Business Growth & Workforce Development

Item G: Workforce Development

Include the term "emancipated youth" when discussing workforce development.

Environmental

Item H: Air Quality

Include "airports" in the section that discusses assessing mobile and stationary pollution sources that impact the environment.

Neighborhood Development

Item F: Senior Services

Include obtaining additional housing for seniors as a priority.

Youth & Education

Item C: Economic Well-Being

Include the term "emancipated youth" in this item.



Subject: **Recommended Changes to 2008 Federal Legislative Agenda**

Each year, City staff reviews the Federal Legislative Agenda and recommends changes to the Federal Legislation Committee and the City Council to ensure that the agenda is up-to-date and addresses the legislative concerns of the City. The 2007 agenda was sent to all department heads for their input, and was circulated among the Council offices. Attached for your review are staff's proposed changes. Below is a summary of those proposed changes, which helps describe why deletions and additions were made.

BUSINESS GROWTH & WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

Item C: The Boeing Company

The fourth bullet regarding attracting the KC-X Tanker to Long Beach was removed, since another site was chosen for this production facility.

Item G: Workforce Development

Per the request of the Community Development Department, this section was revised to focus legislative efforts on reauthorizing the Workforce Investment Act, increasing and stabilizing investment in the local workforce investment system, and ensuring strong responses to skilled worker shortages of high-wage and critical industries.

COMMUNITY SAFETY

Item B: Public Safety & Crime Prevention

One bullet was added to focus on supporting legislation and grants that promote the installation of fire sprinkler systems in existing structures, per the City Council's direction in 2007.

ENVIRONMENTAL

Item H: Air Quality

A fourth bullet was added to reiterate the City's support of the passage of the Marine Vessels Emissions Reduction Act, which would require significant reductions in emissions of air pollutants from marine vessels.

Item K: Wetlands

A second bullet was added to reiterate the City's focus on legislative efforts to allow the Port of Long Beach to obtain mitigation credits to offset impacts of future port development projects by participating in restoration projects through the use of Tidelands Trust funds.

New Item: Water Conservation

This new section was added to highlight the City's commitment to conserving water on municipal property.

New Item: Breakwater Reconnaissance Study

Per the City Council's action in 2007, staff have been directed to perform a Reconnaissance study of the Long Beach Breakwater using local resources and to work with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to review and accept that study. This section was added to reiterate that direction.

New Item: Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant

The December 2007 passage of the federal Energy Bill authorized the creation of the Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant. This new section highlights the City's support for full federal funding of the program.

YOUTH & EDUCATION

Item E: Education and Workforce Readiness

Per the request of the Community Development Department, this section was revised to include the Workforce Investment Network's Youth Opportunity Center as the primary service provider for increasing the employment rate and employability of young adults age 16-24.

ADDITIONAL ISSUES OF FEDERAL LEGISLATIVE IMPORTANCE

Item D: Transportation

A fifth bullet was added regarding the support of legislation to increase airport passenger facility charges, which are used to help fund necessary airfield and terminal improvements. The Long Beach Airport recommends support of this increase. If passed, the City Council would retain the discretion to determine the level of increase of this charge for the airport (up to the maximum set by the federal government), as well as the use of the funds.

Item E: Unfunded Mandates/Local Control

A fourth bullet was added to focus on opposing legislative efforts to preempt campaign finance laws instituted by local ordinances, such as the City's Proposition M.

Item G: Municipal Elections

A second bullet was added to support legislative efforts to allow municipal elections officials to mail out official election-related materials through the United States Postal Service at nonprofit rates. This item was raised by the City Clerk's office as a possible approach to reducing election costs.

NEXT STEPS

A Federal Legislation Committee meeting has been called for February 4, 2008 to review and discuss these recommended changes. City Council discussion and approval of the Committee's recommendations is expected to take place in mid-February.
