Honorable Mayor and Members of the City Council,

I expect the oil production tax to pass in November. And with that the expectation that we have a strategic analytic and innovative plan to collect environmental impact data and project and test alternatives. This modeling will put Long Beach into a 'safer place' moving forward and be a source for our Southern California region as well as similar environments globally.

I urge you to take action now so that we can collective harness the many city, i.e. CAAP and regional CBO's actions into a cohesive and effective effort. As others have said, the City needs to be prepared for what that means in terms of future revenues and on-going maintenance of oil fields and capping of leaking wells. And that is just the beginning.

I hope I don't live to see a fire storm in Long Beach. But it could very well happen. This year, over 3 million acres have been burned to the ground in our state. And we continue to battle some of the most destructive fires known in the last century.

I applaud the City Council for the steps they have taken thus far to add the Oil Barrel Production Tax on this November 3rd ballot and now urge you to prioritize our Climate Crisis, as it affects our health, our youth, and **our older adults**. Here is a set of starting points:

- Create a Climate Adaptation Fund specifically for reducing dependency on oil, that could fund capital improvement projects, Home Weatherization Programs, Appliance upgrades, cool pavement and cool roof programs, and tree planting.
- Allocate \$700k in the first year of collections of the Oil Barrel Tax income to implementation of the Climate Action and Adaptation and 50% of tax revenue there after.
- Utilize the Equity Toolkit and the CalEnviroScreen to assess priority spending areas.

Today is the day to make the down payments on our shared vision of a safe climate future for everyone in Long Beach.

Re: File Item 20-0909 - Oil Barrel Production Tax Revenue Spending Intent Resolution

Dear Mayor Garcia and the Members of the City Council,

This letter is to submit comments regarding the proposed intent resolution for the Oil Barrel Production Tax revenues should an increase be approved by the voters. Our comments focus on Section 2(A) of the proposed resolution, which is related to the climate and environment.

Understanding the intent resolution is designed to outline the high-level priorities for potential new revenues, we appreciate and are supportive of the resolution. The resolution's priorities include reducing greenhouse gas emissions, improving air and water quality, and implementing the city's Clean Air Action and Adaptation Plan or other environmental strategic plans.

We do urge; however, the City Council to make a commitment to climate and environmental equity during the implementation phase or in the resolution itself. Both the "Community Health" and "Children and Youth Services and Programs" sections of the proposed resolution include equity language. Disadvantaged and low-income communities are disproportionately impacted by poor air and water quality as well as the climate crisis. As such, it is important for climate and environmental equity to be prioritized as well.

Further, our prior letters and testimony to the City Council and the Sustainable City Commission included other recommendations for the allocation and implementation of potential new revenues. Particularly important is a guaranteed minimum percentage of new revenues that will be spent in disadvantaged and low-income communities. We ask the City Council to consider these other recommendations should the measure pass.

Lastly, we also ask the city to seek the advice and guidance of local environmental and environmental justice organizations when designing and implementing the climate and environmental aspects of this initiative. Ensuring the community has a say in the design and priorities of the effort will be important to its long-term success.

We work with highschool youth of color across the state and locally. This comment is in support of Measure US and for you all to vote to adopt the resolution to prioritize the spending of the Oil Barrel Production Tax Revenues for the specific purpose to fund our fight against climate change and to support the health and well-being of our youth and communities most harmed by COVID and institutional racism.
