Dear Nick,

I received the notice for a public hearing on December 10^{th} and wanted to voice my concerns as the owner of the property next door at 924 Redondo Ave, Long Beach.

• Parking- will there be a parking lot (rear?) on the property for the users? There is limited street parking in this area. Should every plot renter be there at the same time there will be no street parking for the adjacent properties. The community garden does not require parking to establish the use, as the garden is intended to serve the immediate

area and encourage walking and biking to the site rather than by automobile.

- Fencing- the fence on the north side of the lot is only 5' high chain link. Will this fence be replaced with a 6'6" fence? The current fence can be easily climbed making it a security issue for the adjoining apartment building. The existing fence will be improved with a new fence, which Staff has included as a condition of approval for the project. The final design of the fence, material, and height is still to be determined by the applicant.
- Lighting- Will there be lighting installed on the property? No lighting is proposed for the site and the proposed hours of operation will align with the daylight hours from 7:30 am to dusk. Low dim landscaping lighting shouldn't be an issue but higher flood lights will present an inconvenience to the apartment building residents. N/A
- Access- will there be access after dark? With the shorter days in the winter, people tending to their gardens will disturb the apartment building residents. Actual closing times will vary upon the season but there will be no operations beyond dusk. Staff has included a condition of approval solidifying the hours of operation as well.
- Security- will there be locked gates for only the renters of the plots? There will be a pad lock with code given to paid members only. The city's homeless may find this a convenient place to set up camp. This will limit the access of the plot.
- Noise- How will excessive noise be addressed by the owners Long Beach Organic or others? Noise generated from the garden will be subject to the decibel levels allowed in the district (which is 65 dBA, for district 3). For additional insight, see examples noise sources and range of sound generated below.

"A-weighted sound readings adjust for low frequencies, similar to the how the human ear persives sound. An increase of 10 decibels is often perseived by the human ear as "twice as loud" whereas a decrease of 10 decibels is often perseived as "half as loud." Please note perseived noise levels vary depending on distance from the source.

I will try to be at the public hearing on Dec 10 but am having neck surgery a few days before and may be still recovering. Please present these issues to the applicant and council during the meeting and reply in writing. Ok.
