#### RECOMMENDATION:

Adopt the attached Resolution establishing the Pacific Gateway Workforce Investment Board; rescind Resolution C-27763; and approve execution of any necessary documents or agreements between the Pacific Gateway Workforce Investment Board and the Chief Elected Official(s) relating to the duties prescribed by the State and the United States Department of Labor for the oversight of the local workforce investment area. (Citywide)

#### DISCUSSION

The federal Workforce Investment Act of 1998 (WIA) mandates the establishment of a local workforce investment board (WIB) in each city, county or consortium of cities receiving workforce development funds from the Governor. Through the WIA and the State Unemployment Insurance Code, local WIBs, in consultation with the chief elected official, are tasked with responsibility for coordinating workforce investment strategies with local economic development efforts; developing and submitting an annual workforce development plan to the Governor; selecting local one-stop career center operators and awarding contracts to youth services providers; executing memoranda of understanding with partner agencies; setting policy for usage and thresholds of WIA training funds; conducting oversight of local workforce development programs; and negotiating with the Governor on local performance measures.

On October 24, 2000, the City Council adopted Resolution No. C-27763, which established the Greater Long Beach Workforce Development Board as the local WIB. That Resolution specified the number and categories of members to be appointed to the Board, and the process by which the cities of Long Beach and Signal Hill would appoint residents and business representatives. Current implementation of Senate Bill 293 requires that the composition of the local WIB increase to ensure that 15% of the membership is labor organization representatives and that small business development centers are added as mandated One-Stop Partners and WIB Members. With the ongoing requirement for 51% private sector representation, the WIB will increase in size from 37 members to approximately 45 (depending on extent of representation by certain public sector members). At the same time, expansion of the local workforce area approved by the City Council and State in July 2007, creates need to articulate appointment processes for the cities of Torrance and Lomita.

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The proposed resolution formally establishes the Pacific Gateway WIB and addresses the necessary composition changes, clarifies the allocation of business member slots for the cities of Lomita, Signal Hill and Torrance, and establishes the process by which those cities will appoint their respective members. The resolution also establishes a WIB Advisory Committee comprised of one elected official, or designee, representing each of the four (4) cities of the designated local workforce investment area, who shall serve as ex-officio, non-voting members of the WIB. The Committee will provide input on the strategic direction of the WIB.

This letter was reviewed by Deputy City Attorney Gary J. Anderson on October 19, 2007 and Budget Management Officer Victoria Bell on October 25, 2007.

### RESOLUTION NO.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LONG BEACH ESTABLISHING THE PACIFIC GATEWAY WORKFORCE INVESTMENT BOARD AND RESCINDING RESOLUTION NO. C-27763

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Long Beach on October 24, 2000, adopted Resolution No. C-27763 establishing the Greater Long Beach Workforce Development Board pursuant to 29 U.S.C. 2832 as a policy and planning body for programs funded by the United States Department of Labor in and for the Greater Long Beach local workforce investment area (local area); and

WHEREAS, the State of California had designated the cities Long Beach and Signal Hill as the local area for the purpose of implementing federally funded training and employment programs under the Workforce Investment Act (WIA); and

WHEREAS, the State of California has now designated the local area to include the cities of Lomita, Long Beach, Signal Hill, and Torrance; and

WHEREAS the WIA provides for the establishment of a local workforce investment board in each local area, to be appointed by the Chief Elected Official in the local area and certified by the Governor of California, which will set policy and develop a local workforce development plan in partnership with the Chief Elected Official; and

WHEREAS, the WIA requires, at a minimum, that the membership of the local workforce investment board include a majority of businesses, as well as representatives of local educational entities, labor organizations, community-based organizations, economic development agencies, as well as representatives of each of the partners participating in the operation of the local area's one-stop workforce development system; and

WHEREAS, California Senate Bill 293 amended the California

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Unemployment Insurance Code to require that at least 15 percent of the local workforce investment board be representatives of labor organizations, and that small business development centers be included as required partners in the local one-stop system; and

WHEREAS, the WIA and California Unemployment Insurance Code require the local workforce investment board and Chief Elected Official to share certain responsibilities with regard to WIA;

NOW, THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of Long Beach resolves as follows:

The above recitals are true and correct and are incorporated Section 1. by this reference.

Section 2. The Pacific Gateway Workforce Investment Board (hereinafter WIB) is established pursuant to 29 U.S.C. 2832 as a policy and planning body for programs funded by the United States Department of Labor and for the local area.

Section 3. The WIB shall consist of approximately forty-five (45) member slots as identified below, 37 of whom who shall be appointed by the Mayor of Long Beach, subject to confirmation by a majority vote of the Long Beach City Council. Each member shall serve for a term of up to two (2) years with the Mayor of the City of Long Beach reserving the right to re-appoint. Any member of the WIB may be removed at any time by the Mayor of Long Beach with the approval of a majority of the Long Beach City Council.

The membership of the WIB shall be comprised as follows:

Α. Approximately twenty-three (23) shall be representatives of businesses in the local area appointed from among individuals nominated by local business organizations and trade associations and that reflect employment opportunities of the area. Business representatives shall be owners of businesses, chief executives or operating officers of business or other business executives, including human resources executives, or employers with optimum policymaking or hiring authority. Individuals

appointed will represent businesses as follows: Long Beach - thirteen (13) members; Torrance - five (5) members; Lomita - two (2) members; Signal Hill - one (1) member; area-wide industries - two (2) members. Business representatives from the cities of Lomita, Signal Hill and Torrance shall be appointed by their respective chief elected officials;

- B. Two (2) representatives of local educational entities, including representatives of local educational agencies, local school boards, entities providing adults education and literacy activities, public and private postsecondary educational institutions, including representatives of community colleges, selected from among individuals nominated by regional or local educational agencies, institutions, or organizations representing local educational entities;
- C. Approximately seven (7) representatives of labor organizations nominated by local labor federations, including a representative of an apprenticeship program;
- D. Two (2) representatives of community-based organizations from the local area, including organizations representing individuals with disabilities and veterans, and organizations that serve populations with barriers to employment, such as the economically disadvantaged, youth, farmworkers, homeless, and immigrants;
- E. Two (2) representatives of economic development agencies, which may including a private sector economic development entity;
- F. One (1) representative of each of the following one-stop partner programs:
- State Job Service (Wagner Peyser), Trade Act
  Assistance (Trade Act of 1974), State Unemployment Compensation, and
  Veterans (Chapter 41 of Title 38 of the U. S. Code);
  - 2. Adult Education and Literacy (WIA Title II);

- G. The Community Development Department Director of the of the City of Long Beach or designee who shall represent the following:
  - 1. Title I of WIA
- Employment and Training Programs Authorized under
  U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development
  - 3. Economic Development
- H. One (1) representative of the local Temporary Assistance for Needy Family Program authorized under Part A of title IV of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. 601 et seq).

The provisions of Section 2.18.050(B) of the Long Beach Municipal Code relating to the residence of members of City boards, commissions and committees and Section 2.18.050(C) relating to the term of office shall not be applicable.

Whenever a member ceases to be a member of the representation category from which he or she was appointed to the WIB, of if for any reason the member desires to resign from membership of the WIB, he or she will immediately so inform the presiding Chairperson of the WIB in writing.

Section 4. No member of the WIB shall receive any compensation for his or her services thereon; however, members may be reimbursed for actual, necessary and reasonable expenses as provided by applicable laws and regulations and authorized by

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the City of Long Beach acting in its capacity as a grant recipient for federal funds.

Section 5. No later than ninety (90) days following their appointment, the WIB members shall meet at a regular session and shall organize by electing from their membership a Chairperson, who shall be elected from among the business representatives, and Vice Chairperson, and other such officers as a deemed necessary in accordance with WIA Section 117(b)(5). The officers shall serve in such capacity for a period of one (1) year with the option for re-election. A vacancy in any office of the WIB shall be filled by election from among the WIB members. The officers of the WIB shall perform the duties that are usually and customarily performed by such officers. At such initial meeting, the WIB members shall adopt a regular meeting schedule and shall inform the City Council thereof. A regular meeting shall be held at least once in each calendar quarter. Special meetings may be called by the Chairperson or by any three (3) members of the WIB. Notice of any meeting of the WIB shall be published prior to the meeting in accordance with the Ralph M. Brown Act. A majority of WIB members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, but a less number may adjourn form time to time to a day certain. The WIB may adopt by-laws, which are consistent with federal, state, and city laws, rules and regulations. Robert's Rules of Order shall constitute the parliamentary rules for the transaction of the WIB's business. All meetings shall be open to the public in accordance with the Brown Act and other open meeting laws.

Section 6. Members of the Youth Council who are not members of the WIB must be voting members of the youth council and nonvoting members of the WIB.

Section 7. If a member is absent without the consent of the WIB from four (4) consecutive meetings, regardless whether said meetings are regular, special, or of a committee to which the member is assigned, the retirement of said member from the WIB may be effected by a note of the WIB. In the event a vacancy thus created, it shall immediately be filled in the same method and manner by which such member was nominated and appointed.

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A member of the WIB shall not vote, or participate in any Section 8. discussions, or in any way attempt to influence and vote, on any matter under consideration by the WIB:

- Α. regarding any program, project or part thereof which will then be provided by such member or any organization with which such member is associated or affiliated; or
- В. that would provide direct financial benefit to such member or the immediate family of such member.

The City of Long Beach is the grant recipient and Section 9. administrative entity for the consortium's job training programs, and the appropriate officials of the City shall make the formal appointments, exercise final approval, make final determination and take final action in any matter involving WIB programs. The WIB shall provide policy guidance for the City's workforce development system in accordance with applicable federal laws, rules and regulations that are not inconsistent with state and city laws, rules and regulations. The duties of the WIB, consistent with the WIA and California Unemployment Insurance Code, shall include the following:

Coordinate workforce investment activities in the local area with economic development strategies;

Promote participation of private sector employers in the local workforce investment system;

Develop and submit a local workforce investment plan to the Governor;

Select one-stop operators, with the agreement of the Mayor of Long Beach, annually review their operations, and terminate for cause the eligibility of such operators;

Execute memoranda of understanding with one-stop partners;

Award grants or contracts to eligible providers of youth activities in the local area on a competitive basis, consistent with the WIA, based upon the recommendations of the Youth Council;

Identify, consistent with the WIA, eligible providers of training services;

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Identify eligible providers of intensive and, when the one-stop operator does not provide intensive services to the local area, award contracts to those providers;

Develop local policy on the amount and duration of individual training accounts based upon the market rate for local training programs, and process for identification of individuals who should be referred immediately to training services;

Conduct program oversight over workforce investment activities in the local area:

Negotiate with the Mayor of Long Beach and the Governor on local performance measures for the local area;

Assist in the development of a statewide employment statistics system, which shall be developed in conjunction with and shall utilize to the fullest extent possible, the California Employment Development Department's labor market information system;

Establish and appoint, in cooperation with the Mayor of Long Beach, as a subgroup within the WIB, a youth council with special interest or expertise in youth policy, to provide planning guidance to the WIB regarding youth workforce development activities, as required by the WIA;

Prepare a budget for the purpose of carrying out the duties of the WIB as specified under this section, subject to the approval of the Mayor of Long Beach.

Section 10. Reasonable staff support services and technical data may be provided to the WIB by the City Manager acting through the Community Development Department.

Section 11. Nothing contained in any provisions of this resolution shall be construed as investing the WIB or any member thereof with supervisory powers over the actions or duties of the City or its officers, agents or employees or the operations of City departments.

Section 12. A WIB Advisory Committee shall be formed, comprised of one elected official, or designee, representing each of the four (4) cities of the designated
