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RESOLUTION NO.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LONG BEACH IN SUPPORT OF ASSEMBLY BILL 664 (COOPER), "WORKERS' COMPENSATION: INJURY: COMMUNICABLE DISEASE"

WHEREAS, Assembly Bill 664 (Cooper), related to workers' compensation injuries, communicable disease, ("Assembly Bill 664") would define "injury" to include being exposed to or contracting, on or after January 1, 2020, a communicable disease, including coronavirus disease 2019 ("COVID-2019"), that is the subject of a state or local declaration of a state of emergency issued on or after January 1, 2020, for certain state and local firefighting personnel, peace officers, certain hospital employees, and certain fire and rescue services coordinators under the Office of Emergency Services; and

WHEREAS, Assembly Bill 664 would create a conclusive presumption that
the injury arose out of and in the course of employment, and would be extended to a
covered person following termination of service for a period of 90 days, commencing with
the last date actually worked in the specified capacity; and

WHEREAS, Assembly Bill 664 would apply to specified injuries that
 occurred prior to the declaration of the applicable state of emergency; and

21 WHEREAS, in addition to full hospital, surgical, medical treatment, disability 22 indemnity, and death benefits as provided for by the proposed legislation, Assembly Bill 23 664 would also require reasonable costs of reimbursement to the employee for certain 24 items, including but not limited to, emergency equipment or personal protective 25 equipment ("PPE") that provides, or is ancillary to other emergency equipment or PPE 26 that provides, protection described in the proposed legislation; and 27 WHEREAS, Assembly Bill 664 would declare that both of the following 28 policies and goals should be implemented whenever a state or local state of emergency

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exists: funding necessary to implement Assembly Bill 664 should be prioritized over other
funding authorized for purposes of addressing the state of emergency, and an employee
who is eligible for compensation pursuant to Assembly Bill 664 should be reimbursed as
described and should not be required to use their accrued vacation leave, personal leave,
compensatory leave, sick leave, or any other leave, other than applicable benefits made
available pursuant to this division, in order to be reimbursed; and

7 WHEREAS, Assembly Bill 664 would exempt its provisions from the
8 apportionment requirements of existing law; and

9 WHEREAS, first responders and front-line workers as identified in
10 Assembly Bill 664 provide vital public safety and health services that may put them at a
11 higher risk of exposure to and infection of communicable diseases, including but not
12 limited to COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, the City wishes to support Assembly Bill 664 and show its commitment to this proposed law in anticipation of its enactment; and

WHEREAS, at its May 19, 2020, meeting, the City Council directed staff to
bring back this Resolution supporting Assembly Bill 664 and this Resolution implements
the direction provided;

18 NOW, THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of Long Beach resolves as19 follows:

Section 1. The City Council of the City of Long Beach declares support
for Assembly Bill 664 (Cooper) and its commitment to this proposed law in anticipation of
its enactment, and in support of those first responders and front-line workers specified
therein who provide vital services that may heighten their risk of exposure to and infection
of communicable diseases, such as COVID-19.

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
