this meeting is taking place during my work hours – in fact, during the work hours of all "9 to 5" people.

Therefore, I am submitting my comments supporting a No Kill Resolution for LBACS via email.

No Kill is defined as saving all healthy and treatable animals in our city's shelter through the use of positive programs, like comprehensive adoption, foster and volunteer programs, community outreach, medical and behavioral rehabilitation, low-cost, high-volume spay/neuter programs, pet retention program and proactive methods for getting animals back to their families. These are common-sense programs that have been implemented across the nation. It's time for us to have them at Long Beach Animal Care Services. Our community and our animals deserve it.

- 1. No Kill is great for Long Beach's economy. A 2017 study out of the University of Denver found that in the years since Austin, Texas went No Kill, the City of Austin has accrued \$157 million in benefits for the City in revenue for the city's animal-related businesses, tourism and name-brand equity. Google even cited Austin's commitment to No Kill as one of the reasons why it established itself in Austin. Google executives noted of Austin's No Kill policy that "it is attractive to a young, vibrant, pet-loving workforce."
- 2. No Kill has been successful in hundreds of shelters across the US. Austin saved 98% of its shelter animals last year. Sacramento, though not technically No Kill, has an 86% save rate and rising. Shelters in Palm Springs, CA; Petaluma, CA; Washoe County (Reno), NV, and many others, have successfully gone No Kill. Orange County has a new No Kill manager from Austin, and is on its way to No Kill. There's no need to reinvent the wheel -- we can learn from other communities and do the same. And if it's working in other cities, it can work in Long Beach, too.
- 3. No Kill is within our Reach. Long Beach is actually very close to going No Kill. Last year, LBACS killed just under a thousand animals. Some of those were incurably suffering and truly needed euthanasia. The rest could have been saved. If LBACS adopted out only 4 more animals per day, we would be at No Kill. This is EASY in a city of 500,000 people like Long Beach. Sacramento does more than this every day.
- **4.** A No Kill shelter is great for the community. The same University of Denver study found that "The study found that "increases in the rate of adoption can be connected to increased rates of pet-keeping in the community, which has been correlated with changes to pet-keeping individuals and families' holistic wellness, including their physical, mental, and social health."

- **5.** A No Kill shelter is good for shelter workers. Shelter workers in traditional shelters suffer from stress of working with animals that they will later have to kill. In a No Kill shelter, they feel good about helping animals get into good homes by doing adoptions, placing animals in foster, reaching out to the community and helping empower others to save animals.
- **6.** A No Kill shelter doesn't require more money it requires programs that are carried out competently, and it requires city management that knows how to capitalize on the strengths of the community to save lives. Long Beach is an incredibly animal-loving community if a No Kill shelter can succeed anywhere, it can succeed in Long Beach.

I believe that LBACS' Toxic Relationship with SpcaLA is at the heart of the problem. The City allows the wealthy, overbearing SpcaLA, housed next door, to call the shots at our city shelter. SpcaLA has said in the press that LBACS should be animal control, so that SpcaLA can do adoptions and essentially be the "warm and fuzzy" side of the shelter. Yet SpcaLA only takes in 1 in 4 animals at LBACS, leaving 75% of our city's animals to languish in cages without an adoption program. SpcaLA uses our shelter as personal puppy/kitten mill, cherry-picking only the healthiest and most adoptable animals for their own adoption program. This toxic relationship has resulted in the deaths of tens, if not hundreds of thousands of animals at our city shelter over the past 20 years. Our shelter needs complete AUTONOMY from SpcaLA so it can operate a shelter that is effective and efficient and that saves animals lives.

Also, the City gives SpcaLA "First Dibs" on animals at LBACS, even when people are right there asking to adopt an animal and could give him/her a good home immediately. DO NOT try to tell me this is a "myth" – I have seen it PERSONALLY on more than one occasion. If NOTHING else changes – THIS has to!

Finally, stop sending donors' information AND donors' DONATIONS over to SpcaLA. SpcaLA has a 12 million dollar revenue stream, most of it from contributions and donations. Again – NOT a myth – I have personal experience with this as well.

Please – do the right thing for the animals of Long Beach – fix the broken system (especially the relationship with SpcaLA) and SAVE LIVES.

#### LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

ACR 153, Santiago. Pet adoptions. This measure would urge communities in California to implement policies aimed at saving the lives of all healthy and adoptable cats and dogs by 2025.

#### **Bill Text**

WHEREAS, In 1998, the State of California enacted a policy that no adoptable animal should be euthanized if it can be adopted into a suitable home and that no treatable animal should be euthanized; and WHEREAS, The number of dogs and cats leaving California animal shelters alive has increased significantly over the past decade; and WHEREAS, Each year, an estimated two million healthy and adoptable cats and dogs nationwide do not leave animal shelters; and WHEREAS, Hundreds of thousands of dogs, puppies, cats, and kittens have entered California animal shelters, but not all have found forever homes; and WHEREAS, Handling animals in shelters costs California taxpayers tens of millions of dollars each year; and WHEREAS, A national survey revealed that almost 70 percent of citizens do not want unowned kittens or cats picked up and killed; and WHEREAS, California is home to innovative leaders in shelter animal

welfare that have invested heavily in developing cost-effective, life-saving strategies to reduce the intake of animals at shelters and to handle and place animals humanely; and WHEREAS, Many leading California animal shelters have implemented new and innovative programs and policies to ensure healthy outcomes for homeless cats and dogs; and WHEREAS, Those policies and programs include volunteer foster care networks; comprehensive adoption programs; medical and behavioral programs; public education and awareness programs; trap, neuter, vaccinate, and return or release programs; animal socialization programs; and many others; and WHEREAS, Many local governments, nonprofit organizations, business entities, and other entities continue to invest significant efforts in improving resources, training, and opportunities for animal shelters across California so that every community in the state can make progress toward the state's 20-year-old commitment to save all adoptable or treatable animals; now, therefore, be it Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California, the Senate thereof concurring, That communities in California are urged to implement policies aimed at saving the lives of all healthy and adoptable cats and dogs by 2025; and be it further Resolved, That the Chief Clerk of the Assembly shall transmit copies of this resolution to the author for appropriate distribution.
