Subject: 2011 Redistricting Background Information

In support of your work on redistricting, City staff is providing you with background information about the last redistricting process in 2011. The purpose of this is to provide you with context for establishing a set of map evaluation criteria and operating procedures for the 2021 Long Beach Independent Redistricting process.

Charter Requirements

In 2011, the City's last redistricting process followed City Charter Section 103 of Article I, which was repealed on November 6, 2018, by Measure DDD. Section 103 required that the City be divided, for electoral purposes, into nine (9) Councilmanic Districts that are approximately equal in population. Section 103 also required that redistricting occur every five years or at any other time directed by the City Council upon receipt of findings from the Planning Commission on the number of inhabitants in each Councilmanic District. If the Planning Commission's findings indicated that Councilmanic Districts were not approximately equal in population, the City Council was required to redistrict the City by ordinance into (9) Councilmanic Districts. However, unlike Measure DDD, Section 103 did not specify criteria and a process for redistricting beyond ensuring for an approximately equal population.

2011 Redistricting Process

The 2011 redistricting project spanned approximately six (6) months, from February 2011 to August 2011, and included seven Council meetings and one Planning Commission meeting. See attachment for all staff reports and supporting documentation relating to the 2011 redistricting process. The City Council adopted criteria before starting the redistricting process to guide staff through the process. City staff drafted criteria for City Council to consider for adoption utilizing City Council feedback from the initial Study Session held on February 15, 2011. The intent of the proposed criteria was to: (1) ensure for a smooth process; (2) provide transparency in the process; (3) allow for meaningful public input; (4) provide direction City staff as they bring options back to the City Council; and (5) ensure a legally defensible outcome. The City Council adopted the proposed criteria on March 22, 2011. The public engagement occurred at community meetings as requested by City Council members and during City Council meetings on redistricting. At community meetings, residents received information on the redistricting process and were able to provide input on how they would prefer the Council District lines be drawn. Residents were able to provide input on draft maps during public comment at City Council meetings on redistricting.



February 15, 2011

City Council held a study session to receive and file a presentation on the redistricting process for Councilmanic Districts. City Council directed staff to return with criteria for approval.

March 22, 2011

Council adopted criteria for the 2011 redistricting process with an amendment of criterion 13 to avoid the splitting of census blocks where appropriate.

May 5, 2011

The Planning Commission reviewed and transmitted the 2010 Census Data to City Council.

May 24, 2011

City staff presented the updated population numbers for current City Council Districts, using the new 2010 Census Data, which demonstrated a population imbalance. City Council directed City staff to manage redistricting to near a 5% variance for those over/under 5%; to retain district lines as close as possible to their current positions; to move lines to accommodate population and not for parks or monuments; and request that the agenda item be laid over to the meeting of Tuesday, June 7, 2011.

June 7, 2011

Staff brought four (4) redistricting options to City Council for review and requested direction on the preferred redistricting options to be released for public comment.

City Council approved a single (1) map to use for community input based on the map labeled as Option No. 4, with the changes to:

- 1. Unify the Bixby neighborhood up to San Antonio Drive;
- 2. Keep the West Long Beach area whole by keeping Map No. 4, Area G in the 7th District:
- 3. Exclude Map No. 4, Area D;
- 4. Move from the 6th District to the 1st District the area between Anaheim Street and 11th Street, bounded by Long Beach Boulevard and Atlantic Avenue;
- 5. Move from the 2nd District to the 6th District the area between 11th Street and Anaheim Street, bounded by Mahanna Avenue and Gardenia Avenue; and
- 6. Move from the 6th District to the 2nd District, the area between 11th Street and 10th Street, bounded by Almond Avenue and Orange Avenue.

July 5, 2011

Staff brought the publicly released map to City Council for direction. City Council approved the City Council Proposed Redistricting Plan, with the following changes:

- 1. Exclude the previously proposed new areas of Bixby Knolls (Area C on the City Council Proposed Plan); and,
- 2. Include in the 7th Council District the area going west on Bixby Road from Atlantic Avenue to the Blue Line right-of-way, and all areas south of the above description to the 7th Council District boundary.

Also, staff received direction to bring a draft ordinance reflecting the approved map.

July 19, 2011

Staff brought the draft ordinance amending Section 1.20.010 of the Long Beach Municipal Code relating to the boundaries of the City's nine (9) council districts read the first time and laid over to the next regular meeting of the City Council for final reading.

August 2, 2011

The ordinance was read for the second time and adopted by the City Council.

Subsequent Redistricting Actions Prior to Measure DDD Approval

In 2017, the Mid-Decade Redistricting did not occur, and staff received direction to review the population data after the 2020 Census.

Redistricting Process

February 15, 2011



- Section 103 of the City Charter requires "approximately an equal number of inhabitants"
- The opportunity for redistricting in Long Beach happens every 5 years
- Last Redistricting was in 2001
- In 2006 the City Council made a finding that redistricting was not necessary



- Requires the Planning Commission to ascertain the number of inhabitants in each District
- Requires the Council to redistrict by ordinance
- Does not allow any other process to redistrict



California Redistricting Process

- California has a new process for the State Legislature and Congressional district:
 - 14 member Commission
 - Different timeline (August 15, 2011 deadline)
 - Different rules
- Does not directly affect the City of Long Beach process
- Long Beach can participate through comments as individuals or the City as a whole

Process

- Federal release of Census Data
- Planning Commission
 - Certification of population data
 - Recommendation on need for redistricting
- City Council public meetings on potential scenarios
 - Public input
 - Direction to staff
- LBUSD / City College submits plan
- Final ordinance by the City Council

2011 Timeline

- February 15: Council study session
- End of March: Census data released
- April: Planning Commission reviews population and forwards to the Council
- May: Boundary adjustment process begins if districts are out of balance
- June August: Public input / public hearings / staff submit maps / decision by City Council
- August 31: New boundaries are due to Los Angeles County Registrar - Recorder for 2012 election



LBUSD / City College

- Both the School District and the City College may need to redistrict
- The City Council makes the ultimate decision on those boundaries
- The City is requesting that each of those entities perform their own process
- Consensus agreements will be forwarded to the Council no later than August 1, 2011



August 31, 2011 Deadline

- Required to have the second ordinance read and adopted by August 31, 2011
- City Clerk will forward to the LA County Registrar
- Necessary to require enough public notification time prior to 2012 Council election

Roles

- Community: Public input
- City Council: Direction to staff and adoption of the final ordinance
- City Manager: Staff support for Redistricting process and coordination
- City Clerk: Transmittal of ordinance to the County, verification with the County, oversight of election process, consolidation of precincts and voting centers within new district boundaries, reporting of any necessary reconciliations prior to next election, and assisting voters with finding their districts leading up to Election Day

Roles

- City Attorney: Legal oversight
- Technology Services / Development Services: GIS mapping / boundaries and technical support for census data
- Planning Commission: Certification of the data and need for redistricting
- County of Los Angeles: Provide guidance on submission process, implement new district boundary lines, and voter outreach

Need for Criteria

- Redistricting Criteria are important to:
 - Ensure a smooth process
 - Provide transparency in the process
 - Allow for meaningful public input
 - Provide direction to staff as they bring options back to the City Council
 - Ensure a legally defensible outcome

Criteria

- Deviations from mean population should be as small as possible, but not greater than +/- 5%
- Splits in neighborhoods, ethnic communities and other groups having a clear identify should be avoided
- Districts should be as compact as possible, avoiding gerrymandering
- Residences of Councilpersons should remain within their respective districts
- Boundaries should, wherever practicable, follow major roads and other readily identifiable features

Criteria

- Preservation of communities of interest, where possible

- The courts will closely review the results if any underrepresented minority groups are impacted
- Almost all litigation results in impacts to under-represented minorities
- Redistricting cannot dilute minority-strength ("cracking")
- Similarly, it cannot over-concentrate minorities ("packing")

Public Input

- Public Hearings / Council Meetings
 - Public meetings to discuss population numbers, criteria,
 preliminary maps and direction to staff on proposed changes
 - Input on the maps at City Council meetings
 - Input on the ordinance
- Redistricting Website
 - Repository for comments and input to staff and City Council
 - Display site for official documents and maps



Process After Redistricting is Complete

- Los Angeles County will verify the lines and formal boundary descriptions
- City will engage in an outreach process to inform residents that boundaries have changed
 - Press coverage / Videos / Social Media
 - Website database showing new address
- Official notification of their change will come from the County in their sample ballot for registered voters

RECOMMENDATION

Adopt criteria for the upcoming redistricting process as recommended by the City Manager, or adopt alternative criteria as deemed appropriate by the City Council. (Citywide)

DISCUSSION

At the City Council Study Session on February 15, 2011, the City Council received a presentation regarding the upcoming redistricting process. A component of this presentation was the City Manager's recommendation for the criteria that should be used in the redistricting process. Although the feedback regarding the criteria provided by the City Council at the Study Session was favorable, staff recommends the City Council formally adopt the criteria.

The recommended criteria for the redistricting process are provided below. (The criteria have been numbered for identification purposes only.)

- 1. Transparency and public information should be of the highest priority;
- 2. Staff will receive input from many sources, but formal direction will come from the City Council in open session;
- 3. Direction to staff on adjustments shall occur in public session of the City Council;
- 4. Requested information will be shared publicly with all members of the City Council and the community;
- 5. Staff will provide the City Council with several options, and request direction until consensus is reached;
- 6. Deviations from mean population should be as small as possible, but not greater than +/- 5%;
- 7. Splits in neighborhoods, ethnic communities and other groups having a clear identity should be avoided;

- 8. Districts should be as compact as possible, avoiding gerrymandering;
- 9. Residences of Councilpersons should remain within their respective districts;
- 10. Boundaries should, wherever practicable, follow major roads and other readily identifiable features:
- 11. Preservation of communities of interest, where possible;
- 12. Boundary adjustments should generally consist of easily identifiable blocks/ areas;
- 13. Use Census tract boundaries wherever possible; Redistricting shall not split a Census block;
- 14. Preservation of population cores which have consistently been associated with particular districts;
- 15. Avoidance of large scale dislocations of district populations;
- 16. Recognition of inevitable and historical topographic and geographic limitations on district boundaries; and
- 17. Redistricting should focus on areas of population, and not on areas of non-population (parks, businesses, etc.).

This matter was reviewed by Chief Assistant City Attorney Heather A. Mahood on March 10, 2011 and by Budget Management Officer Victoria Bell on March 11, 2011.

RECOMMENDATION:

Transmit to the City Council the 2010 Census population totals by City Council District for use in the Councilmanic Redistricting process. (Citywide)

DISCUSSION

Section 103 of the Long Beach City Charter reads in part:

Commencing the second quarter of 1981 and at intervals of five (5) years, or at any other time the City Council may direct, the Planning Commission shall ascertain the number of inhabitants in each Councilmanic District and report its finding to the City Council. If the report shows that the Councilmanic Districts are not approximately equal in number of inhabitants, the City Council shall, by ordinance, redistrict the City into nine (9) Councilmanic Districts, each having approximately an equal number of inhabitants.

The City Manager's Office of Government Affairs and Strategic Initiatives is coordinating the preparation and processing of Census 2010 census data to be used in the 2011 Councilmanic Redistricting process. The Planning Commission has the role of reviewing the population figures by City Council District and forwarding that information to the City Council.

The City Council will use this data to determine if there is a significant imbalance between Council District populations, which would trigger the need to redistrict. The Council District ideal population (citywide population divided by nine) and percent difference from ideal population will be key factors in making this determination. District populations that are more than +/- 5 percent from the ideal population would be considered first for District boundary changes to bring their population totals within the +/- 5 percent threshold.

As shown in the table below, Long Beach's population increased by only 0.2 percent between 2000 and 2010, according to the 2010 Census data. Population change varied by Council District, with five districts increasing and four decreasing in inhabitants recorded by the Census. The largest increase was 2.6 percent in the 8th District and the largest decrease was –3.3 percent in the 1st District.

RECOMMENDATION

Make a determination whether redistricting is required based on the population data provided by the Planning Commission and provide direction to staff on policy for redistricting. (Citywide)

DISCUSSION

At the City Council Study Session on February 15, 2011, the City Council received a presentation regarding the redistricting process. On March 22, 2011, the City Council formally adopted their criteria for a redistricting process (Attachment A). On May 5, 2011, the Planning Commission officially reviewed the 2010 Census data by Council District and voted to transmit that information to the City Council (Attachment B).

Under the City Charter, the City Council makes the decision on whether redistricting is required. Section 103 of the Long Beach City Charter reads in part:

Commencing the second quarter of 1981 and at intervals of five (5) years, or at any other time the City Council may direct, the Planning Commission shall ascertain the number of inhabitants in each Councilmanic District and report its finding to the City Council. If the report shows that the Councilmanic Districts are not approximately equal in number of inhabitants, the City Council shall, by ordinance, redistrict the City into nine (9) Councilmanic Districts, each having approximately an equal number of inhabitants.

The City Council will use the data transmitted by the Planning Commission to determine if there is a significant imbalance between Council District populations, which would trigger the need to redistrict. The Council District ideal population (citywide population divided by nine) and percent difference from ideal population, are key factors in making this determination. District populations that are more than +/- 5 percent from the ideal population would be considered first for boundary changes to bring their population totals within the +/- 5 percent threshold. Historically the City has used +/- 5 percent as the threshold to trigger redistricting, and the City Council voted earlier this year to re-adopt that criteria for redistricting. As shown in the attached documents, four of the districts (District 1, 6, 8, and 9) exceed the threshold.

Policy Issues

There are two additional policy issues for the City Council to consider, in addition to the guiding principles the City Council adopted. These policy issues will determine the magnitude of the changes as the City Council, City staff and the community engage in the redistricting process. These issues include:

- 1. Does the City Council take action to focus on only redistricting the districts that exceed the threshold or should all districts be redistricted?
- 2. Does the City Council strive to bring all districts to as close to being equal as possible (e.g. near 0 variance) or to make as few changes as possible (e.g. just under 5 percent), or a variant of those two concepts?

Schedule

On May 24, 2011, staff is requesting City Council direction on the two policy issues above and the official decision to redistrict. Shortly thereafter, staff will utilize the policy guidelines already adopted by the City Council to generate several maps that utilize those policies in order to provide options for the City Council and the community to consider. City staff will post those maps for a minimum of two weeks on www.longbeach.gov/redistricting to allow public comment, which can be provided through the website. After the public comment period, City staff will return to the City Council for a discussion on the maps, receive public testimony, and receive further City Council direction on the maps.

This matter was reviewed by Chief Assistant City Attorney Heather Mahood and by Budget Management Officer Victoria Bell on May 13, 2011.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is no fiscal impact or local jobs associated with this recommendation.

The City Council will use this data to determine if there is a significant imbalance between Council District populations, which would trigger the need to redistrict. 

RECOMMENDATION

Receive and discuss four redistricting options and provide direction to staff on the preferred redistricting options to be released for public comment. (Citywide)

DISCUSSION

This item is the continuation of the redistricting discussion from the May 24, 2011 Council meeting. At that meeting, the Council voted to direct staff to: make a determination that redistricting was necessary; manage redistricting to near a 5 percent variance for those over/under 5 percent; retain district lines as close as possible to their current positions; move lines to accommodate population and not for parks or monuments; and continue the item to June 7, 2011 and return to the City Council with draft maps for public comment. Given this direction, staff has now generated several scenarios for the Mayor and City Council's consideration to release to the community to begin the process.

Overview of the Maps

Based on the March 22, 2011 approved City Council redistricting criteria and the direction given to staff on May 24, 2011 as stated above, the attached maps present four options for potential revised district boundaries. In the attached maps, the areas in red are areas that are proposed to be changed, and the color within the red boundaries shows the new district that area would move to. Each changed area is marked with a letter for identification purposes (listed from top to bottom), and the number indicates the number of residents included within the boundaries of that particular area. Each option has a table showing the previous population and variance from the ideal population, the numerical change under that option, and the revised population and variance from the ideal population. A narrative description of the changes and the change in demographics is also included.

Other Options Possible

The four options shown are not the only options that would result in a solution that meets the City Council's direction. Various aspects of each option may be able to be assembled to result in a solution that would meet the City Council's criteria. Additionally, the City Council may ask for other options that meet the criteria. The purpose of the four options is to provide the City Council and the community with various options to consider.

Next Steps

City staff is requesting direction on the preferred alternatives to release for public comment. The City Council may vote to release all or some of the four options, or request additional options be created to release to the public. After the public comment period, City staff will return to the City Council on July 5, 2011 for a discussion on the maps, receive public testimony, and receive further City Council direction.

Public Comment

Public comment can occur both at the City Council meeting, and through the City's Redistricting website at www.longbeach.gov/redistricting. All maps and redistricting information will be available on the website, as well as a public comment form and an email address dedicated for comments on redistricting. Those comments will be formally submitted to the City Council prior to each City Council meeting on this issue through the agenda process.





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
OPTION 2

- o This option utilizes South Street as the District 9 border. The neighborhood south of South Street and east of Paramount Blvd. would be moved into the 8th District, as would the neighborhood south of South Street (between DeForest and Daisy).
- o In District 8, the neighborhood north of San Antonio up to Del Amo (between Cherry and Orange) and the area north of 36th and south of Bixby (between Long Beach Blvd. and Atlantic) would be moved from the 8th District to the 7th District.
- The 6th District line on the east would move to the next largest street (Cherry). In the 7th District, areas east of Magnolia (to Eucalyptus) and areas west of San Francisco to the River (south of 20th) would move to the 6th District.
- Option 2 moves the population in the St. Mary's Medical Center area (south of Anaheim and north of 11th) from the 6th District to the 1st District. While a clearer line would include St. Mary's Medical Center in the 1st District as well, the hospital was left in the 6th District to follow the City Council's direction to not move monuments.

Option 2 creates a salient in District 6 as a result of leaving the hospital in District 6, but follows the City Council's direction not to include monuments.

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

Adopted, March 22, 2011

The Long Beach City Council adopted redistricting criteria applicable to Long Beach City Council districts for the 2011 redistricting process on Tuesday, March 22, 2011. The criteria are presented below and have been numbered for identification purposes only.

- 1. Transparency and public information should be of the highest priority;
- 2. Staff will receive input from many sources, but formal direction will come from the City Council in open session;
- 3. Direction to staff on adjustments shall occur in public session of the City Council:
- 4. Requested information will be shared publicly with all members of the City Council and the community;
- 5. Staff will provide the City Council with several options, and request direction until consensus is reached;
- 6. Deviations from mean population should be as small as possible, but not greater than +/- 5%;
- 7. Splits in neighborhoods, ethnic communities and other groups having a clear identity should be avoided;
- 8. Districts should be as compact as possible, avoiding gerrymandering;
- 9. Residences of Councilpersons should remain within their respective districts;
- 10. Boundaries should, wherever practicable, follow major roads and other readily identifiable features;
- 11. Preservation of communities of interest, where possible;
- 12. Boundary adjustments should generally consist of easily identifiable blocks/areas;
- 13. Use Census tract boundaries wherever possible; Redistricting shall avoid splitting Census blocks whenever possible;
- 14. Preservation of population cores which have consistently been associated with particular districts;
- 15. Avoidance of large scale dislocations of district populations;
- 16. Recognition of inevitable and historical topographic and geographic limitations on district boundaries; and
- 17. Redistricting should focus on areas of population, and not on areas of non-population (parks, businesses, etc.).



I attended and spoke at the council meeting last Tuesday. As an resident and candidate for the 8th district in the upcoming election I certainly don't want to see my neighborhood moved into another district. I have looked at the census data and maps. Long Beach's total population has grown less than .2%, some 735 people since the last census. Bottom line is that the city need not do anything. The +-5% is merely a guideline. The city attorney called it a "safe harbor". What staffers and council need to be asking is why have the districts fallen outside the 5% range, suggesting redistricting may be necessary. There has not been any new residential development to speak of in the 9th or 8th districts, or city wide for that matter except in 1st and 2nd districts. And if they look at current vacancy factors district wide they will find the highest vacancy rates are in the 1st and 2nd while among the lowest are the 9th and 8th. What does that tell you? With our challenging economy residents have relocated into more affordable housing with many now sharing housing with families and friends while weathering the storm. I say lets save ourselves a bunch of time and money in re-drawing council lines, breaking up neighborhoods and keep the districts intact as they now exist. All council has to do is justify the reasons (as stated above) for no change.





AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LONG BEACH AMENDING THE LONG BEACH MUNICIPAL CODE BY AMENDING SECTION 1.20.010 ESTABLISHING AND DESIGNATING THE POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS OR DISTRICTS OF THE CITY OF LONG BEACH

NOW, THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of Long Beach ordains as follows:

Section 1. Section 1.20.010 of the Long Beach Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

1.20.010 Districts established.

The nine (9) political subdivisions or districts of the City are respectively designated and established as follows:

Unless otherwise noted, described lines are to the centerline of referenced streets.

A. District no. 1. That portion of the City which is now, or hereafter shall be, within the following described boundary:

Beginning at the point of intersection of Pacific Coast Highway with the western City boundary line, thence southeast along western City boundary line to Anaheim Street, thence generally south and west along the western City boundary line to the intersection with the centerline of Ocean Boulevard; thence northeast and east along the centerline of Ocean Boulevard to the intersection with the east line of the Los Angeles River; thence north along the east line of the Los Angeles River to the intersection with the westerly prolongation of Broadway; thence east along

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said prolongation and along Broadway to Pacific Avenue; thence north along Pacific Avenue to Third Street; thence east along Third Street to Alamitos Avenue; thence northeast along Alamitos Avenue to Seventh Street; thence east along Seventh Street to Orange Avenue; thence north along Orange Avenue to Tenth Street; thence west along Tenth Street to Long Beach Boulevard; thence north along Long Beach Boulevard to Eleventh Street; thence east along Eleventh Street to Atlantic Avenue; thence north along Atlantic Avenue to Pacific Coast Highway; thence west along Pacific Coast Highway to the northbound access road of the 710 Freeway; thence north along said access road and the 710 Freeway to Twenty-first Street; thence west along Twenty-first Street to Gale Avenue; thence south along Gale Avenue to Twentieth Street; thence west along Twentieth Street to Santa Fe Avenue; thence south along Santa Fe Avenue to Pacific Coast Highway; thence west along Pacific Coast Highway to the western City boundary line (point of beginning).

B. District no. 2. That portion of the City which is now, or hereafter shall be, within the following described boundary:

Beginning at the point of the centerline intersection of Ocean Boulevard with the western Long Beach City boundary line; thence northeast and east along the centerline of Ocean Boulevard to the intersection with the east line of the Los Angeles River; thence north along the east line of the Los Angeles River to the intersection with the westerly prolongation of Broadway; thence east along said prolongation and along Broadway to Pacific Avenue; thence north along Pacific Avenue to Third Street; thence east along Third Street to Alamitos Avenue; thence northeast along Alamitos Avenue to Seventh Street; thence east along Seventh Street to Orange Avenue; thence north along Orange Avenue to Eleventh Street; thence east along Eleventh Street to Gardenia Avenue;

thence south along Gardenia Avenue to Tenth Street; thence east along Tenth Street to Redondo Avenue; thence south along Redondo Avenue to Third Street; thence west along Third Street to Orizaba Avenue; thence south along Orizaba Avenue to Broadway; thence west along Broadway to Junipero Avenue; thence south along Junipero Avenue to Ocean Boulevard; thence east along Ocean Boulevard to Eighteenth Place; thence south along Eighteenth Place and the prolongation of Eighteenth Place to the southern Long Beach City boundary line; thence west along said southern Long Beach City boundary line to its intersection with the western Long Beach City boundary line; thence northwest along said western Long Beach City boundary line to its intersection with the centerline of Ocean Boulevard (point of beginning).

C. District no. 3. That portion of the City which is now, or hereafter shall be, within the following described boundary:

Beginning at the point of intersection of the southwest line of the 405 Freeway and the City of Long Beach eastern boundary line with Orange County; thence proceeding south along said eastern Long Beach City boundary line to the southern boundary line of the City of Long Beach; thence west along said southern City boundary line to its intersection with the prolongation of Eighteenth Place; thence north along said prolongation of Eighteenth Place and along Eighteenth Place to Ocean Boulevard; thence west along Ocean Boulevard to Junipero Avenue; thence north along Junipero Avenue to Broadway; thence east along Broadway to Orizaba Avenue; thence north along Orizaba Avenue to Third Street; thence east along Third Street to Redondo Avenue; thence north along Redondo Avenue to Tenth Street; thence east along Tenth Street to Ximeno Avenue; thence north along Ximeno Avenue to Anaheim Street; thence east along Anaheim Street to Clark Avenue; thence north

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along Clark Avenue to the centerline of Atherton Street; thence east along the centerline of Atherton Street to its intersection with the northerly prolongation of the westerly line of Atherton Street Park; thence south along said prolongation and the westerly line of Atherton Street Park to its intersection with the centerline of the Los Cerritos Drain, (Bouton Creek); thence southeasterly along the centerline of the Los Cerritos Drain to its intersection with the southerly prolongation of the westerly line of Lot 1 of Tract No. 11152, as per map recorded in Book 602, Page 81 of Maps, in the office of the County Recorder of Los Angeles County; thence north along said prolongation and the westerly line of said Lot 1 to its intersection with the centerline of Atherton Street; thence east along the centerline of Atherton Street to its intersection with the northerly prolongation of the easterly line of said Lot 1 of Tract No. 11152; thence south along said prolongation and the easterly line of said Lot 1 to its intersection with the centerline of the Los Cerritos Drain; thence southeasterly along the centerline of the Los Cerritos Drain to its intersection with the southerly prolongation of the centerline of San Anseline Avenue; thence north along said prolongation of the centerline of San Anseline Avenue to its intersection with the centerline of Atherton Street; thence east along the centerline of Atherton Street to the southwest line of the 405 Freeway; thence southeast along the southwest line of the 405 Freeway to the City of Long Beach/Orange County boundary line (point of beginning).

D. District no. 4. That portion of the City which is now, or hereafter shall be, within the following described boundary:

Beginning at the intersection of the centerline of Atherton Street with the centerline of the Los Cerritos Drainage Channel; thence west along the centerline of Atherton Street to its intersection with the centerline

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of San Anseline Avenue; thence south along the southerly prolongation of the centerline of San Anseline Avenue to its intersection with the centerline of the Los Cerritos Drain, (Bouton Creek); thence northwesterly along the centerline of the Los Cerritos Drain to its intersection with the southerly prolongation of the easterly line of Lot 1 of Tract No. 11152, as per map recorded in Book 602, Page 81 of Maps, in the office of the County Recorder of Los Angeles County; thence north along said prolongation and the easterly line of said Lot 1 to its intersection with the centerline of Atherton Street; thence west along the centerline of Atherton Street to its intersection with the northerly prolongation of the westerly line of said Lot 1 of Tract 11152; thence south along said prolongation and the westerly line of said Lot 1 to its intersection with the centerline of the Los Cerritos Drain; thence northwesterly along the centerline of the Los Cerritos Drain to its intersection with the southerly prolongation of the westerly line of Atherton Street Park; thence north along said prolongation and the westerly line of Atherton Street Park to its intersection with the centerline of Atherton Street; thence west along the centerline of Atherton Street to Clark Avenue; thence south along Clark Avenue to Anaheim Street; thence west along Anaheim Street to Ximeno Avenue; thence south along Ximeno Avenue to Tenth Street; thence west along Tenth Street to Gardenia Avenue; thence north along Gardenia Avenue to Anaheim Street; thence north along the prolongation of Gardenia Avenue to Fourteenth Street; thence north along Gardenia Avenue to Nineteenth Street; thence east along Nineteenth Street and along the prolongation of Nineteenth Street to the City of Long Beach/City of Signal Hill boundary line; thence southeast along said Long Beach/Signal Hill boundary line to Pacific Coast Highway; thence east along the Long Beach/Signal Hill City boundary line (coterminous with Pacific Coast Highway) to Reservoir Drive

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West; thence northwest, west and east along the City of Long Beach/City of Signal Hill boundary line to Redondo Avenue; thence south along Redondo Avenue to Stearns Street; thence east along Stearns Street to Euclid Avenue; thence southeast along Euclid Avenue to Mira Mar Avenue; thence northeast and north along Mira Mar Avenue to Stearns Street; thence east along Stearns Street to Lakewood Boulevard; thence north along Lakewood Boulevard to Willow Street; thence east along Willow Street to the centerline of the 405 Freeway; thence east and southeast along the centerline of the 405 Freeway to its intersection with the centerline of Atherton Street; thence east along the centerline of Atherton Street and the east prolongation of the centerline of Atherton Street to the west line of the San Gabriel River; thence northeast and north along the west line of the San Gabriel River to a point on the east prolongation of the south line of El Dorado Park Golf Course boundary as described in the lease agreement for Contract No. 17448 between the City of Long Beach and American Golf Corporation and being on file in the office of the City Clerk; thence west along said prolongation to the southeast corner of said El Dorado Park Golf Course boundary; thence west and generally northerly along said golf course boundary as described in said contract to an angle point at the south line of Willow Street; thence north to the centerline of Willow Street; thence east along the centerline of Willow Street to the west line of the City of Los Angeles, Department of Water and Power Easement; thence north along said west line of easement to the centerline of Spring Street; thence east along the centerline of Spring Street to a point on the north prolongation of the west line of El Dorado Park Area 1 Community Gardens boundary as described in the lease agreement for Contract No. 25527 between the City of Long Beach and Long Beach Community Garden Association, Inc. and being on

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file in the office of the City Clerk; thence south along said prolongation and said west line to the southwest corner of the property described in said contract; thence east along the south boundary of said property and the east prolongation of the south boundary to a point on the City of Long Beach/Orange County boundary line; thence southwesterly along said Long Beach/Orange County boundary line to the intersection with the southwest line of the 405 Freeway; thence northwest along the southwest line of the 405 Freeway to the centerline of Atherton Street; thence west along the centerline of Atherton Street to the centerline of the Los Cerritos Drainage Channel (point of beginning).

E. District no. 5. That portion of the City which is now, or hereafter shall be, within the following described boundary:

Beginning at the intersection of the centerline of Atherton Street with the centerline of the 405 Freeway; thence northwest along the centerline of the 405 Freeway to Willow Street; thence west along Willow Street to Lakewood Boulevard; thence south along Lakewood Boulevard to Stearns Street; thence west along Stearns Street to Mira Mar Avenue; thence south and southwest along Mira Mar Avenue to Euclid Avenue; thence northwest along Euclid Avenue to Stearns Street; thence west along Stearns Street to Redondo Avenue; thence north along Redondo Avenue to the City of Long Beach/City of Signal Hill boundary line; thence northerly, westerly, southwesterly, northerly, westerly, northerly and westerly along said Long Beach/Signal Hill boundary line to Cherry Avenue; thence north along Cherry Avenue to the City of Long Beach/City of Lakewood boundary; thence following said Long Beach/Lakewood boundary line easterly, northerly and southerly to the City of Long Beach/Orange County boundary line; thence southwesterly along said Long Beach/Orange County boundary line to a point on the east

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prolongation of the south line of the El Dorado Park Area 1 Community Gardens as described in the lease agreement for Contract No. 25527 between the City of Long Beach and the Long Beach Community Garden Association, Inc., and being on file in the office of the City Clerk; thence west along said prolongation and said south line to the southwest corner of the property described in said contract; thence north along the west boundary of said property and the north prolongation of the west boundary to a point on the centerline of Spring Street; thence west along the centerline of Spring Street to the west line of the City of Los Angeles, Department of Water and Power Easement; thence south along said west line to the centerline of Willow Street; thence west along the centerline of Willow Street to a point north of an angle point in the El Dorado Park Golf Course boundary as described in the lease agreement for Contract No. 17448 between the City of Long Beach and American Golf Corporation and being on file in the office of the City Clerk; thence south to the angle point in said boundary, being also on the south line of Willow Street; thence generally southerly and easterly along said golf course boundary and the easterly prolongation of said boundary to a point on the west line of the San Gabriel River; thence south and southwest along the west line of the San Gabriel River to a point on the east prolongation of the centerline of Atherton Street; thence west along said east prolongation and the centerline of Atherton Street to the centerline of the 405 Freeway (point of beginning).

F. District no. 6. That portion of the City which is now, or hereafter shall be, within the following described boundary:

Beginning at the point of intersection of Pacific Coast Highway and the southerly prolongation of San Francisco Avenue; thence north along said prolongation and San Francisco Avenue to Twentieth Street; thence

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east along Twentieth Street to Magnolia Avenue; thence north along Magnolia Avenue to Twenty Ninth Street; thence west along Twenty Ninth Street to Maine Avenue; thence north along Maine Avenue to Thirty First Street; thence east along Thirty First Street to the west line of the Pacific Electric Railroad Right of Way; thence southeast along the west line of the Pacific Electric Railroad Right-of-Way to Spring Street; thence east along Spring Street to the City of Long Beach/City of Signal Hill boundary line; thence south and southeast along the City of Long Beach/City of Signal Hill boundary line to its intersection with the prolongation of Nineteenth Street; thence west along said prolongation of Nineteenth Street and along Nineteenth Street to Gardenia Avenue; thence south along Gardenia Avenue to Fourteenth Street; thence south along the prolongation of Gardenia Avenue to Eleventh Street; thence west along Eleventh Street to Orange Avenue; thence south along Orange Avenue to Tenth Street; thence west along Tenth Street to Long Beach Boulevard; thence north along Long Beach Boulevard to Eleventh Street; thence east along Eleventh Street to Atlantic Avenue; thence north along Atlantic Avenue to Pacific Coast Highway; thence west along Pacific Coast Highway to Daisy Avenue East (point of beginning).

District no. 7. That portion of the City which is now, or G. hereafter shall be, within the following described boundary:

Beginning at the point of intersection of the western Long Beach City boundary and the 405 Freeway; thence north and east along the western Long Beach City boundary line to Santa Fe Avenue; thence south along Santa Fe Avenue to the 405 Freeway; thence east and southeast along the 405 Freeway to the Metro Blue Line Right of Way; thence northwest along the Metro Blue Line Right of Way to the intersection of the westerly prolongation of Bixby Road; thence east along Bixby Road to
