Subject:	Engagement Plan Update

On April 7, 2021, the Long Beach Independent Redistricting Commission (IRC) approved the draft Public Engagement Plan. This report outlines some general updates regarding the Engagement Plan.

#### **District Specific Outreach Meetings**

Starting June 2, 2021, the IRC will begin holding District-Specific Meetings to provide an opportunity for community to learn about the redistricting, receive map tool training, and provide public testimony on their Communities of Interest.

#### Structure

The Commission's District-Specific meetings will begin at 6:00 PM and they are Brown-Act noticed meetings. All Commissioners are expected to attend. The meetings will consist of a presentation led by the Commissioners from their respective district or the Chair and Vice-Chair, and city staff. After the presentation, there will be public comment period in which the members of the community will be encouraged to provide testimony on their Communities of Interest. # **Redistricting Basics**

## What is Redistricting?

 Redistricting is the process of adjusting district lines every 10 years after the release of the U.S. Census


## Why is it Important?

- Council District boundaries determine who residents can elect for their district
- The maps drawn in 2021 create the stage for the next decade. Districts must be made as equal in population as practicable so that communities have equal access to political representation
- If districts are redrawn to keep communities intact, people are better able to elect representatives who will further their interests





# **Redistricting Basics: City of Long Beach**



## How did we do it before?

The last time redistricting occurred in Long Beach was in 2011 when the City Council adopted the current map after directing staff to conduct the process.

## What is the difference now?

On November 6, 2018, voters approved Measure DDD, establishing the Independent Redistricting Commission.



# **Redistricting Basics: What is the IRC?**

## **Our Community, Our Voice**

- Reasonably reflects the diversity of the city
- Independent of Mayor and City Council Control
- Will not consider place of residence of any individual, including any incumbent or political candidate
- Open and Transparent Process






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## **Redistricting Basics: Selection Process**

- Outreach: from August 2019 to June 2020
- Application Submissions: 400
- Ethics Commission created a sub-pool of 20-30 qualified applicants and randomly selected the first 9 Commissioners
- First 9 Commissioners selected the remaining 4 members and 2 alternates
- Seated on November 20, 2020 and began holding training meetings on January 6, 2021

# **Mapping Criteria and Process**

## Criteria

- **1. All Districts are of Equal Population** State law allows for the commission to have up to 10% total deviation
- 2. Following Federal Voting Rights Act / Applicable Laws - race cannot be a predominant factor in redistricting. Communities that have Federal Voting Rights in need of protection will be prioritized based on legal counsel input.
- **3. Contiguous** each district shall be one whole contiguous unit
- 4. **Preserving Neighborhoods** the geographic integrity of neighborhoods should be respected in manner that minimizes division of neighborhoods.
- 5. Protecting Communities of Interest

- 6. Prioritizing Neighborhoods and Communities Neighborhoods and communities sharing a common language, history, culture and identity should not be divided so as to dilute their voting power
- **7. Geography / Topography** Districts should respect major topographic and geographic features of the City
- 8. Understandable by Voters making districts that are sensible and can be easily understood by residents.
- **9. Compact** making districts compact shapes and not bypassing nearby populations for far-away populations.
- **10. Follow Census Blocks** using the census geography provided by the State of California to preserve the validity of data and avoid arbitrary boundaries



There will be nine (9) Commission outreach meetings that are designed to engage residents in each City Council District in the City of Long Beach.


The purpose of the outreach hearings is to provide training on the Redistricting process and encourage community participation in the map drawing hearings.

#### How to Get Involved

#### **During a Public Meeting**

Members of the community are encouraged to sign up to speak on an agenda item by completing an online form or calling the Office of the City Clerk. The sign-up form closes at noon (12:00 p.m.) the day of the Long Beach Independent Redistricting Commission meeting.

To best address the Commission, it is recommended members of the community identify the following:

- 1. Their name and where they live;
- 2. The location that is the subject of their public comment; and
- 3. If they have submitted any maps or a Community of Interest ("COI") form, provide the name of the community (on the COI form) and/or map code (each map submitted is assigned a code).

Members of the community who signed up to speak utilizing the services of a translator pursuant to the City's Language Access Policy or accommodation pursuant to the American Disabilities Act shall have double the allotted speaking time. To request a translator for public comment, first sign up to speak, then call the Office of the City Clerk at 562-570-6101 to request a translator. A Spanish translator will be available at all Commission outreach meetings.
