Subject:

Recommended Changes to the 2009 Federal Legislative Agenda

Each year, City staff reviews the Federal Legislative Agenda and recommends changes to the Federal Legislation Committee and the City Council to ensure that the agenda is up-to-date and addresses the legislative concerns of the City. The 2008 agenda was sent to all departments for their input, and was circulated among the Council offices. Attached for your review are staff's proposed changes. Below is a summary of those proposed changes, which helps describe why deletions and additions were made.

REORGANIZATION WITHIN SUBSECTIONS

This year, staff attempted to reorganize the order of the items in the Legislative agenda within the various subsections. Staff attempted to organize the document in a more cohesive manner based primarily on items that are expected to be more prevalent in Congress or expected to be major topics of discussion for the upcoming year. Staff also attempted to place major policy statements near the top of each section, followed by references to more specific or narrowly defined issues closer to the bottom. If an item was moved from one section to another it will show in red — otherwise only direct wording changes are shown in red on this document.

BUSINESS GROWTH & WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

<u>Item: I-710 Freeway/Gerald Desmond Bridge and Item B: Alameda Corridor</u>
These two items have been relocated to the new "Transportation" section of the Federal Legislative Agenda.

Item A: Economic Development

A fourth bullet regarding attracting and retaining local green collar jobs in specified industries was added, in support of the City's sustainability goals.

Item B: Workforce Development

Per the request of the Early Childhood Education (ECE) committee within the Department of Health and Human Services, a fourth bullet was added to support increased funding that focuses on developing and training the education workforce in order to improve education success among the City's children, youth, and young adults. The ECE also requested clarification as to the specific age ranges of the terms "children", "youth", and "young adults", which are used

throughout the document.

The fifth and sixth bullets added to this section focus on supporting efforts to train and retrain workers for well-paid local green collar jobs, as well as supporting the passage and full funding of legislation focused on establishing an energy efficiency and renewable energy worker training grant program, including the creation of an "Energy Conservation Corps" or similar program. These bullets also support the City's sustainability goals.

Item E: Small Business

Additional language was added to this item to emphasize the City's goal of supporting the allocation of revenues to encourage "green" business opportunities.

Item F: Arts & Tourism

A second bullet point was added that would allow the City to support legislation and grants that provide funding for museums that are supported with municipal funds.

COMMUNITY SAFETY

Item A: Public Safety & Crime Prevention

A tenth bullet was added to support legislation that would prohibit the Department of Homeland Security from requiring matching funds for homeland security grants.

ENVIRONMENTAL

Item A: Air Quality

The third bullet, which focused on supporting the ratification and implementation of Annex VI of the International Convention for the Prevention of Marine Pollution from Ships (MARPOL), was removed since MARPOL was signed into law by the President in July 2008.

A new bullet was added to support legislation that would assist the Port of Long Beach in their efforts to deliver major air quality benefits to the community, and is consistent with the goals of the Clean Air Action Plan.

Item B: Water Quality

A second bullet was added to focus the City's efforts on pursuing funding to study and implement solutions to reduce trash debris and pollution associated with the Los Angeles River, per the City Council's direction in April 2008. Item 3 was moved from the Additional Items of Federal Importance section to the Environmental section and combined with the current Water Quality section. Bullet 4 was added to specifically pursue funding for Low Impact Development (LID) strategies and integrated watershed management approaches. LID refers

to development that manages stormwater and runoff as close to the source as possible. Examples of LID strategies include limiting impervious surfaces and installing rain cisterns, bioswales, and green roofs.

Item E: Water Conservation

This item was revised to emphasize the City's commitment to seeking funding for water conservation efforts on city property and throughout the entire City, as well as to support coordinated regional water conservation efforts and public education.

Item G: Alternative Energy

The term "renewable" was added to this section to emphasize the City's support of alternative energy proposals that include renewable energy applications.

Item I: Global Warming

Two bullets were added to this item, both of which focus on local government efforts to address climate change. The first bullet supports legislation that provides funding, recognition, and support of local government action to address climate change, while the second focuses on supporting legislation that provides funding for local government climate change mitigation and adaptation strategies.

Item L: Dredging

This item was revised to emphasize the City's goal of supporting legislative efforts that would provide increased funding for the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers navigation and dredging projects.

Item N: SERRF

A minor technical change was made to this item to clarify what the acronym "SERRF" stands for (the Southeast Resource Recovery Facility).

NEIGHBORHOOD DEVELOPMENT

New Item: Mortgage Reform/Assistance

Given the negative impacts of the current home foreclosure crisis on local communities across the nation, this item was added to focus the City's efforts on two key goals: 1) supporting legislation and grants that provide assistance to homeowners in their efforts to rework their mortgages, thereby allowing them to remain in their homes; and 2) supporting legislation and grants to cities to provide funding to combat the negative impacts of vacant residential foreclosed properties on local communities.

New Item: Drug and Alcohol Recovery Facilities

As the City continues to combat the effects of the clustering of "sober living homes" in local neighborhoods, this item, which contains the same language used in the Adopted 2008 State Legislative Agenda, was added to allow the City

to utilize a two-pronged approach by addressing this important issue simultaneously at both the Federal and State levels, as appropriate.

CHILDREN/YOUTH & EDUCATION

In response to feedback received from the ECE committee, the title of this section was changed from "Youth & Education" to "Children/Youth & Education" to clarify this section's focus on all age groups ranging from 0-24.

Item A: Good Health, Item B: Safety and Survival, and Item C Economic Well Being

These items have been revised to clarify and include specific age ranges of the terms "children", "youth", and "young adults". As stated earlier in this memo, these changes have been provided throughout this document.

Item D: Social and Emotional Well-Being

A minor clarifying change was made to this item to highlight the City's goal of supporting legislation and grants that include enhancing the provision of quality childcare programs.

Item E: Education and Workforce Readiness

The first bullet was revised to specify the age range of the City's children and youth that will be the beneficiaries of the City's efforts to enhance the education and readiness programs aimed at ultimately increasing the employment rate and employability of young adults.

In coordination with the City's sustainability goals, a second bullet was added to support legislation that provides funding for local university, college, and high school programs that train students in renewable energy technology, energy efficiency, green building, or other related fields.

TRANSPORTATION

In an effort to highlight the importance of all aspects of transportation and to provide better clarification of the City's federal transportation goals, Item D (Transportation) has been relocated from its previous location within the "Additional Issues of Federal Legislative Importance" section and given its own section within this legislative agenda.

New Item: Transportation Funding

While this is a new item, bullets one through four remain the same as those adopted in the 2008 Federal Legislative Agenda. The fifth and sixth bullets pertaining to the I-710 Freeway/Gerald Desmond Bridge and the Alameda Corridor respectively were relocated from the "Business Growth and Workforce Development" section, and remain the same as those adopted in the 2008 Federal Legislative Agenda.

A seventh bullet was added to support legislation that secures funding to improve local and regional bicycle and pedestrian mobility networks, and complete bicycle and mobility projects, safety, and infrastructure improvements.

New Item: Goods Movement

While this is a new item, the first bullet regarding encouraging the recognition of infrastructure and environmental demands placed on Long Beach due to goods movement contains the same language adopted in the 2008 Federal Legislative Agenda.

A second bullet was added to support legislation that allows cities and/or jurisdictions to collect fees from parties responsible for detrimental impacts on local air quality and the environment.

New Item: Long Combination Vehicles

Per the City Council's direction on November 18, 2008, this item was added to support legislation that will ban Longer Combination Vehicles (LCVs) that consist of longer double tractor and triple tractor-trailers from traveling on federal highways to improve traffic congestion and prevent fatal accidents.

ADDITIONAL ISSUES OF FEDERAL LEGISLATIVE IMPORTANCE

New Item: Repayment of Municipal Investment Funds

Given the City's recent investment loss of \$20 million, this item will allow the City to aggressively pursue the repayment of investment funds owed to municipalities, such as Long Beach, that were lost by financial institutions that are now undergoing bankruptcy proceedings and/or have received federal funding via the Troubled Assets Relief Program.

Item C: Stormwater/Water Quality

This item was relocated to the Environmental section and combined with Item B: Water Quality.

Item C: Telecommunications

The eighth bullet regarding protecting local authority to negotiate and grant franchises to video providers was removed given the State's adoption of the Digital Infrastructure and Video Competition Act of 2006 (DIVCA), which gives the State overall authority, and local entities specified authority, over the administration and implementation of video provider franchises.

New Item: Flood Insurance

In response to recent discussions in Congress related to requiring residents in levee-protected areas to purchase annual flood insurance without first conducting

a detailed study of the actual flood risks to those specified areas, this item was added to direct the City to oppose any such legislation.

Deleted Item: Transportation

Per the previous section of this memo, this item was relocated to its own section within the legislative agenda and further expanded upon.

NEXT STEPS

A Federal Legislation Committee meeting has been called for December 9, 2008 to review and discuss these recommended changes. City Council discussion and approval of the Committee's recommendations is expected to take place on December 16.

Support legislative efforts to ensure local taxation authority of products purchased through the Internet. 5. Support legislation and grants to fund e-government initiatives. 6. Support legislative efforts to ensure that the City maintains right-of-way control and allows our City to collect fair compensation for its use. 7. Protect local government's ability to facilitate advanced communications services to their citizens. 8. Protect local authority to negotiate and grant franchises to video providers. Seek legislation to allow local governments the ability to utilize Public, Educational and Government (PEG) franchise fee support for both capital and operational expenses. 9. Support legislative efforts to ensure that the City and Region receive necessary funding to develop and implement a regional communication system to ensure interoperable communications across disciplines and jurisdictions. D. Flood Insurance: Oppose legislation that would require residents in leveeprotected areas to purchase annual flood insurance without first conducting a detailed study of the actual flood risks to those specified areas. E. Gas and Oil Department: Support legislation, initiatives and policies on behalf of the Long Beach Gas and Oil Department that are consistent with the City's long-term objectives for reliable, competitively priced energy supply. F. Water Department: Consider support of legislation, initiatives and policies initiated and/or advocated by the Long Beach Board of Water Commissioners, on behalf of the Long Beach Water Department, that are consistent with the Department's cost-effective long-term local water supply reliability objectives. G. Aquarium of the Pacific: Support legislation that will enhance the Aquarium of the Pacific's ability to provide maximum educational opportunities regarding aquatic life, facilities, recreation and local wetlands restoration and Los Angeles Basin watershed management.

Proposals and policies consistent with this agenda will be supported by the City. Those policies or proposals inconsistent with this agenda may be subject to opposition by the City.
