I see from tomorrow's council agenda that you are being asked to make a list of city expenditures that had gone to local vendors and providers since 2002. I hope you don't "cherry pick" your participants but in the area of Architecture, Planning and Engineering very few of the plum contracts went to local firms.

In Mayor Foster's "State of the City" speech in January he indicated that local preference would be a prime object of the city. I hope the record, going forward, will show better achievements in hiring local Architecture and Engineering businesses. The record so far is very lopsided toward hiring out of area firms. This conclusion, you can see from my charts below.

Remember there is a multiplier effect from hiring local Architecture|Engineering firms. Many local firms use local consultants such as:

Many of our blueprint companies and reproduction services are local. Local Architecture|Engineering firms buy expensive and high end computer hardware and software, printers and plotters, copiers and office|drafting|artist supplies. Local firms buy professional, business and

car insurance from our community. Local firms, of course, lease, rent or buy local office space and buy office furniture and equipment from local vendors.

Local Architecture|Engineering firms hire local draftspeople, project managers, office managers, CAD operators, secretaries, clerks and janitorial help. I have hired local high school students myself from the Architecture|Drafting department at Wilson High. Right now I have local radio station Long Beach State's KKJZ [88.1 FM] playing on my office stereo.

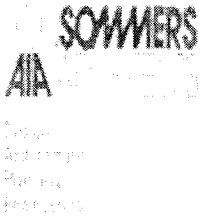
Local Architecture|Engineering firms tend to recommend local General Contractors and Subs. We are familiar with the workings of the Planning and Building Department, the permitting process and many of the department's personal. Also, entitlement issues and discretionary permits such as condition use permits and zoning are best handled by local Architects and Planners.

Several of the projects listed below are not directly under the control of the city or its agencies; though all are within city limits. You the, City Manager, and Mayor Bob Foster have numerous opportunities to meet with these other institutions and discuss their projects. I would appreciate, [and if you find it appropriate], that in these meetings some "jawboning" goes toward hiring local design, planning, environmental, architectural and engineering talent.

I know that Mayor Foster is very interested and supportive of the **ACE [Architecture, Construction, Engineering] Mentor Program** at Jordan High School. Having a chance for these students to mentor, monitor, shadow or apprentice with local Architecture|Engineering firms on significant local projects would be an invaluable experience for these students.

Of course Long Beach isn't the only place where architects are concerned with jobs going out of the area. An article entitled School District Choose Out-of-Town Architect from the "Springfield Business Journal"; 1/20/2010 highlights this issue. The Springfield, Missouri A1A is attempting rescind an Architect|Engineering contract provided by the Springfield School Board for a new \$ 9.3 million grammar school that was to be designed by out of area architects.
