

Amer-I-Can Program Foundation for Social Change, Inc. Long Beach Facility

Fact Sheet August 17, 2004

- Amer-I-Can believes that all life has value and that transgression can lead to redemption and restoration through a program that is carefully designed to assist at-risk youth and young adults in acquiring the necessary skills and tools to lead a more successful, productive, and fulfilling life.
- Upon invitation, Amer-I-Can has provided specific intervention life-management and services to highly at-risk youth and young adults who have been or have the potential to become captured into the gang lifestyle.
- Seventy-nine graduates of the 15 chapter, 60-90 hour program have successfully integrated the principles into their daily lives have become productive, disciplined, and focused members of the community.

- Eighty-two participants were Long Beach residents.
- By their initiative, eight non-residents participated, seven graduated from the program, three in 2002-2003 and four in 2003-2004.
- At least 50 individuals were unable receive service because they did not meet the age and eligibility requirements.
- Amer-I-Can provides an invaluable public safety service to the community by providing a facility where young people can learn to replenish hope for a better life through its curriculum and mentoring, and are far less likely to enter the juvenile or adult court system.

- Amer-I-Can enjoys the support of businesses on the Atlantic Corridor and community residents.
- Ten businesses on the Atlantic Corridor have signed a petition in support in Amer-I-Can (See attached).
- 200 community residents have signed a petition in support of Amer-I-Can.
- Amer-I-Can is identified by the City of Long Beach an organization, which
 provides outreach to avert violence or retaliation (An Interim Report and Reexamination of Youth and Gang Violence in the City of Long Beach, Long Beach
 Human Relations Commission (2003), Appendix I, p.19).
- According to document, An Interim Report and Re-examination of Youth and Gang Violence in the City of Long Beach, Long Beach Human Relations Commission, (2003):
 - 33, 540 residents between ages 15-19
 - 35,670 residents between ages 20-24
 - Gang activity is prevalent between ages 18-24
- There are approximately 6,000 gang members, and 55 active gang organizations in Long Beach [An Interim Report and Re-examination of Youth and Gang Violence in the City of Long Beach, Long Beach Human Relations Commission, (2003)].

- Recently, Amer-I-Can has received commendations from Commander Alexander Yim, Correctional Services Division, County of Los Angeles Sheriff Department (June 2004), and Supervisor Don Knabe, 4th, District, Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors (August 2004), in recognition of its outstanding services to Los Angeles county in the prevention of violence among youth and young adults.
- At the August 24, 2004 regular meeting, Amer-I-Can will receive recognition from Member Marguerite LaMotte, Los Angeles Unified School District Board of Education, for its 2003-2004 after-school program at Washington Preparatory High School and the profound changes that have occurred in lives of the 18 students who graduated from the program.
- Amer-I-Can is a corporate partner of the National Crime Prevention Council (NCPC), the nation's focal point for crime prevention.
- Nationally, Amer-I-Can is a committed a service provider in 28 states, dedicated to bringing about positive social change through reclaiming lives in correctional facilities, schools, and gang intervention.

In a world where so much focus is placed on the violence among juveniles, it was a rare privilege to witness a celebration in recognition of the hard work, effort, and leadership your graduates have invested in their future and the future of our local communities.

As a Commander with the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department, I am fully aware of the repercussions stemming from community violence. Therefore, I was pleasantly surprised to know that the Amer-I-Can program offered in our county jail, is also being offered in the community. It was a unique experience to see youth graduate from both high school and the Amer-I-Can Program.

Amer-I-Can was sought out by Sheriff Baca when racial tensions were at its highest peak throughout our correctional setting. The implementation of this program at our North County Correctional Facility resulted in a significant reduction in the number of inmate disturbances. Coincidentally, the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors approved the continuation of the Amer-I-Can partnership with the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department, just prior to my attending the Washington High School graduation.

Thank you again for extending the invitation to this very unique graduation. I am convinced that if we continue to equip our youth with programs such as Amer I-Can, we will prevent them from embracing a life of violence which has already taken too many lives.
