

Commission Plan Criteria

The commission has affirmed this following criteria utilizing the language from Measure DDD, the City Charter, and California's FAIR MAPS Act.

- 1) <u>All Districts are of Equal Population</u> State law allows for the commission to have up to 10% total deviation.
- Following Federal Voting Rights Act / Applicable Laws race cannot be a predominant factor in redistricting. Communities that have Federal Voting Rights in need of protection will be prioritized based on legal counsel input.
- 3) <u>Contiguous</u> each district shall be one whole contiguous unit.
- 4) <u>Preserving Neighborhoods</u> the geographic integrity of neighborhoods should be respected in manner that minimizes division of neighborhoods.
- 5) <u>Protecting Communities of Interest</u> The geographic integrity of a community of interest should be respected in a manner that minimizes its division. A community of interest is a contiguous population that shares common social and economic interests that should be included within a single district for purposes of its effective and fair representation
- 6) <u>Prioritizing Neighborhoods and Communities</u> Neighborhoods and communities sharing a common language, history, culture and identity should not be divided so as to dilute their voting power
- 7) <u>Geography / Topography</u> Districts should respect major topographic and geographic features of the City
- 8) <u>Understandable by voters</u> making districts that are sensible and can be easily understood by residents. Districts should be bounded by natural and artificial barriers, by street lines, and/or by City boundary lines
- 9) <u>Compact</u> making districts compact shapes and not bypassing nearby populations for far-away populations.
- 10) <u>Follow Census Blocks</u> using the census geography provided by the State of California to preserve the validity of data and avoid arbitrary boundaries
- 11) Others that do not conflict after considering all the above criteria, utilizing other criteria that can be incorporated without weakening the plan among other criteria. Some examples include:
 - Adjustments for population changes that are not reflected in the census.
 - Use the existing districts to preserve their cores.
