Greetings,

I submit this comment as a local business owner, co-founder and coordinator of the Long Beach Sustainable Business Network, lead author of an upcoming U.S. Action for Climate Empowerment Strategic Planning Framework (advancing UNFCCC Article 6), author of and author of *What If Solving the Climate Crisis Is Simple?* I am also author of the Aquarium of the Pacific's *A Citizens' Guide to Building a Climate Resilient Long Beach* and *A Personal Guide to Becoming Climate Resilient.*

The "framework" process I mentioned above involves some 200 participants from 150 different organizations and networks who came together to recommend how the next U.S. presidential administration should advance the Action for Climate Empowerment agenda (known as "ACE" and referenced in Article 6 of the UNFCCC treaty and reaffirmed in Article 12 of the Paris Agreement). This diverse community of ACE actors in the U.S. agrees on several points that I urge you to consider.

- 1. Engaging and empowering the public in finding and implementing solutions to the climate crisis is crucial. Our resources for doing this work are deep, but they are not aligned and, for the most part, the public has not engaged as much as it needs to.
- 2. The center of climate action is cities. People experience the impact of climate change in the communities where they live, and this is also where people can participate in finding and implementing solutions. Cities also play a leading role in meeting state emissions reduction mandates.
- 3. Climate solutions are inseparable from climate justice. People of color and members of low-income communities already experience the greatest harm from air pollution, and they face the greatest risks in a warming climate. The ACE community is calling on decision-makers to establish genuinely inclusive decision-making process that do not patronize these segments of the public but genuinely empower them.

Time is of the essence. Effective action to reduce carbon emissions and make neighborhoods and businesses more resilient is a critical need. Therefore, climate action and climate justice should be central to all civic decisions and be a co-top priority in the negotiation and evaluation of every policy and budgetary proposal.

I would be happy to discuss these issues with you.
