Audit: L.B. project may run out of funds

Council urged to look at agency

1.0NG BEACH — Unless the local economy improves, the largest part of the city's redevelopment agency could run out of money by the year 2001, according to a study by the city auditor.

Declining property values and a near hult in the construction of new projects could mean that the downtown redevelopment project area would spend all \$32.6 miltion it has in the bank, auditor Gary Burroughs said in a report scheduled to be presented Tuesday to the City Council.

Hurroughs said the agency is in no immediate danger of running out of money, but his figures indicate the council should be taking a more active role in managing the agency.

"I think there's reason for the council to pay close attention to this," he said Friday. "There are items that can be controlled by the council, and they should be."

Burroughs declined to specify actions he thinks the council should take, saying he wanted to present those suggestions on Tuesday.

But 9th District Councilman Warren Harwood, long the most ordent critic of redevelopment, used Burroughs' report to call for council control of agency activities.

"I absolutely think so. We have been virtually rubberstamping things (from the agency) for years," Harwood said.

Currently, the council approves the agency's annual budget, but the agency's five-member board of directors has broad control over day-to-day activities and can make substantial changes without council

approvat.

Redevelopment Agency Executive Director Susan Shick downplayed the significance of the report.

"It shows that the agency is still financially sound," Shick sold Sunday.

Shick noted that she made a similar forecast when the city and redevelopment agency issued \$135 million in bonda last year
