


2035 Mobility Element of the General Plan











- Adopted October 15, 2013
- Vision: A balanced mobility system that services the needs of all users of the public rights-of-way via complete streets and contextsensitive design principles
 - Balance multiple modes
 - Promote environmental sustainability principles
 - Shaped by extensive outreach to residents, property owners and other community stakeholders
- Guides a wide range of City planning documents and programming activities:
 - Capital Improvement Program (CIP)
 - Transportation-related plans
 - Project entitlement applications
 - Local and regional long range planning documents





Implementation, Monitoring & Reporting

Implementation and monitoring of General Plan elements

- State law annual reporting
- Accountability
- Guide Planning Commission and City Council on developing policy, establishing priorities and providing direction to staff

How does implementation work?

- Cross-departmental collaboration for implementing projects, policies and programs laid out in the Mobility Element and its appendices
 - Public Works, Health Department, Harbor Department and Planning as primary implementors










2020 Mobility Element Implementation Update

- Report prepared with input from Department of Public Works and Health & Human Services





- Shoemaker Bridge Project



















Overall How Are We Doing?
