HONORABLE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL City of Long Beach California

RECOMMENDATION:

Receive and file a report on the status of the Independent Redistricting Commission Plan.

DISCUSSION

On November 6, 2018, Long Beach voters approved Measure DDD – City of Long Beach Independent Citizens Redistricting Commission. The measure amended the City Charter (Charter) to create an Independent Redistricting Commission (Commission) of Long Beach residents to determine the boundaries of Council districts every ten years after the national census.

This report is required by the Charter to update the Mayor and the City Council on the Commission plan (Attachment) by January 1, 2020.

This matter was reviewed by Deputy City Attorney Amy R. Webber on November 26, 2019 and by Budget Analysis Officer Julissa José-Murray on December 2, 2019.

TIMING CONSIDERATIONS

City Council action is requested on December 10, 2020, to meet the City Charter requirement of a report to the Mayor and the City Council by January 1, 2020.

FISCAL IMPACT

The proposed redistricting plan spans three fiscal years at an estimated cost of \$1.2 million. The FY 20 Adopted Budget included \$250,000 to initiate the proposed work plan. The City Clerk Department is working with City Manager's Office to identify funding sources for the remaining unfunded balance remaining in FY 20 and will return to the City Council for a budget adjustment during FY 20 to fully fund this year's costs. Funding for the FY 21 and FY 22 redistricting costs will be identified as part of those respective budget development processes. The recommended action has a moderate staffing impact beyond the normal budgeted scope of duties and is consistent with City Council priorities. There is no local job impact associated with this recommendation.

INDEPENDENT REDISTRICTING COMMISSION PLAN

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INTRODUCTION

On November 6, 2018, voters approved Measure DDD – City of Long Beach Independent Citizens Redistricting Commission. The measure amended the Long Beach City Charter (Charter) to establish an Independent Redistricting Commission (Commission) of Long Beach residents to determine the boundaries of City Council (Council) Districts every ten years after the national census. The Commission has been given the exclusive authority to redraw the nine Council district boundaries through an open and transparent process. Within six months after the census data is released by the federal government, the Commission will adopt a final map establishing new Council District boundaries and create a final report explaining its decision.

The last time redistricting occurred was in 2011, the redistricting process was mandated by the Council. The previous Charter Section provided the opportunity for redistricting every five years. The process began with the Planning Commission, which certified the Federal Census Data and recommended a need for redistricting to the Council. The Council held public meetings and directed City staff to conduct the redistricting process. Following the public input and the Council deliberations, the final map with new district boundaries was adopted by an ordinance on August 2, 2011.

The new Charter sections create an Independent Redistricting Commission to determine the boundaries through a process that is separated into two different components. The first component is the recruitment and selection of Commission members and the second component is the Commission meetings to redraw the Council district boundaries.

SUMMARY MILESTONES

The summary milestones represent a timeline of the two components of the redistricting process outlined by the Charter. A general timeline of the process is available in Exhibit A.


COMMISSIONER RECRUITMENT

The application period will be from April 1, 2020 through June 30, 2020. The communication and outreach plans will facilitate the recruitment of a qualified applicant pool reflecting the diversity of the City.




COMMISSION MEETINGS

The Commission will meet from December 2020 through September 2021 to complete the redistricting process. The City Attorney and LBTV will review all proposed meeting locations to ensure ADA compliance, ample parking, and access to technological requirements. The City Attorney requested all offsite meetings to vary in time to encourage participation.



COMMISSION MEETINGS CONTINUED



OUTREACH

The outreach for the Commission will consist of several different advertisement campaigns using Print, Digital, Video, and Public Service Announcements. The advertisements will also be translated in Khmer, Spanish, and Tagalog to recruit and notify the City's diverse communities. The Commission will use advertisements with the 2020 Census campaign to reduce costs and promote the relationship between both efforts.

DEPARTMENT RESPONSIBILITES

APPLICATION & SELECTION PROCESS


The Commission will consist of 13 commissioners and two alternates. The alternates may fully participate in commission deliberations but may not vote. The members will be selected through an application and selection process, where they will be subject to the qualifications and conflicts of interests outlined in the Charter Section 2504. See Exhibit B for conflicts of interests.

The City Clerk will coordinate the recruitment of the commissioners, beginning with the initial application period opening from April 1, 2020 to June 30, 2020. If the applicant pool, by June 30, 2020, does not have at least 35 qualified applicants, including three qualified applicants from each existing Council District, the application period will be reopened for an additional month until July 31, 2020.

After the close of the application period, the City Clerk will review and remove individuals who do not meet the requirements set in the Charter. The Ethics Commission will create a subpool of 20 to 30 potential commissioners, including two from each existing Council District by November 1, 2020. Once the subpool has been created, the Chair of the Ethics Commission will randomly select nine names, one from each Council District, who will serve as Redistricting Commissioners. The remaining four Redistricting Commissioners and two alternates will be selected by the first nine Commissioners appointed. The Commission must be fully established no later than December 1, 2020.

COMMUNICATION PLAN - RECRUITMENT PHASE

The first wave of communication will be to encourage the City of Long Beach residents to apply for the Independent Redistricting Commission.



Recruitment Education

The education phase for the 2020 Commission recruitment portion began in August 2019 and will run through February 2020. Early education and outreach are intended to increase the understanding of why the Independent Redistricting Commission happens, giving residents background of the process and the value of its importance for the community. Residents will also begin to be informed of when and how to apply during this phase.

Recruitment Motivation

The motivation phase will be in the month of March 2020, the purpose of this phase is to ensure residents understand how important their voice is for the community. To keep residents engaged, this phase will provide education on the community benefits gained from joining the commission. Residents will receive more information on what to expect when applying as well as eligibility requirements.

Recruitment Activation

The activation phase will run from April 2020 to June 2020, with the purpose of encouraging residents to begin applying to the Commission. Residents will be actively reminded to apply as well as providing those residents with support when needed.

REDISTRICTING COMMISSION APPLICATION

Applicants will use the following application to apply online, by mail, or in person and will be translated in Khmer, Spanish, and Tagalog.

WEBSITE

The Commission website was published in November 2019. The website has information for the public to learn about the Commission and will facilitate participation in the process through the mapping tool and making outreach materials available.



CONSULTANT RFP

The request for proposal (RFP) for a redistricting consultant is scheduled to be released in December 2019. The consultant will assist with Commission staff with the redistricting process and provide advice to the Commissioners during deliberations to redraw the district boundaries. The RFP also included an online mapping tool to create draft maps for the public to submit to the Commission. An additional consultant will be hired by the City Attorney's Office to provide legal advice to the Commission.

COMMISSION MEETINGS


The Commission will meet approximately 20 times beginning in December 2020 through September 2021. At the initial meetings, the commissioners will be trained on the requirements of the Charter, federal and state law, the Brown Act and open meeting requirements, and general rules of parliamentary procedure.

Following the commissioner training, the Commission will meet once in every district after the release of the Census Data in March 2021. The list of potential offsite meeting locations in each District is below.

COMMUNICATION PLAN - COMMISSION MEETING PHASE

The second wave of communications will come after the commission has been selected, it is intended for residents to be informed about how they can get involved.



Redistricting Education

This phase will run from December 2020 to March 2021, while the Commission is training, residents will be informed of what is to be expected during the 2021 Redistricting process. Residents will be informed on how they can get involved and when the meetings will take place.

Redistricting Motivation/Activation

This phase will run from April 2021 to September 2021 to get residents in the community interest in attending the meetings. These meetings will be hosted around the city and community representation will be encouraged.

Awareness

The final phase will be used to notify residents of the updates as well as informing communities that are affected by the changes of their new district through outreach efforts.

MAP REQUIREMENTS

The Commission is subject to the criteria outlined in Charter Section 2506. The final map will be drawn so that the Council districts are nearly equal as practicable in total population, complies with federal and state laws, and each Council district is geographically contiguous.

The Commission must consider the criteria in the following order of priority when drawing the final map:

- 1. The geographic integrity of a neighborhood that minimizes its division.
- 2. Communities of interest that are a contiguous population that shares common social and economic interests.
- 3. Neighborhoods and communities sharing a common language, history, culture and identity.
- 4. Geography and topography.
- 5. District boundaries that are easily identifiable and understandable. Districts should be bounded by natural and artificial barriers, by street lines, and/or City boundary lines.
- 6. Districts should be geographically compact such that nearby areas of population are not bypassed for more distant population.
- 7. All lines must correspond to census blocks in order to preserve the validity of data and avoid arbitrary boundaries.
- 8. Other criteria that do not conflict with the other requirements and criteria listed in the City Charter or with state or federal law.

In addition, the Commission will number each Council district to keep as many residents as possible in the Council district they currently reside, must not consider the residence of any individual, or draw districts to favor or discriminate against a political party.

FINAL MAP

The final map adopted by the Commission will go into effect immediately upon adoption and include an explanation of how the map complies with the redistricting requirements and criteria outlined in the Charter along with justifications of any boundaries that do not comply. The final map must be adopted within six months after the 2020 Census data is release and will be sent to the Los Angeles Register Recorder's Office once adopted.

Finally, the commission will create a report to the Mayor and Council recommending changes, including amendments to the Charter regarding the timeline and deadlines for improvements to the process in the future. The Council can adopt changes suggested by the Commission by an ordinance.


