#### RECOMMENDATION:

Adopt the attached Resolution in support of and authorizing an application to the California Department of Public Health Office of Family Planning to provide Community Challenge Grant Services. (Citywide)

### **DISCUSSION**

On October 22, 2009, the California Department of Public Health announced the availability of approximately \$18 million per year in grant funds for the Community Challenge Grant (CCG) Projects. Funds will be made available for a maximum of five fiscal years for the period beginning July 1, 2010 and ending June 30, 2015. Grant awards (following a Request for Application (RFA) process) may be funded up to \$250,000 per year, with a range of \$150,000 (minimum) to \$250,000 (maximum) per grant award. Eligible applicants include county and/or city governments, local health jurisdictions, public entities, and private non-profit corporations organized for non-sectarian purposes. The City of Long Beach is a current CCG grant recipient, with funding in the amount of \$210,000 per year, reaching thousands of participants through outreach, multi-session workshops, parent education sessions, community events, mentoring, and service learning activities.

The grant is designed to reduce the number of teenage pregnancies and teenage single parents, and to promote responsible parenting and the involvement of the biological father of children born to teen mothers in the economic, social, and emotional support of his children. The City's program will work with they key populations identified in the RFA, including sexually active adolescents, pregnant and parenting teens, parents and families, young adults at risk for unwed motherhood or absentee fatherhood, and personnel who work with youth. The grant application is due to the State by January 7, 2010. Should the City receive the grant, implementation would commence in July 1, 2010 and continue for up to five years.

This item was reviewed by Deputy City Attorney Linda Trang on November 2, 2009, and Budget and Performance Management Bureau Manager David Wodynski on October 30, 2009.

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## TIMING CONSIDERATIONS

City Council action is requested on November 17, 2009 in order to include a copy of the Resolution in the grant application.

# FISCAL IMPACT

Currently there is no fiscal impact associated with the approval of this recommendation. If awarded, an appropriations increase will be requested as part of the quarterly appropriations process. There will be no City match associated with this grant.

#### RESOLUTION NO.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LONG BEACH IN SUPPORT OF AND AUTHORIZING AN APPLICATION TO THE CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH TO CONTINUE SERVICES UNDER THE TEEN PREGNANCY PREVENTION COMMUNITY CHALLENGE GRANT (CCG) PROGRAM

WHEREAS, the California Department of Public Health Office of Family Planning released a Request for Application ("RFA") to solicit applications to fund community-based and community-driven programs that address the problems of teen and unintended pregnancy through prevention and health education activities; and

WHEREAS, the Office of Family Planning ("OFP") Community Challenge Grant ("CCG") was enacted in 1996 (California Welfare and Institutions Code Section 18993-18993.9 Appendix 1) and, in 2003, was placed in OFP (California Welfare and Institutions Code Sections 14504.1) and administered under the Teen Pregnancy Prevention ("TTP") Program; and

WHEREAS, CCG funded projects are located in a variety of settings, including community based organizations, county and local governments, and schools, using various interventions that incorporate youth development principles to help adolescents avoid pregnancy and sexually transmitted infections ("STIs"); and

WHEREAS, the City of Long Beach has seen reductions in teen births and STIs, but teens continue to have disproportionately high rates of unintended pregnancy and STIs; and

WHEREAS, the City of Long Beach Department of Health and Human Services has provided services through the use of CCG funds since the program's

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inception in 1996 to provide educational presentations, community events, mentoring,

service learning, and other health promotion activities; and
