RECOMMENDATION:

Find the projects listed in the Proposed Fiscal Year 2014 Capital Improvement Program (FY 2014 CIP) in conformity with the General Plan. (Citywide)

APPLICANT:

DISCUSSION

The Capital Improvement Program (CIP) is a schedule of expenditures to build and maintain the public infrastructure throughout the City. Each year staff updates the CIP to adjust priorities, delete completed projects and add new ones and presents the CIP to the City Council as part of the annual budget. The CIP represents a comprehensive and direct statement of how the City will maintain and enhance its infrastructure for the future.

The Long Beach City Charter, Section 1002(e), confers to the Planning Commission the responsibility to review the City's long range CIP solely for the purpose of ensuring that it is consistent with the City's General Plan. The intent of this section is to ensure that the General Plan directs all land use decisions and remains an effective tool for managing resources and projects. All project proposals in the CIP must be found to conform to the maps and policies of the General Plan. On August 6, 2013, the City Council referred the Proposed Fiscal Year 2014 Capital Improvement Program (FY 2014 CIP) (see Exhibit A – FY2014 CIP) to the Planning Commission for review of its consistency with the General Plan.

The Department of Public Works was responsible for developing the FY 2014 CIP. Public Works, in conjunction with other departments, reviewed the City's capital needs and priorized project submittals based on established criteria. This process for identifying which capital projects would best meet anticipated demands has resulted in \$56.7 million in new capital investment for FY 2014 being proposed for funding by the City Council as part of the overall FY14 budget.

The FY 2014 CIP is divided into eleven major sections according to the category of capital investment:

- Marinas, Beaches and Waterways
- Parks and Recreation
- Public Facilities
- Storm Drains
- Street Rehabilitation
- Transportation Enhancements

- Airport
- Water
- Gas and Oil
- Harbor
- Successor Agency

The Harbor, Gas & Oil, Successor Agency and Water Departments each develop a separate infrastructure plan and report to a separate independent commission and/or are an enterprise fund, but are included here for informational purposes. For each major section, there is a list of programs. For each program receiving new FY 2014 funding allocations, there is a narrative description of the program.

GENERAL PLAN CONSISTENCY FINDINGS

The Department of Development Services has reviewed the FY 2014 CIP for conformity to the General Plan. The General Plan consists of eleven elements: Land Use, Open Space, Transportation, Noise, Historic Presevation, Conservation, Local Coastal Program, Housing, Air Quality, Public Safety, and Seismic Safety and Historic Preservation. Each element of the General Plan carries the same authority concerning land use issues.

The Land Use Element provides the most specific test for General Plan consistency. The guidelines for the CIP consistency test instruct that:

capital Improvement Plan/Program are [sic] "consistent" when they conform, explicitly or implicitly, to the land use district policies or other policies of the Land Use Element or other elements of the General Plan. All CIP projects which are intended to maintain/preserve the infrastructure and other capital investments in Long Beach are held to be "consistent" with the policies of the Plan. Proposals for new infrastructure or capital projects shall be examined for consistency on the basis of their ability to implement the goals of the Plan.

Most of the projects listed in the FY14 CIP fall into the maintenance and repair of existing facilities category.

An analysis of the consistency of each item receiving new funding allocations and the relevant elements of the General Plan is provided in Exhibit B. Staff has identified the General Plan goals and/or policies that pertain to each project. The Land Use Element includes the fifteen goals and objectives from *Long Beach 2000: The Strategic Plan* for setting a determined course for Long Beach (see Exhibit C – General Plan Goals). These goals and objectives are itemized in Attachment C. It should be noted that, while specific policies are noted for each project, there may be additional General Plan policies that apply. After a review of all the element of the General Plan, none of the proposed projects in the CIP are found to be inconsistent with the goals and policies of the City's General Plan.

Lastly, the Mobility Element was considered when reviewing the FY14 CIP but specific findings were not made because the Mobility Element has not been adopted by the City Council.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW

In accordance with the Guidelines for Implementation of the California Environmental Quality Act, Categorical Exemption 13-073 was issued (see Exhibit D – Categorical Exemption). However, the potential environmental impacts associated with the projects in the FY 2014 CIP will be assessed in separate environmental documents prepared for each individual project at the time of implementation.

General Plan Findings for Fiscal Year 2014 Capital Improvement Program

The Fiscal Year 2014 (FY 2014) Capital Improvement Program is divided into eleven major sections according to the category of capital investment. The Index Page of each category of investment lists the programs that received new funding allocations in FY 2013 as well as the programs with carryover funding. However, only those programs that have new FY 2014 funding receive a narrative description of each project. Each program receiving new funding in the CIP is reviewed for conformance with goals, objectives, and relevant elements of the *General Plan*. Please reference Appendix C for a description of each goal and objective. Based on this review of the below goals and policies, staff finds the proposed FY 2014 CIP consistent with the Long Beach General Plan.

I. Marinas, Beaches, & Waterways

Two assets that attract people to live, work, and play in Long Beach are its beaches and marinas. New funds were allocated to improve coastal access, water quality and recreational activity.

- Colorado Lagoon
- Belmont Pool and Pier Improvements
- Bluff Erosion Control
- Rainbow Lagoon
- Rainbow Harbor
- Alamitos Bay Area Improvements
- Tidelands Area Roadways

General Plan Finding: Consistent with Facilities Maintenance and Quality Services Goals of the General Plan.

Also consistent with the following Local Coastal Program policies:

- "...that the outdoor swimming facilities just east of the Pool (Belmont Plaza Pool) be restored maintained" (Area C);
- "The Belmont Pier should be upgraded and the existing restaurant remodeled to offer a panoramic view of the area" (this is an important communal asset),
 "Consideration should be given to construction of the lifeguard headquarters in the general area of Belmont Plaza Pool" (Area C);
- "Bluff erosion ... may be hazardous [and] should be stabilized by planting and diversion of run-off waters away from the face of the bluff."
- Colorado Lagoon "Water quality, not water level, shall dictate the duration and frequency and regimens of tidal gate operation. Flushing by tidal action shall be optimized by the removal of the tidal gates and by increasing tidal flows and water circulation." (LCP Resources Management Plan – Colorado Lagoon)

II. Parks & Recreation

There is a constant effort to address and balance the issues of aging facilities, demographic changes, and the uneven distribution of park acreage throughout the City. In a period of budget constraint, the City has managed to add park acreage and improve existing facilities. New funds were allocated for Park Bike Path Replacements.

Park Bike Path Replacement

Transportation Element 6.5.F.1: The City should continue to implement the routes in the recommended bikeway system; Bicycle Master Plan Policy 7.1: Ensure ongoing efforts that support the Bicycle Master Plan in relation to maintenance and monitoring.

III. Public Facilities

Functional and well-maintained public facilities are crucial to the safety and operation of healthy communities. New funds are allocated for Regional Fuel Storage. Construction improvements are intended to enhance the Convention Center Complex. Projects at the Convention Center are planned and will be determined during FY 2014.

- Civic Center Complex Improvements
- Regional Fuel Storage
- Fire Department Facilities Modernization

General Plan Finding: Consistent with Facilities Maintenance and Quality Services Goals of the General Plan.

IV. Storm Drains

Storm water is removed from city streets through a network of drains that channel the water into the ocean through the City's harbors, rivers, and bays. New funds have been allocated for storm drain system repairs and improvements.

- Storm Drain Pump Station Repair & Certification
- Storm Drain Refurbishment Telemetry
- Storm Drain System and Water Quality Improvements

General Plan Finding: Consistent with Facilities Maintenance and Quality Services Goals, and Areas of the City Subject to Flooding requirements for "the design of floor control facilities [to be] tailored to manage those eventualities" of the General Plan.

V. Street Rehabilitation

The Street Rehabilitation section is designed for neighborhood street repairs. Several projects were awarded new budget allocations including Major and Secondary Highway improvements, residential street repairs, and sidewalk improvements.

- Proposition A Transit Related Improvements
- Major and Secondary Highway Program
- Bridge Rehabilitation & Seismic Retrofit
- Citywide Residential Street Repair
- Citywide Infrastructure Improvements (Sidewalks)
- ADA Response Program

General Plan Finding: Consistent with Functional Transportation, Facilities Maintenance and the Quality Services Goals of the General Plan.

Transportation Element Section 5.1.6, Policy 9 – Ensure that pedestrian walkways are safe, convenient, and aesthetically appealing...

VI. Transportation Enhancements

This category is designed for projects that enhance access and add capacity to City roadways. Bikeway and pedestrian improvements and traffic mitigation programs are new projects that were included in the Fiscal Year 2014 Capital Improvement Program.

- Sustainable Transportation Improvements
- Traffic Mitigation Program
- Traffic & Pedestrian Signals
- Light Rail Transit Related Improvements
- I-710 FWY Major Corridor Improvements

General Plan Finding: Consistent with Managed Growth, Facilities Maintenance and the Quality Services Goals of the General Plan:

Bicycle Master Plan Objective 1.0: Develop a comprehensive Bikeway network; Bicycle Master Plan Finding: Consistent with Medium and Long-Term proposed bike facilities.

Goals also align with Transportation Elements: 5.1.2.: Promote transit use and enhance pedestrian movement; Transportation Element: 5.1.3.: Increase efficiency of operation of regional corridors and major and minor arterials. Also consistent with policies: 1.1 Consider every street in Long Beach as a street that bicyclists will use; 1.2: Integrate the City's bicycle friendly roads and bikeways with surrounding bicycle friendly roads and bikeways to maximize connectivity; 1.4 Consider bicycle friendly design using new technologies and innovative treatments on roads and bikeways

VII. Airport

The Long Beach Airport offers a variety of services required by commercial and general aviation users. Funding for airport-related improvements comes from Federal Aviation Administration grants, airport fees and facility charges, loans, and bonds. Improvements are intended to accommodate the needs of 41 commercial flights and over three million passengers annually. The only improvements that received new funding in FY 2014 were:

- Airport Terminal Area Improvements
- Airfield Pavement Rehabilitation
- Airport Parking Structure
- Rental Car Facility

General Plan Finding: Consistent with Economic Development, Neighborhood Emphasis, Facilities Maintenance and Quality Services Goals of the General Plan and the Land Use District Number 12 (Harbor/Airport).

VIII. Gas and Oil

The Long Beach Energy natural gas pipeline is a City asset with a \$400 million replacement value. A primary objective of the Department is to maintain the highest standards of pipeline integrity. These projects are administrated by Long Beach Energy.

IX. Harbor

The Harbor Department develops a separate CIP and reports to an independent commission. However, their key projects include terminal expansion and development; bridge and railway construction; and land acquisition.

X. Successor Agency

With the dissolution of the Long Beach Redvelopment Agency (RDA), the Successor Agency is responsible for completing "in progress" bond funded projects or other projects deemed to be pre-existing enforceable obligations.

XI. Water

The Water Department develops a separate CIP and reports to an independent commission. However, their key projects include Potable Water Facility Upgrades, Reclaimed Water System Expansion, and Sanitary Sewer Collection System Improvements.

GENERAL PLAN GOALS FOR THE YEAR 2000

Managed Growth: Long Beach accepts the population and economic growth anticipated through the year 2000, and intends to guide that growth to have an overall beneficial impact upon the City's quality of life.

Economic Development: Long Beach will pursue economic development, which focuses upon international trade, while maintaining and expanding its historic economic strengths in aerospace, biomedicine and tourism.

Downtown Revitalization: Long Beach will build its downtown into a multi-purpose activity center of regional significance, emphasizing a quality physical environment, a pedestrian focus, and a wide variety of activities and architectural styles.

New Housing Construction: Long Beach encourages the development of 24,000 new housing units through the year 2000, with emphasis upon filling the gaps which exist or are anticipated in certain sectors of the City's housing market. In the immediate future, such emphasis should be upon for-sale housing for first-time homebuyers and upon upscale residential development in and around the downtown area.

Affordable Housing: Long Beach views its existing housing stock as its greatest resource of affordable housing, and will stimulate and support continued maintenance and reinvestment in that housing stock. It will take advantage of every available state and federal program to make its housing affordable to its population, but it will not sacrifice long-term quality for short-term affordability in rehabilitated housing.

Neighborhood Emphasis: Long Beach recognizes the strong neighborhood to be the essential building block of a citywide quality living environment, and will assist and support citizen efforts to maintain and strengthen their neighborhoods.

Quality Services: Long Beach will emphasize quality in the provision of services to its residents and businesses and will strive to make public services readily accessible to all citizens.

Citizen Opportunity: Long Beach finds strength in the increasing diversity of its population, and will seek to ensure that opportunities are available to our new citizens to fully participate in the community and to achieve their personal goals.

Quality Education: Long Beach recognizes that quality education is a key ingredient in building a successful community through the year 2000 and it will foster community-wide support of education on all levels and for all age groups.

Facilities Maintenance: Long Beach will maintain its physical facilities and public rights-of-way at a high level of functional and aesthetic quality, manifesting the pride of

the citizens in their City and ensuring that future generations need not bear the burden of deferred maintenance.

Adequate Water Supply: Long Beach will continue to take the actions that are necessary to preserve an adequate supply of water for domestic, commercial and industrial purposes.

Functional Transportation: Long Beach will maintain or improve the current ability to move people and goods to and from development centers while preserving and protecting residential neighborhoods.

Art and Culture Support: Long Beach recognizes art and culture to be necessary ingredients of a quality living environment, and will create and support mechanisms through which private individuals and organizations can expand cultural opportunities for all residents.

Citizen Participation: Long Beach will pursue increased opportunities for citizen participation in public decision-making, and will encourage voluntary efforts to provide and improve local facilities and services.

Financial Stability: Long Beach will make efforts necessary to maintain stable local government financing; to identify and to prioritize existing and potential financing resources; and to make those fiscal allocations required to meet the goals which have been established through the strategic planning process.
