Adopt Resolution No. WD-1415 authorizing the General Manager to enter into an agreement with the Conservation Corps of Long Beach for the installation and maintenance of drought tolerant gardens for the pilot Direct Install Gardens (DIG) program for an amount of \$438,176.

Executive Summary:

The traditional model of turf-removal incentive programs provides a dollar amount per square foot of turf lawn transformed into drought-tolerant landscaping after the project is completed. Landscape projects require an upfront investment, and as a result, Disadvantaged Communities (DACs) have historically been underrepresented in incentive program participation due to household income restrictions. DACs are an integral and large portion of the population whose participation in conservation programs is essential in making sustainability the Long Beach way of life.

Specifically, the Direct Install Garden (DIG) Program restores the urban watershed health by installing drought-tolerant plants with efficient irrigations systems, increases resiliency to climate change through expanding the urban forest in the City of Long Beach, and engages members of DACs with jobs, job training, education, multi-lingual resources, and community beautification.

During 2018, LBWD conducted an initial pilot for the DIG program, and directly installed three drought tolerant landscapes at Home Ownership for Personal Empowerment (HOPE) homes. Given the success of these installations, staff pursued grant opportunities to expand the pilot program. In May 2019, the Board of Water Commissioners approved an expanded DIG pilot program with a total budget of \$472,776, with \$236,388 of the program costs coming from California Coastal Conservancy Climate Ready Grant Round 5 funding.

This agreement will be for CCLB to furnish, deliver, install, and maintain drought tolerant gardens for the DIG Pilot Program in an amount not to exceed \$438,176. The remainder of the program budget will be used for the designs, outreach materials, and other program costs.

Staff Recommendation:

RESOLUTION NO. WD-1415

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF WATER COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF LONG BEACH AUTHORIZING THE GENERAL MANAGER TO ENTER INTO AN AGREEMENT WITH THE CONSERVATION CORPS OF LONG BEACH FOR THE INSTALLATION AND MAINTENANCE OF DROUGHT TOLERANT GARDENS FOR THE DIRECT INSTALL GARDENS (DIG) PILOT PROGRAM

IN AN AMOUNT OF \$438,176

WHEREAS, the Legislature of the State of California established the State Coastal Conservancy ("Conservancy") under Division 21 of the California Public Resources Code, and has authorized the Conservancy to award grants to public agencies and nonprofit organizations to implement the provisions of Division 21; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Water Commissioners of the City of Long Beach applied for and received Conservancy grant funding to implement the Direct Install Garden (DIG) two-year pilot program (the "Program"); and

WHEREAS, the Program restores the urban watershed health by installing drought-tolerant plants with efficient irrigation systems, increases resiliency to climate change through expanding the urban forest in the City of Long Beach, and engages members of disadvantaged communities with jobs, job training, education, multi-lingual resources, and community beautification; and

WHEREAS, the Conservation Corps of Long Beach (the "Corps") was identified as an effective partner to help make the application more competitive through the collaboration and expansion of a non-traditional alliance, addressing the needs of low-income and underserved populations and within job training and educational components of what is considered to be "multi-benefit"; and
