Recommendation to Name the New Dog Park at Pacific Avenue and 9<sup>th</sup> Street as "K-9 Corner"

DISCUSSION

On August 4, 2009, First District Councilmember Robert Garcia sent a memo (Attachment A) to the Mayor and Members of the City Council requesting that the newly constructed dog park at Pacific Avenue and 9<sup>th</sup> Street be named "K-9 Corner."

Pursuant to Administrative Regulation (AR) 8 – 7, the City Council referred the request to the Parks and Recreation Commission and the Housing and Neighborhoods Committee.

The Parks and Recreation Commission considered this request at their August 20, 2009 meeting (Attachment B), unanimously approved this request, and are forwarding their recommendation to the Housing and Neighborhoods Committee for adoption.

The Administrative Regulations AR 8-7 applies to the naming of all public land, buildings and facilities. AR 8-7 provides several policies to guide the consideration of a naming request. The following are those policies:

- The name should incorporate Long Beach whenever important for civic recognition or identification;
- A name in honor of a recognized geographic area, a topographic feature or a historically significant event may be appropriate;
- A name in honor of persons or families who have donated the land or a substantial portion of the improvement costs may be appropriate when applicable;
- A name in honor of a person or persons who have served the nation, the State of California, and/or the City of Long Beach in an exceptional or distinguished manner may be appropriate if warranted by service of major significance;
- A name in honor of a living person, or of a deceased person within one year of their death, is not appropriate, unless the significance of that person's contribution is worthy of an exception to the policy;
- A name in honor of a person is not appropriate when a name in honor of another person has been given to the same site, building or facility in the past;

- A name in honor of a person is not appropriate if that person has been overly recognized in the past; and,
- A name may be selected through a competition or a contest.

The park, which was proposed by the North Pine Neighborhood Alliance and designed and funded wholly by the Redevelopment Agency (Agency), is the result of collaboration between the Agency, the MTA, and community leaders. The new park will be the first dog park on the Westside and an important addition to a community with limited open space and many dogs.

Residents have requested the park be named K-9 Corner as special recognition and to honor police officers who train and handle police dogs. The use of dogs in police work is an extremely important means of keeping residents safe and enforcing the law. Naming the park after K-9's would be a small gesture of recognition and appreciation for these brave public servants. K-9 also denotes the location of the park, which is on 9<sup>th</sup> Street.

### **TIMING CONSIDERATIONS**

City Council action on this matter is not time critical.

### FISCAL IMPACT

There is no fiscal impact with the recommended action.

### IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE COMMITTEE:

Concur with the recommendation that naming the new dog park at Pacific Avenue and 9<sup>th</sup> Street as "K-9 Corner" is appropriate and refer the recommendation to the City Council for approval.

### RECOMMENDATION:

Recommend to the Housing and Neighborhoods Committee and the full City Council that "K-9 Corner" is an appropriate name for the new dog park at Pacific Avenue and 9<sup>th</sup> Street.

### **DISCUSSION**

The action before the Parks and Recreation Commission is to recommend the name "K-9 Corner" for the new dog park that has been constructed at Pacific Avenue and 9<sup>th</sup> Street.

On August 4, 2009, First District Council Member Robert Garcia sent a memo (Attachment A) to the Mayor and Members of the City Council requesting that the newly constructed dog park at Pacific Avenue and 9<sup>th</sup> Street be named K-9 Corner. Attached are an aerial view (Attachment B), the park design (Attachment C), and a photo of the finalized park (Attachment D).

Pursuant to Administrative Regulation (AR) 8–7, the City Council has referred the request to the Parks and Recreation Commission for consideration of the proposed name. The Parks and Recreation Commission recommendation will be transmitted to the City Council.

- The name should incorporate Long Beach whenever important for civic recognition or identification;

Naming new dog park at Pacific and Ninth "K-9 Corner"

### Background:

A new Dog Park has been constructed at Pacific Avenue and Ninth Street. The park, which was proposed by the North Pine Neighborhood Alliance, is the result of collaboration between the city, the MTA and community leaders. The new park will be the first Dog Park on the Westside and an important addition to a community with limited open space and many dogs.

Administrative Regulation 8-7 applies to the naming of all public land, buildings, and facilities and provides several policies to guide the consideration of a naming request, including "A name in honor of a person or persons who have served the nation, the State of California, and/or the City of Long Beach in an exceptional or distinguished manner may be appropriate if warranted by service of major significance."

The use of dogs in police work is an extremely important means of keeping residents safe and enforcing the law. The officers who train and handle police dogs are deserving of special recognition, and this park provides that opportunity. Naming the park "K-9" would be a small gesture of recognition and appreciation for these brave public servants.

K-9 also denotes the location of the park, which is on Ninth Street. Residents have requested the park be named "K-9 Corner".

### Recommendation:



"K-9 Corner" Dog Park at 9th St. and Pacific Ave.






LONG BEACH DOG PARK LANDSCAPE BASE
