Recommendation to authorize City Manager, or designee, to execute an agreement, and all necessary documents and any subsequent amendments, with the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES), to accept and expend grant funding in the amount of \$15,448 from the Hazardous Materials Emergency Preparedness (HMEP) Planning Subgrant, for the period of October 15, 2020 through September 15, 2021; and

Increase appropriations in the CUPA Fund Group in the Health and Human Services Department by \$15,448, offset by grant revenue. (Citywide)

City Council approval is requested for the Department of Health and Human Services (Health Department) to receive and expend grant funding from the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES). On October 1, 2020, the Health Department was awarded new grant funding in the amount of \$15,448 from the Hazardous Materials Emergency Preparedness (HMEP) Planning Subgrant for hazardous materials (HazMat) transportation emergency planning activities, for the period of October 15, 2020 through September 15, 2021. The grant funding will be used to review and update the Hazardous Materials Area Plan for the City of Long Beach (City) and to ensure compliance with City, State, and Federal laws to protect the health and safety of the public from the effects of HazMat emergency incidents.

This matter was reviewed by Deputy City Attorney Taylor M. Anderson on January 6, 2021 and by Revenue Management Officer Geraldine Alejo on January 12, 2021.

City Council action is requested on February 2, 2021, to expedite the provision of the grant-funded services.

The City will receive grant funding in the amount of \$15,448 for a one-year period. An appropriation increase of \$15,448 is requested in the CUPA Fund Group in the Health and Human Services Department, offset by grant revenue. No match or in-kind service mandate is required. This recommendation has no staffing impact beyond the normal budgeted scope of duties and is consistent with existing City Council priorities. There is no local job impact associated with this recommendation.
