## 1. PROBLEM STATEMENT

While the entire state of California is still responding to the legalization of adult-use cannabis, particularly with the creation of MAUCRSA (Medicinal and Adult Use Cannabis Retail Sales Act) and eventually the passage of Emergency Regulations on December 7, 2017, the City of Long Beach is making progress in reacting to recent policy changes at the state and local level as well. After Long Beach City Measure MM was codified in November 2016, 32 dispensaries were licensed for medicinal sales in late 2017, with 4 currently open and operating, and the remaining 28 expected to open by the end of 2018. While the Long Beach Department of Health and Human Services (Health Department) is currently working with other city departments to develop codes to better regulate the existing 32 dispensaries, should they decide to apply to sell adult-use products as well, and various other types of entrepreneurs seeking to open cannabis businesses in Long Beach, little attention is being given to the potential side-effects of the massive cultural and behavioral shift occurring as a result of legalization.

We are observing a trend among adults; a survey done by the Cannabis Education Program in late 2017 found that while 93% of adults believed there were some or many harms associated with cannabis use, over 61% claimed they had used cannabis, (and of those who had, the average person had used within the last 7 days).

More evidence is emerging that suggests cannabis - especially when combined with alcohol - causes significant impairment to a person's ability to drive. Recent peer-reviewed studies show that while driving under the influence of cannabis alone can increase risk of motor vehicle crash from two to seven times relative to driving sober, driving under the influence of alcohol and cannabis combined contributes to a risk of collision far greater than that risk caused by either substance used alone (Asbridge Mark, HaydenJill A, Cartwright Jennifer L. Acute cannabis consumption and motor vehicle collision risk: systematic review of observational studies and meta-analysis BMJ 2012; 344:e536), (Hartman, R. L., Brown, T. L., Milavetz, G., Spurgin, A., Pierce, R. S., Gorelick, D. A., ... Huestis, M. A. (2015). Cannabis Effects on Driving Lateral Control With and Without Alcohol. Drug and Alcohol Dependence, 154, 25–37. http://doi.org/10.1016/j.drugalcdep.2015.06.015). In a state where adult-cannabis-use has been legalized, and in a city with increasing acceptance of non-medicinal cannabis use in place of or in addition to social alcohol consumption, these statistics suggest the importance of campaign activities that address the use of multiple substances, rather than focusing solely on cannabis.

Not only is combination substance use dangerous, but it is emerging as more and more common. Colorado and Washington found that a very small percentage of the number of DUI arrests since legalization have involved cannabis by itself (approximately 9% and 4% respectively) ("Marijuana Legalization in Colorado: Early Findings, A Report Pursuant to Senate Bill 13-283," Colorado Department of Public Safety, March 2016,

While it's tempting to conclude that this indicates drugs are more responsible for traffic fatalities than alcohol, the evidence is murky. What is clear is that public awareness and intervention is necessary in order to reduce the risk of injury and death from impaired driving. The 2017 survey done in Long Beach found that 42.6% of adults who had used cannabis had also engaged in driving under the influence of cannabis. Additionally, Long Beach has experienced an 11% increase in collisions and 79% increase in fatalities from 2014 to 2015, and a 40% increase in fatalities between 2015 and 2017. These are alarming statistics that warrant immediate and continuing intervention, which this campaign seeks to provide.
