Groundbreaking Ceremony for DeForest Park Environmental Education Center

Long Beach Parks, Recreation and Marine (PRM) hosted a groundbreaking ceremony on September 28 for the new DeForest Park Environmental Education Center, which will serve as a satellite office for the nonprofit Conservation Corps of Long Beach (CCLB).

The development of the center is made possible by a \$1.9 million grant by the Rivers and Mountains Conservancy to the CCLB to build the new facility along the Lower Los Angeles River.

The new CCLB satellite office at DeForest Park will serve as the base of operations for the organization's work along the Lower Los Angeles River along with community environ-

mental stewardship activities at DeForest Park Wetlands. It will feature office space and training areas for CCLB, which offers environmental-related work and training opportunities to young people in Long Beach, as well as community rooms open for public use.

The development of the center was planned in accordance with the DeForest Park Vision Plan, which was produced in partnership with PRM, CCLB, City Fabrick, Camp Fire Angeles Council and the DeForest Park Neighborhood Association to serve as a guide for future developments at DeForest Park and Wetlands. The project is expected to be completed in fall 2022.

capital improvement projects will also be moving forward in the coming year.

Park Maintenance led efforts to beautify Daisy Lane with the planting of cedar trees as a landscape restoration project that supports a popular neighborhood holiday tradition. The Maintenance Operations Bureau Team made significant advancements in park improvements throughout Long Beach parks and recreation facilities to help these areas become safer and more welcoming.

Last month, the September Parks and Recreation Commission met at the Billie Jean King Main Library for an agenda that contained the presentation of the Lincoln Park master plan. After the Commission meeting, we adjourned to the upper level of the library to enjoy a birds-eye view of the park under development. We look forward to a ribbon-cutting celebration of our newest park in February 2022.

Our Park Planning and Partnerships Bureau team has been super busy on scores of community partnerships while working on important grants seeking funding for capital projects and equity-based programming and initiatives.

I want to offer a special "shout out" to everyone at Long Beach Animal Care Services for their increased focus upon fostering and adoptions of the animals under their care. The recent open house for walk-ins instead of appointment-based visits yielded several new adoptions and fostering.

Reading, writing, arithmetic and recreation...last month saw thousands of students returning to the classroom and our Community Recreation Services team delivered an impressive array of after-school programs. Naturalist Notes: Coyotes at the Nature Center



El Dorado Nature Center staff reports that this is a busy time for coyotes!

Last year's babies are old enough to begin looking for their own territories away from their parents, and adult coyotes are looking for a good place to den and prepare for new pups. With all of this activity, you may see or hear coyotes more frequently than at other times of the year.

Do not attempt to approach a coyote. It will likely run away, but any cornered or frightened wild animal can be dangerous.

If you encounter a covote on the trail, stand your ground and scare it away by making loud noises and waving your arms, Coyotes play an important role in the web of life at the Nature Center. With a little effort, we can coexist with these special animals.

El Dorado Park West Multi-Purpose Sports Field Opens to the Public

Long Beach Parks, Recreation and Marine held an opening ceremony for the new El Dorado Park West Multi-Purpose Sports Field on October 2.

Now the largest sports field in the City of Long Beach, measuring 210 feet by 315 feet, the new synthetic turf at 2700 Studebaker Road was constructed using renewable cork and sand infill material as an alternative to crumb rubber. The field perimeter is lined with boulders to prevent damage to the field and provide a decorative alternative to a standard fence.

Among the benefits of replacing natural grass with synthetic turf is reduced water use and better storm water runoff management through subsurface drainage systems. The field does not require regular irrigation and has heat dissipating properties. Synthetic turf fields also have lower maintenance costs, are more accessible year-round than grass and have been shown to improve usability, safety and performance for athletes.

The approximately \$3.1 million project is funded with \$2.35 million from Measure A and \$761,644 in one-time funds for City Council District Priority Funding.

Parkway Named for North Long Beach Resident Dan Pressburg

Long Beach Parks, Recreation and Marine held a dedication ceremony for the Pressburg Parkway at South Street and Jaymills Avenue. on September 25.

The South Street Parkway is located adjacent to the Pressburg residence and is being named in recognition of Mr. Pressburg's contributions to the Uptown and Deforest Park Neighborhood community, where he has worked to beautify open space, enhance civic engagement, and foster community.

Mr. Pressburg was recognized by Neighborhoods USA, for initiating the "One-Day Christmas Store," that allows families in need to shop for the holidays with dignity, and for his "Back to the Future the North Long Beach History Project," a historic documentary record of the development, projects to be designed, along Atlantic Blvd.

As a Redevelopment Agency North Project Area Committee member, and Vice-Chair for seven years, he collaborated on public improvements and the revitalization of residential, industrial, and commercial areas in the Long Beach's Uptown area including the DeForest Park Wetlands Restoration.



While a Cultural Heritage Commissioner, Dan established five landmarks in North Long Beach and helped Sunnyside Cemetery to gain its local landmark status.

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Volunteers Make Beach Their "Happy Place" at California Coastal Cleanup Day



The 2021 California Coastal Cleanup Day theme "Protect Your Happy Place," encouraged over 560 members of the community to become stewards of our beaches and oceans. Volunteers met El Dorado Nature Center staff on September 18 at one four locations in Long Beach: Alamitos Beach, Belmont Pier, the Peninsula, and Alamitos Bay Marina to clean more than 1,800 pounds of trash along the shoreline.

El Dorado Nature Center partnered with Alamitos Beach Cleanup, Surfrider, Aquarium of the Pacific, the Shoreline Yacht Club, and Seal Beach Yacht Club for this great community event. Bags and gloves were provided, and volunteers brought their own bucket and reusable gloves to limit waste.

Mobile Recess Program "Pops Up" Throughout Long Beach

The eight sites included Miracle on 4th Street Park, Chittick Field, Coolidge Park, Peace Park, M.L. King Jr. Park, Admiral Kidd Park, Houghton Park and Atlantic Plaza Park.

The Mobile Recess program brings an array of free activities to designated neighborhood streets throughout the city on weekdays for youth ages 5 to 14 (grades K-8). The activities include homework help, arts and crafts and fitness activities. Mobile Recess is free and supplies and equipment are provided at no cost. The program follows health safety protocols.

El Dorado New Math and Reading Development Classes Offered this Winter



Long Beach Parks, Recreation and Marine is prepared to help children succeed in school with math and reading development classes offered by trained teachers in a fun, supportive environment. Visit www.longbeach.gov/parks to register for classes and get information about locations, days, times, fee and course requirements.

Math Development 2-6 reinforces skills for ages 6 years, 6 months to 11 years in primary facts (addition, subtraction, multiplication, division), fraction operations, prime numbers, factoring concepts, decimals, algebra, geometry skills and increased confidence. Classes held weekday afternoons in December, January and February at Mae Boyer Park in Lakewood and at Cherry Park.

Reading Development 2-6 will help improve comprehension, vocabulary, spelling, and fluency for ages 6 years, 6 months to 11 years. Classes will be held weekday afternoons in December, January and February at Mae Boyer Park in Lakewood and at Cherry Park.

Reading Development K-1 will help improve comprehension, vocabulary, spelling, and fluency for ages 4 years, 5 months to 7 years. Classes will be held weekday afternoons in December, January and February at Mae Boyer Park in Lakewood and at Cherry Park.

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Know Your Long Beach Park: Lilly Park




Lilly Park is tucked away in east Long Beach at Lilly Avenue and El Dorado Drive. The .26-greenbelt was created as part of the El Dorado Park Estates housing development in 1961.

In 1988 local residents worked with the Partners of Parks organization to raise money for play equipment and benches for the park.

A playground was added in 1991. In 2005, the original play equipment was replaced with new equipment to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Today local residents and visitors enjoy scenic landscaping, benches, a walking path and play equipment.

Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Statue Restored

Park Maintenance staff have completed a restoration of the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Statue "I Have a Dream" at Martin Luther King Jr. Park.

The bronze statue has stood as a symbol of hope in the community since its installation in 1985. Working with a professional restoration company, the statue's faded patina was removed and

a new patina was applied followed by a protective coating. The plaques around the base and the granite surfacing was also restored.
