#### RECOMMENDATION:

Adopt the attached Resolution closing to vehicular traffic a portion of the public right-of-way known as West La Reina Way, between Del Rey Court and Chestnut Avenue, and adopt and accept Categorical Exemption No. CE 42-12. (District 1)

#### DISCUSSION

In 2011, the City of Long Beach (City) applied for Proposition 84's Urban Greening for the Sustainable Communities Program (Program). The Program is administered by the Strategic Growth Council and provides funds to preserve, enhance, increase or establish green areas such as urban forests, open spaces, and community gardens. In 2012, the City was awarded \$170,000 for the construction of the Willmore Courts and Ways Demonstration Project located at La Reina Way and Chestnut Avenue in the Drake Park/Willmore City Historic Landmark District.

The proposed demonstration project involves closure of West La Reina Way, between Del Rey Court and Chestnut Avenue, to vehicular traffic shown on the attached vicinity map. This project will transform an alley within an urban residential block into a model for a sustainable pedestrian way by improving the walkability, incorporating stormwater management features, planting drought tolerant plants, and other sustainable enhancements. Wilmore City Historic Association, a 501(c)(3) non-profit corporation, was established to improve, preserve, and promote the community of Willmore City, has signed a contract agreeing to perform the necessary maintenance of the green pedestrian way, including repairs, maintenance of landscaping, and custodial services for a minimum of 20 years.

The proposed closure will serve a variety of functions. The proposed pedestrian way will provide access to front yards and side entrances, safe play space for children, a meeting place for neighbors, and enhanced pedestrian and bicycle circulation in the neighborhood. The area will still remain public and open to pedestrian and bicycle traffic. The City has been in close communication with the neighboring residents and the Willmore City Historic Association, who are in support of the proposed project.

Pursuant to California Vehicle Code Section 21101(a)(1), which provides that local authorities may adopt rules and regulations closing any street or alley in its jurisdiction to vehicular traffic when, in the opinion of the legislative body having jurisdiction, the street or

alley is no longer needed for vehicular traffic. The City adopted such rules and regulations in 1997 with Resolution No. C-25791, providing that public park and/or recreational use is a valid justification for street closure to vehicular use.

Findings must establish that the subject portion of right-of-way is unnecessary for vehicular use. The Public Works Department (PW) supports this action based on the following evidence, facts, conditions and findings establishing that the street to be closed is not needed for vehicular traffic:

- 1. West La Reina Way, between Chestnut Avenue and Del Rey Court, is to be closed to vehicular traffic but will remain open for pedestrian and bicycle use;
- 2. The proposed pedestrian way demonstration project shall not be dedicated or designated as a public park or recreation area for purposes of Long Beach City Charter Section 905 entitled Parks in Perpetuity. Therefore, the recommended action would not subject the proposed park to the 2:1 replacement ratio under Section 905. If it is determined, due to future land development or for any other reason, that the subject alley would better serve the public as a vehicular thoroughfare, vehicular use can be restored and the closed area would not need to be replaced by other park or recreation areas; and
- 3. The improvements to the proposed pedestrian way will be overseen by PW and maintained by Willmore City Historic Association. Notwithstanding, the non-dedication and non-designation of the subject area as a public park within the meaning of Section 905, the proposed pedestrian way shall continue to be controlled and operated by the City.

In conformance with the California Environmental Quality Act, Categorical Exemption No. CE 42-12 was issued for this project.

This matter was reviewed by Deputy City Attorney Linda Vu on February 24, 2015 and by Budget Management Officer Victoria Bell on February 23, 2015.

#### TIMING CONSIDERATIONS

City Council action on this matter is requested on March 10, 2015, to allow the City to proceed with the project.

#### FISCAL IMPACT

There is no fiscal impact or local job impact associated with this recommendation.



#### RESOLUTION NO.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LONG BEACH CLOSING TO VEHICULAR TRAFFIC A PORTION OF THE PUBLIC RIGHT-OF-WAY KNOWN AS WEST LA REINA WAY LOCATED BETWEEN DEL REY COURT AND CHESTNUT AVENUE IN THE CITY OF LONG BEACH, COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES, STATE OF CALIFORNIA

WHEREAS, California Vehicle Code Section 21101(a)(1) authorizes local authorities to adopt rules and regulations by ordinance or resolution providing for the closing of any street or alley in its jurisdiction to vehicular traffic when, in the opinion of the legislative body having jurisdiction, the street or alley is no longer needed for vehicular traffic; and

WHEREAS, the City of Long Beach adopted such rules and regulations on November 1, 1994 with Resolution No. C-25728 and as amended on March 7, 1995 by Resolution No. C-25791; and

WHEREAS, in 2011, the City applied for Proposition 84's Urban Greening for the Sustainable Communities Program ("Program"); and

- WHEREAS, the Program is administered by the Strategic Growth Council and provides funds to preserve, enhance, increase or establish green areas such as urban forests, open spaces, and community gardens; and

WHEREAS, the City proposes to transform an alley within an urban residential block into a model for sustainable pedestrian way by improving the walkability, incorporating stormwater management features, planting drought tolerant plants, and other sustainable enhancements; and

WHEREAS, to provide access to front yards and side entrances, safe play

space for children, meeting place for neighbors, and enhance pedestrian and bicycle circulation in the neighborhood, the City is interested in closing to vehicular traffic a portion of the public right-of-way known as West La Reina Way located between Del Rey Court and Chestnut Avenue, as shown on Exhibit "A" attached to this resolution and described more particularly as follows:

That portion of La Reina Way, formerly known as the unnamed alley, 10 feet wide, in the City of Long Beach, County of Los Angeles, State of California, abutting Lots 1 and 3, in Block 35, Town Site of Long Beach, as shown on map recorded in Book 19, pages 91 to 96 inclusive, of Miscellaneous Records, described as follows:

Bounded westerly by the northerly prolongation of the westerly boundary of said Lot 3, and prolongation beginning at the northwesterly corner of said Lot 3 and terminating at the southwesterly corner of said Lot 1;

Bounded easterly by the northerly prolongation of the easterly boundary of said Lot 3, said prolongation beginning at the northeasterly corner of said Lot 3 and terminating at the southeasterly corner of said Lot 1.

Contains 1,500 square feet or 0.034 acres, more or less.


WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Long Beach does hereby make those findings of facts set forth in Exhibit "B" attached to this resolution that such portion of the public street is no longer needed for vehicular traffic;

NOW, THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of Long Beach resolves as follows:

Section 1. Pursuant to Vehicle Code Section 21101(a)(1), the City Council of the City of Long Beach makes those findings set forth in Exhibit "B" that a portion of the public right-of-way known as West La Reina Way located between Del Rey Court and Chestnut Avenue as shown on Exhibit "A" is no longer needed for vehicular

### CITY COUNCIL FINDINGS

## CLOSURE TO VEHICULAR TRAFFIC THE PORTION OF WEST LA REINA WAY BETWEEN CHESTNUT AVENUE AND DEL REY COURT

- 1. The subject right-of-way is unnecessary for vehicular use. This finding is based upon the following subfindings:
  - a) Vehicular access will be closed at both ends of La Reina Way between Chestnut Avenue and Del Rey Court. The east end of La Reina Way will be blocked by bollards and the east end will have a raised sidewalk curb on Chestnut Avenue preventing cars from driving in to the alley.
  - b) The interested City departments, including Fire, have reviewed the proposed street closure and have no objections to this action.
  - c) Emergency access to the adjacent properties will use Chestnut Avenue and Del Rey Court.
- 2. Closure of the street to vehicular traffic will have no impact on the existing public utilities in this right-of-way.
- 3. The subject right-of-way will be improved for pedestrian and bicycle access only and amenities, such as drought tolerant landscaping, bioswales, benches, decorative pavers, and bicycle racks.
- 4. The vacation of said right-of-way will not have a significantly adverse environmental effect. This finding is based upon the following subfindings:
  - a) The right-of-way will remain available for public pedestrian and bicycle use.
  - b) In conformance with the California Environmental Quality Act, Categorical Exemption Number 42-12 was issued for this project.
