1. CURRENT SUPPORT

Current Support for Arts & Culture

Long Beach has a rich history of supporting arts and culture.

Annual General Fund Support for the following:

- Long Beach Arts Council (\$404,300)
- Long Beach Museum of Art (\$319,000)
- Municipal Band (\$360,000)
- And many other programs




30 LARGEST CITIES

- No Percent for the Arts Program




CALIFORNIA CITIES

- ■Both Public & Private




3. ANALYSIS

- Internal Service Funds
- Special Funds

5. ADMISSIONS FEE

Admission Fee

- Some states & cities have imposed a tax/fee on entertainment venues or events to support the arts
- Can be a tax on entertainment or specific to a venue
- Would require 2/3 voter approval for the funds to dedicated to the arts
- Alternatively, the Convention Center is increasing its own fee to help support the arts at the Center



6. DEVELOPMENT IMPACT FEE

Development Impact Fee

- As a requirement of development, the City charges development impact fees
- The Mitigation Fee Act requires nexus or linkage between the fees being charged and the benefit of facilities to mitigate new development impacts
- ▷ To implement a fee on private development for art, a Nexus study is required
- Continuing research as to where Long Beach is in the Marketplace and the possible effect on development

8. RECOMMENDATIONS

Recommendations

- General Fund Capital Projects Create a 1% Percent for the Arts
 Program on all General Fund capital construction projects & any other eligible fund
- Fee Threshold Assessed on construction costs exceeding \$100,000
- Other Funds Will participate to the extent allowed by law, with the funds dedicated to public art to benefit those funds and uses
- Long Beach Arts Council The Arts Council will manage the disbursement of funds to the various artists and arts organizations
- Funding Goal is to reach \$750,000 over the next three years to support the arts

Fund Uses



Recommendations continued

- Convention Center Entertainment Fund Fee Convention Center increased the fee from \$1 to \$3 a ticket. The increase will generate an additional \$170,000 for a total of \$255,000 per year collected to provide additional support to the Arts at the Center
- Private Development Staff will continue to study private development as a feasible second phase for arts funding
- Administrative Regulations If approved, staff will develop the program through administrative regulations
- Next Steps Formal development of the program by Spring 2017 and assist the Arts Council in development and implementation of the program
