



education and a brighter future.


STATEWIDE IMPACT

The Campaign for Quality Education

In 2002, CFJ took the lead in forming the Campaign for Quality Education (CQE), a statewide alliance of thirty organizations. The CQE brings together the power of grassroots student and parent-led community organizations with the policy expertise of research,

legal, and advocacy groups to fight for better schools for all California students. CFJ and the CQE waged a four-year campaign to challenge the California High School Exit Exam and bring to light the drastic racial inequities that exist in our public schools. The CQE continues

to wage statewide campaigns to impact public education policy for the benefit of all

BUILDING LEADERSHIP

Youth as Leaders in their Schools and Communities

CFJ believes that the people that are most affected by a problem should lead efforts to solve it. OUR MISSION

Californians for Justice (CFJ) is a statewide grassroots organization working for racial justice by building the power of communities that have been pushed to the margins of the political process. Since 2001, CFJ's main focus has been building equity in education. We organize youth, immigrants, lowincome people, and communities of color in order to improve their social, economic and political conditions. CFJ trains a new generation of grassroots civil rights leaders and mobilizes public support for statewide policy changes in California.

OUR VISION

- We believe in an education system that provides qualified and diverse teaching staff to open the minds of youth, and school resources to open the doors to opportunities.

Californians for Justice's Long Beach Food for Thought Campaign:

In Fall 2009, student leaders and staff with Californians for Justice in Long Beach formed the SEED (Students Empowered through Educational Democracy) committee to develop a new campaign focused on Healthy School issues. Between February and April 2010, student leaders and staff with Californians for Justice in Long Beach collected close to 200 detailed surveys from fellow students and community members to determine issues for the campaign.

Survey Findings:

90% of those surveyed want education about how to access healthy food

87% of those surveyed want access to community/urban gardens on school campuses

91% of those surveyed agree schools should provide nutritious foods

84% of those surveyed agree that LBUSD schools should provide courses such as: ethnic studies that expose students and teachers to the full range of cultures, ethnicities, and races in Long Beach

It was evident through the research gathered from the first survey that health was of priority to our communities. SEED decided to solidify CFJ's campaign by developing a second survey that would address possible solutions to the issues of health. From May through June 0f 2010 CFJ leaders and staff organized a Community Forum and waged a second survey to over 170 community members to identify the "Food for Thought" Campaign Goals and Solutions:

2010-2011 Campaign Goals

- 1. To ensure that all LBUSD High School students have access to healthy and nutritious foods and Food Justice curriculum to educate them about making healthy and sustainable food choices.
- 2. To build a powerful collaborative of students, local school officials, community allies and decision-makers to provide input and support to the Food for Thought campaign.
- To embrace and celebrate the diversity of Long Beach through both community-led and school-led events, curriculum, and emotional and social supports in Long Beach schools.

Campaign Solutions - Step 1:



CALIFORNIANS FOR JUSTICE "Food for Thought" New Student-led Campaign in Long Beach

In Fall 2009, student leaders and staff with Californians for Justice in Long Beach formed a campaign committee to develop a new campaign focused on Healthy School issues. Between February and April 2010, student leaders and staff with Californians for Justice in Long Beach collected close to 200 detailed surveys from fellow students and community members to determine issues for the campaign. Launched in May 2010, the "Food for Thought" Campaign focuses on three fundamental health-related issues in Long Beach public schools in order to ensure that all students can thrive, attend school healthy and ready-to-learn, and graduate prepared for college, careers, and community participation:



1. Healthy Bodies

Including access to healthy and nutritious foods in Long Beach schools and low-income neighborhoods

2. Healthy, Green Environments

Including access to good air quality and clean and safe places for learning and recreation in Long Beach schools and low-income neighborhoods

3. Healthy Minds

Including positive race relations, self-identity, diversity awareness, and emotional and social supports in Long Beach schools

May 2010 Community Forum

In May 2010, CFJ student leaders organized a community forum to discuss their survey results and next steps in the campaign. More than 40 students and community members participated, including organizations such as Families in Good Health, EM3, Weed and Seed, Long Beach Alliance for Children with Asthma, Khmer Girls in Action, and the Cambodian Community Association. Forum participants agreed that a new organizing coalition needed to be formed to address these school-related health issues. Some of the possible policy demands discussed include:

- Incorporating education about access to healthy foods and how to maintain a healthy diet in all mandatory public school health classes in LBUSD
- Promoting urban gardens and urban gardening classes at LBUSD schools in located low-income communities of color in Central and West Long Beach.
- Working with broader alliances, including the Coalition for Clean and Safe Ports, to promote stricter air quality regulations for Long Beach and limiting any "cap-and-trade" practices in the Long Beach port.
- Promoting new courses and curriculum in the LBUSD such as Ethnic Studies that expose students and educators to the full-range of cultures in Long Beach.
- Promoting weeklong 'Racial Justice" cultural awareness weeks at LBUSD schools to address race relations and diversity.
