Molina Park Ground-Breaking Ceremony Held

On Saturday, January 28, a ground-breaking ceremony was held for the City's newest park, a 3.3-acre site named for Dr. David Molina, who passed away in 1996. C. David Molina Park is located at 4951 Oregon Avenue, and will feature a turf soccer field, playground, restroom facility, walking path, parking and landscaping.

As an emergency room physician in Long Beach, Dr. Molina treated low-income, uninsured and non-English speaking residents. Beginning in 1980 with a single clinic, he and his family built Molina Healthcare into a Fortune 500 company that today serves more than five million people across the country.

After working as a teacher, Dr. Molina started the City's first intensive care unit at Pacific Hospital in 1962, where he also served as the Director of the Emergency Department for 21 years. He also earned a grant to develop and train Firefighters to become the City's first Paramedics. Molina Healthcare is still headquartered in Long Beach, and the Molina children

now run the company and are active in the community.

"Dr. Molina showed compassion to people who needed it the most," said Mayor Robert Garcia. "He cared for every patient like they were family, and I'm very proud that this park will add to his legacy as a champion of the community."

The park will have energy efficient lighting to provide additional hours of play for Long Beach sports groups. The walking path and fitness stations will encourage healthy outdoor exercise. The playground will feature dynamic universally-accessible play structures designated for youth 2 to 5 years old and 5 to 12 years old, as well as a climbing structure, safety surfacing and colorful shade structures. There will also be benches, bike racks, picnic tables, landscaping and parking.

C. David Molina Park is adjacent to land that was once home to the Will J. Reid Boy Scout Camp and is becoming a private residential development. The developer funded the public park, which will be operated by the Department of Parks, Recreation and Marine.

Animal Care Services Update

Animal Care Services Open House Showcases Resources for People and Animals



Long Beach Animal Care Services (ACS) hosted their annual Open House on January 28 to showcase improvements at the shelter, highlight partnerships and opportunities, and provide information about animal care programs.

Mayor Garcia detailed ACS's accomplishments from 2016, which included reductions in impounds and euthanasia rates, and increases in live release rates. "Thanks to our hard-working staff, dedicated volunteers, partners, rescue groups and the community, 2016 was a record-setting year for saving animals in our city," said Mayor Garcia. "I'm looking forward to working with the community this year to achieve even better results for our shelter."

City Auditor Laura Doud announced an upcoming shelter audit requested by Mayor Garcia. "We're looking for an animal-care expert to help with best practices in shelter management and veterinary services," said Ms. Doud. "We will be coming to the public to hear ideas of how Long Beach, can meet these best practices."

Mayor Garcia presented awards to recognize outstanding organizations and volunteers.

April Devane was named ACS Volunteer of the Year for her passion and dedication to caring for our city's animals at the shelter.

Animal Care Services Update

LB Animal Care Services Continues Improving With Another Record Year in 2016

The Long Beach Parks, Recreation and Marine Animal Care Services Bureau (ACS) achieved another record year in 2016 with regards to saving animals. The following year-end statistics show increasing progress being made at the animal shelter and are the best numbers ever reported:

- ◆ Over 1,100 fewer cats and dogs impounded at the shelter in 2016, a 15% reduction compared to 2015. Additionally, impounds of cats and dogs has been reduced by close to 38% since 2011, just five years ago.
- ◆ Euthanasia saw another steep decline with 717 fewer dogs and cats euthanized in 2016 compared to 2015. This represents a reduction of 27% for dogs and 31% for cats.
- ◆ Compared to five years ago, euthanasia for dogs and cats is down 70%, representing over 3,850 fewer dogs and cats euthanized.
- ◆ 2016 live release rates of over 85% for dogs and 54% for cats compared to only 83% for dogs and 54% for cats in 2015. The live release rate in 2011 was only 72% for dogs and 20% for cats. The Live Release Rate is the percentage of animals that come to the shelter and leave with a positive outcome such as return to owner, adoption or transfer to a rescue organization.

"I am proud of the Long Beach community for stepping up to support our local shelter," said Mayor Robert Garcia. "Through community engagement and partnerships with nonprofit groups, we've been able to reduce animal overpopulation and give more pets forever homes."

ACS achieved its best year thanks to all the hard work of staff, volunteers, partner groups, local rescues and the entire Long Beach community.

Some of the most notable improvements in 2016 include:

- ◆ The construction of a new outdoor "Catio" play area for adoptable cats, made possible thanks to a generous donation by the Florence Jones Trust.
- ◆ A new mobile adoption vehicle was also made possible thanks to a very generous donation.
- ◆ A new medical suite was installed and constructed, thanks to the Friends of Long Beach Animals (FOLBA)
- ◆ Continued with the third year of our community cat program with the Stray Cat Alliance, saving the lives of hundreds of community cats.
- ◆ Offered bottle feeding kits for residents wanting to assist with kittens found in their community, thanks to donations from Helen Sanders Cat Paws.

"We continue to look for new partnerships, programs and innovative ways to help save lives, such as the mobile adoption vehicle to help increase adoptions, and the recently launched Twitter feed #LBLostFoundPets, to help reunite lost pets with their owners," noted Ted Stevens, Manager of Animal Care Services. "We look forward to reaching more milestones in the future and continue to reduce pet overpopulation and find new forever homes for animals at the shelter."



Maintenance and Development Bureau Update

Fast, Fluid and Flexible: LBPRM Manages Flood Effects

All Parks, Recreation and Marine employees hope for drought relief, but the all-time Long Beach rain record of 3.87 inches on January 22 it was too much, too fast.



PRM staff did what they could to manage the effects of the heavy rain. Beach Maintenance and Marine Maintenance staff prepared ahead of time with constant sand replenishment in low-lying areas and building up sand berms to protect Peninsula homes. They also kept the

beach bike and pedestrian paths clear. During and after the storm Grounds Maintenance staff removed multiple downed trees and pumped out flooded areas around park facilities and trails.



The Department Administration Building in El Dorado Park sustained serious flood damage which created the need for staff to vacate while new dry wall is installed and carpet repairs are made. On the night of the storm, dozens of employees came to work, some with family members, and started to pick up items off of the floor in every office, pump out an atrium, and start the cleanup process. In other parts of the city, several community centers including

Houghton Park experienced leaks and flooding. El Dorado Nature Center closed flooded trails, including the paved whole access trail, that was under two feet of water.



The PRM Management team worked quickly to identify off site locations for staff to keep critical operations up and running, and work groups together as much as possible. Facility Maintenance staff set up electrical power for temporary staff work stations at the El Dorado Community Center Library. LBPRM is grateful for the Department of Technology and Innovation staff who assisted displaced staff by connecting phones and computers in the new locations, and making sure that all equipment was up and running.

Temporary Service Locations for the Public

The public reservation/front counter operations have been moved into the front lobby office area of the nearby El Dorado Senior Center, 2800 Studebaker Road, until the building can be reopened in approximately two months.

All phones have been forwarded, allowing staff to be reached at their same office number. All on-line services are functioning.

Know Your Long Beach Park: Bouton Creek Park



Bouton Creek Park is located south of Ather-ton Street and north of the Bouton Creek storm channel between Tulane and Litchfield Avenues.

The park follows a portion of the former location of Bouton Creek, which was converted into a storm drain channel. The channel continues east past Whaley Park and through the CSULB

campus to Los Cerritos Channel, then west to Clark Avenue where it turns north and enters the southern portion of Long Beach Airport.

It is a passive park with a playground, picnic tables and benches.

The Home Investment Company, headed by Lloyd S. Whaley, donated the .85-acre park to the City of Long Beach in 1965.



M.L. King Jr. Park Hosts Day of Service
